#### KINDERGARTEN NOW REGISTERING


To be eligible, the boy or girl must be between the ages of 16 and 21, and come from families of below average income. There are jobs for maintenance

per hour. In order to join the applicant must have been out of school for 6 months (graduation not necessary) be unemployed and meet economic criteria.

#### AMU LISTS COURSES FOR THREE SUMMER-SESSIONS

Three major summer ses.<sup>4</sup> sions and a number of special courses and workshops have been scheduled for Alaska Methodist University this summer.

The major sessions are subdivided into the pre-session (June 6-24), the main session (June 27-Aug.5), and the post session (Aug. 8-26).



The post session list includes eight courses: field biology, principles of economics-II, philosophy of education, counseling techniques, science education, studies in American literfundamentals of music.

Registration is scheduled for the first day of each course or workshop. Tuition is \$27 p unit. Credit for courses ran from 1 to 4 units. Gradu credit is available in ma. courses through the Universit of Puget Sound.

VETS MAY SET UP LOCALRABIES CLINIC

CHUGIAK: Several Anchorage Vet-erinarians have been approached in regards to setting up one or more rables clinics in the Greater Chugiak Area. With the deadline approaching

by which time all dogs must be licensed under the Borough Dog Control Ordinance, local residents have felt that perhaps it would be more expedient to make it possible to obtain the required rables shots at local clinics rather than have to bring their pets into Anchorage. Mrs. Christa Burg, who op-erated the Birchwood Kennels, said

that she had spoken to two Anchor-Veterinarians, and both had ave

indicated a willingness to set up local clinics if there was sufficient interest on the part of local resid-ents to justify their coming out here. Mrs. Burg also said that it might also be possible for the veterinarians to be authorized to issue dog licenses following the innoculation of the dogs.

Grimm was cited for failure to vield.






