

The child, little Virginia Schackle, daughter of Larry Shackle of Anchorage, had apparently fallen from the dock at Camp Gorsuch on Mirror Lake.

Frank Mielke, a Chugiak High School junior, happened to notice the child beneath the water and pulled her to safety.

While awaiting the arrival of the State Police and an ambulance, the child was kept alive by mouth to mouth resustitation, which was administered by Bernard Hopp of Anchorage Drilling. When the Eagle River Volunteer Ambulance arrived, oxygen equipment was available, and the ambulance driver, Larry Fifer administer the exygen, while the State trooper administered external heart message until the child revived. She was then taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital by the ambulance where she was placed in an oxygen tent.

Frank Mielke, the boy whose quick action is credited with saving the child, is one found Mr. and Mrs. John Mielke of Lower Peters Cresk.

BOROUGH-CITY GROUP TO HEAR FROM RURAL 30



He will bring out five points that he believes must be satisfactorily contained in any merger legislation.


JUNEAU: In conjunction with the Centennial Cleanup Program, the Alaska State Troopers are on the march against litter, according to Martin B. Underwood, Comissioner of the Department of Public Safety. It may be "Unlucky 13" for you if

It may be "Unlucky 13" for you if you are seen littering our highway, recreation areas or private property, for Chapter 13 SLA 1966 signed into law by Governor William A. Egan, took effect May 30 of this year, and sharp focus is now being placed on keeping Alaska free from "all garbage, rubbish, animal viscera or other discarded objects" in accordance with the law.

"This is also a citizen participation program," states Mr. Underwood. "For instance, if someone throws rubbish out of a car, the citizen in the car back of him should immediately mark down the license number, the date and area in which this took place and phone this information in to the nearest State Police office. Office personnel will then transfer this information into a "Litterbug Report" which is mailed to the violator The "Litterbug Report" in part, reads as follows, "A fellow citizen has advised me that litter was seen being thrown from a vehicle déscribed as a (name of car) Alaska License No. . This incident, in the vicinity of took place on 1966."

"All Alaskans are being requested to help prevent the littering of our highways and other public areas caused by tons of trash and litter that forgetful and inconsiderate motorists dumperch year. Your cooperation is requested in keeping Alaska clean and beautiful as a contribution to the future and to keep our State a pleasand and enjoyable place that we can be proud to call our home."
