

GAAB SCHOOLS TELL NEW ADMISSION POLICY

ANCHORAGE: The Anchorage Bor-ough School District has announced a new admission policy for children under the legal age for enrollment in summer kindergarten next month.

The previous policy stated that only children who would be six years of age on or before November 1, 1966 were eligible to attent. Now it is possible for children who will celebrate their sixth birthday between November 2, 1966 and February 2, 1967, to gain admission based on

1967, to gain admission based on testing and classroom observation.

Interested parents who believe their children will benefit from early admission to school should make application at Airport Heights Elementary School, 2765 16th Avenue, (272-7841) on June 20 or 21st, between 2-00am and 4-00am. They between 9:00am and 4:00pm. They must bring the child's birth certif-icate at that time.

The initial testing will be held at Airport Heights School on June 28 and June 30. Those children whose test scores indicate readiness for school will be enrolled in summer kindergarten with followup evaluation and observation. This enrollment will be tentative for one month until the child has proven to the satisfaction of the school staff that he can perform academically, emotionally, socially and creatively with his clasmates. DALMER: The threatened strike of members of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers

Brotherhood of Electrical Workers against the Matanuska Telephone Association has been postponed until July 8th, according to Max Clement, MTA manager.

Clement said that the postponement was at the request of Gil Johnson, Commissioner of Labor for the State of Alaska. Mr. Johnson had requested a 45 daydelay in the strike but the IBEW had agreed to delay pnly until July 8th. pnly until July 8th.

The union was request ing an increase in pay of 7 1/2% for a one year contract or an increase of 12 1/2% for a three year contract, according to Clement.

There are a total of six men involved in the dispute, repair men

and telephone installers.

Clement said that the Matanuska
Telephone Association has the highest rate of pay in the State of Alaska with the exception of only the phone workers in the cities of An-

chorage and Fairbanks.

Clement concluded saying that
in the event that negotatiations fail to arrive at a contract and the union does go on strike, MTA subscribers would continue to receive un-interrupted service. He said that interrupted service. the only effect would be on new installations and moves.

He added that outages would be taken care of by management personnel..

In 1957, an addition to this building was made. Later a quonset was added for additional Sunday School

The church was set in order May 10, 1957 and a charter membership was set up. Charter members were: Rev. and Mrs. Wilburn Craig, Melba and Dale Hendrickson, Julia and Roe Huling, Miriam and Kenneth Huling, Paul Huling, Naomi and Milton Wyatt, Ruby and Reuben Wyatt, Minor Martin and Patsy Reed.

The first deacons of the church were Kenneth and Paul Huling and Dale Hendrickson. Trustees were Kenneth Huling, Dale Hendrickson, and Milton Wyatt.

Rev. Craig resigned later that month and Rev. Bernard Tewell came as pastor in June 1957. During Rev. Tewell's ministry, the church grew to the point of needing further expansion, thus a basement was erected. The groundbreaking ceremony for the basement was held in August, 1962 with Rev. Paul Riley and Rev. Tewell officients.

Rev. Tewell served the church as pastor until Jine, 1964. Rev. Edgar McElhannon came to the church as pastor in August, 1964.

Again, there was a need to build. In June, 1965 work began on a 12 foot extension on the basement and the upper structure. The first service was held in the new sanctuary May 15, 1966.

Departments within the church which are active are: Women's Missionary Council, Christ's Ambassadors (young people), Missionettes, Royal Rangers, Men's Fellowship. Current attendance roll numbers of 150.


