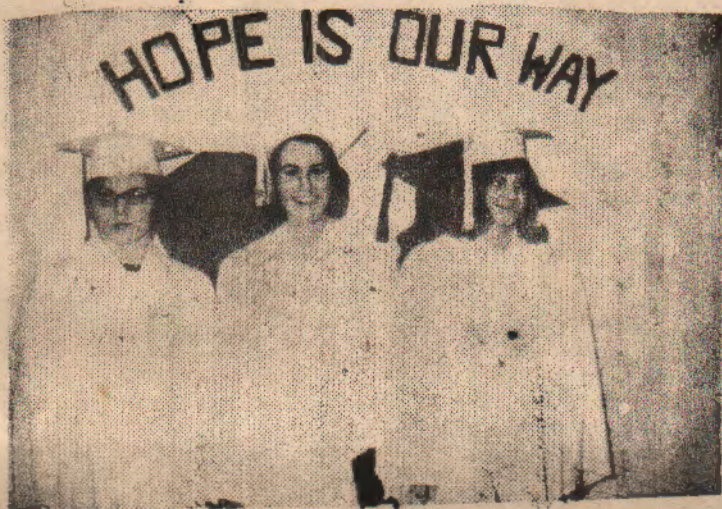




CHUGIAK GRADS HURT IN WRECK

EAGLE RIVER: Three Chugliak High School graduates were injured in an automobile accident less than two hours after they had received their diplomas.

The accident took place at 10:10pm on Thursday, May 26th at mile 14.5 on the Glenn Highway.

Injured were Samuel Allen Wintersteen, of Eagle River, driver of the 1965 Simca and his two passengers Linda Hutchison and Donna Crandall both also of Eagle River.

Wintersteen was proceeding South, when a 1965 Chevrolet station wagon driven by Howard Wygal of Anchorage turned in front of him. Wygal was turning into the Alaska Range Service when the accident took place.

Wintersteen and the two girls were taken to Anchorage where they were hospitalized. Sam at the Providence Hospital where he was treated for severe cuts about his face, arms and hands; and the two girls to the 5040th Air Force Hospital where they were treated for cuts and bruises. The Eagle River Fire Company Ambulance transported the injured.

Wygal was cited for turning left. Both vehicles were damaged extensively.

KINDERGARTEN NOW REGISTERING

ANCHORAGE: A six-week Summer Kindergarten will be offered this year from July 5 through August 12, by the Greater Anchorage Borough School District for all resident youngsters who will be six years old on or before November 1, 1966.

YOUTH CORPS JOBS NOW OPEN

ANCHORAGE: Young people residing in the Greater Chugliak Area are eligible to apply for jobs through the Neighborhood Youth Corps, according to Bill Cheney, local director.

To be eligible, the boy or girl must be between the ages of 16 and 21, and come from families of below average income.

There are jobs for maintenance men, general office workers, laborers, mechanical assistants, custodial workers, cafeteria aides and others.

Those who are selected will work a 32 hour week at the rate of \$1.75 per hour.

In order to join the applicant must have been out of school for 6 months (graduation not necessary) be unemployed and meet economic criteria.

AMU LISTS COURSES FOR THREE SUMMER SESSIONS

Three major summer sessions and a number of special courses and workshops have been scheduled for Alaska Methodist University this summer.

The major sessions are subdivided into the pre-session (June 6-24), the main session (June 27-Aug. 5), and the post session (Aug. 8-26).

In addition to the major sessions, a one-week modern management workshop is scheduled for May 31 to June 4, a WICHE work-study program in mental health is scheduled for June 13 to August 12, short courses in art and geology (art education, principles of geology I, and field geology) are scheduled for June 27-July 15, short courses in geology and religion (principles of geology II, rocks and minerals

and advanced studies in modern religious thought) are set for July 18-Aug. 5, and a second one-week modern management workshop is scheduled for Sept. 6-10.

Fourteen titles are listed on the schedule of courses for the pre-session. They are cultural anthropology, theory and practice, workshop in understanding art, principles of economics, administration of school libraries, teaching elementary school social science, current educational issues and trends, teaching of reading, twentieth century fiction, man's religions-I, history of England to 1688, college algebra and psychology: the child, and race relations.


Nineteen courses on the main session schedule include: Principles of Management, Economic History of the United

States, young peoples books and literature, reference and bibliography, principles of guidance, moral and spiritual values in education, the changing mathematics curriculum, audio-visual aids in teaching, Shakespeare, art in world culture, man's religions-II, history of Alaska, analytical geometry with calculus, different equations, general psychology, the family, crime and delinquency, sociology of the community, nature, geomorphology, and fundamentals of speech.

The post session list includes eight courses: field biology, principles of economics-II, philosophy of education, counseling techniques, science education, studies in American literature, fundamentals of music.

Registration is scheduled for the first day of each course or workshop. Tuition is \$27 per unit. Credit for courses ran from 1 to 4 units. Graduate credit is available in many courses through the University of Puget Sound.

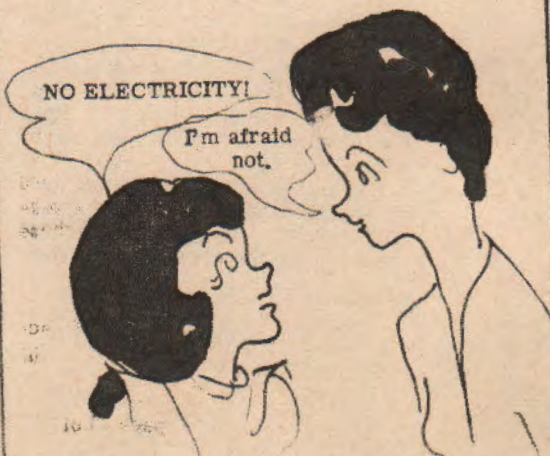

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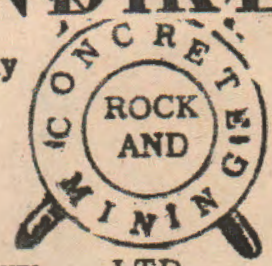
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Tell it to Martha!

ONE INJURED WHEN CAR FORCED OFF ROAD

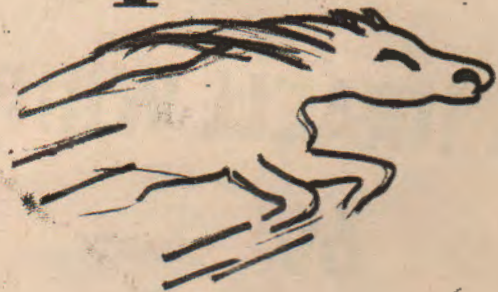
EKLUTNA: An Anchorage man was injured while his passenger escaped unhurt in a one car accident at mile 27 early Sunday morning.

FIRE CO. PUTS OUT TWO BLAZES

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company extinguished two blazes last Wednesday.

At 7:30pm they were called when a burning garbage dump ignited some brush at the Alaska Range Service.

At 9:10pm on the same day they were summoned to put out a brush fire at mile 8 on the Eagle River Road.

In both cases the Fire Company was able to extinguish the blazes before much damage was done.

NO CITATIONS IN MILE 18 WRECK

OLD CHUGIAK: There were no citations or charges issued in a two car collision which took place at mile 18 on Monday, May 30th at 11:20pm.

The accident occurred when a car which had just passed two other vehicles suddenly stopped in front of the forward of the two cars it had just passed.

The driver of the forward car, a 1959 Pontiac driver by Clamen T. Timblen Jr. of Anchorage swerved to go around the stalled car. At the same time, the following car, a 1961 Sprite, driven by Donny G. Davis of Palmer also swerved and both cars collided.

Davis was taken to Providence Hospital by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance where he was treated for lacerations of the chin and forehead.

Two passengers in the Clemens car, Elizabeth J. Fine of Anchorage, and Genevieve A. Beretico, also of Anchorage were taken to the Presbyterian Hospital by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance, where the former was found to be suffering from broken ribs, and the latter from sprained back and shoulder.

Both cars were extensively damaged.

VETS MAY SET UP LOCAL RABIES CLINIC

CHUGIAK: Several Anchorage Veterinarians have been approached in regards to setting up one or more rabies clinics in the Greater Chugiak Area.

With the deadline approaching by which time all dogs must be licensed under the Borough Dog Control Ordinance, local residents have felt that perhaps it would be more expedient to make it possible to obtain the required rabies shots at local clinics rather than have to bring their pets into Anchorage.

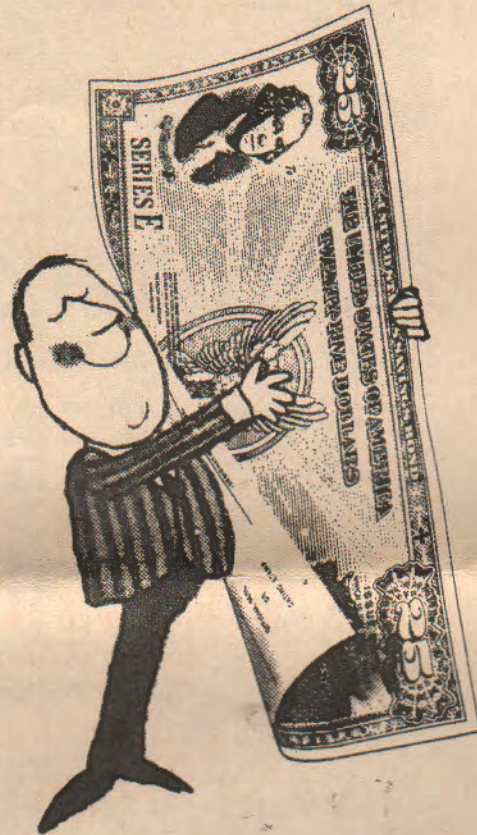
Mrs. Christa Burg, who operated the Birchwood Kennels, said that she had spoken to two Anchorage Veterinarians, and both had

indicated a willingness to set up local clinics if there was sufficient interest on the part of local residents to justify their coming out here. Mrs. Burg also said that it might also be possible for the veterinarians to be authorized to issue dog licenses following the inoculation of the dogs.

Dates and places of the clinics will be published in the Knik Arm Courier as soon as this information is available.

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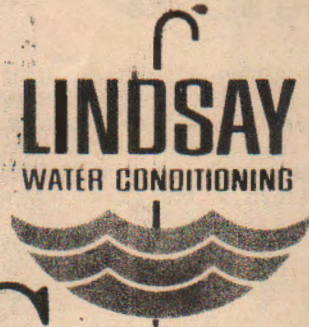


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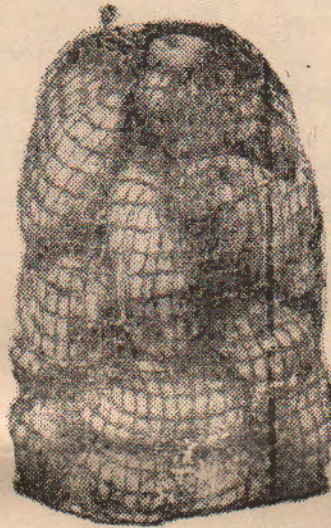
