

SINGLE FIRE DISTRICT SEEN

RASH OF ARSON AND BREAKING-IN PLAGUES COMMUNITY

CHUGIAK: State Police are busy investigating a rash of arson, breaking in and vandalism which has plagued the community over the past few weeks.

In one instance three separate attempts had been made to burn an unoccupied house in Eagle River. This building is located behind Tips Bar.

A house located on the mile 17 end of the Birchwood Loop Road was completely destroyed by fire last week. This building was also unoccupied, the owner living in Cordova.

Neighbors saw two boys aged 13 and 12 leaving an unoccupied house on Aurora Parkway in Birchwood shortly before they noticed that the building was on fire. They called the state Police and also extinguished the blaze. The two boys were taken into custody.

The parents of a ten year old boy discovered that their son and another youngster were responsible for starting a number of small fires in unoccupied cabins on lower fire lake. In these cases the fire had gone out before involving the buildings. They reported this information to the State Police.

In several cases, theft and vandalism were the result of break-ins.

The home of John Patrick on the Birchwood Road was entered and 2 pistols taken. Also, the Boyd Walker residence in Birchwood was ransacked, vandalized and several articles of woman's apparel taken.

Plane owners of aircraft parked on the Birchwood Airstrip complained that their planes had been broken into and radios, sleeping bags and articles of survival gear stolen.

The State Police stated that there is hardly a single unoccupied house between Eagle River and Eklutna that has not been hit in one way or another.

All this is believed to be the work of juveniles. The police are investigating.

LOCAL YOUTHS UNHURT IN WRECK

FT. RICHARDSON: Four local youths escaped with only minor cuts and bruises following a one car accident which took place at mile 9 last Friday evening.

The car, a 1956 Ford sedan rolled over at high speed after the driver, Richard Bush 18 lost control of the vehicle.

Passengers in the car were Daniel Bush 16, Ryan C. (Stubby) Straight 15, and Gary Seabolt 15.

The driver was cited for driving too fast for conditions.

ANCHORAGE: A single Fire Company serving all the communities of the Greater Chugiak Area, may result from a public hearing held by the GAAB Assembly last Monday night.

The hearing was called as a result of two separate petitions which had been submitted by both of the Fire Companies which presently serve this area. Each Company had petitioned that the area it served be designated a Fire Service District by the Borough, and supported by borough taxes.

The Borough Assembly had suggested that instead of the boundary presently recognized by both companies, a line be drawn at the mile 17 end of the Birchwood Loop Road to divide the Areas.

Approximately 15 local residents attended the hearing, including representatives from both Fire companies.

Assemblyman Glenn Briggs said that it soon became apparent that no agreement could be reached that night. A suggestion was made by a member of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, that rather than change the boundary, that a single service district be established in this area, with the existing volunteer groups continuing to serve the areas that they do at present, creating in effect two service districts within a service district.

Briggs said that it appeared that this latter solution seemed agreeable to most of those present.

As a result of this, the Assembly postponed action on the two proposals with the request that both Fire Companies meet and come up with a single area concept that would be agreeable to both groups.

Dale Pierson, a resident of Eagle River Loop, pointed out that the Borough Law Sec 07.15.050, permitted the election of a Fire Board from each service district, and he felt that such a board could administer the proposed single district.

Pierson also remarked on the lack of information on the subject that had been published concerning the proposed fire service areas, and also that the hearing which was taking place had not been announced in the local newspaper.

A second hearing has been scheduled for July 11th, at which time the companies will present their plan.

Briggs said that the Borough Attorney has been contacted and asked to draw up a single service district plan which will also be presented for consideration at the hearing.

From Snow To Bugs

Seems like the snow is no more than off and the bugs start in on us! The word has come to the Sourdough Gardener from Dr. Richard Washburn, entomologist at the Alaska Agricultural Experiment Station in Palmer, that the cutworms are looking strong already.

Washburn says there are two types of insects that cause most of the trouble in Alaskan gardens: those that feed below the ground on roots and stems; and those that feed on above ground stems, leaves, flowers, and roots.

Among the more common underground feeders are cutworms, root maggots and wireworms. Those that feed above ground include climbing cutworms, aphids, leafhoppers, red turnip beetles, flea beetles, and red spider mites.

Root maggots will attack most crucifers. Some species will also attack other plants. This group is the most widespread and consistent.

Root maggots need treatment every year. Chlordane applied at planting time is generally effective. It should not be applied after the eatable part of the plant begins to form.

If it is necessary to treat for root maggots later in the season diazinon is recommended. Diazinon is also recommended where insects have developed resistance to chlordane. Diazinon can be used safely until two weeks before harvesting.

Usually a teaspoon of insecticide to a gallon of water will give good results. The mixture should be kept agitated to avoid treating the plants with too high a concentration.

Cutworms vary in numbers from year to year. They can be very serious, as they attack a wide variety of flowers and vegetables. Small plants will often be cut off just below the ground surface.

Chlordane at one teaspoon to a gallon of water is probably the most satisfactory control. Since this insect is not generally found in the continental United States it may not be mentioned on the label.

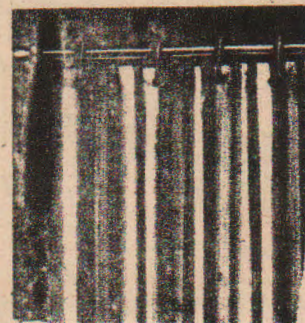

The fee for dog licenses is \$3.50 for each male dog or spayed female, and \$9.00 for each unspayed female.

Anyone owning three or more dogs must purchase a kennel license for \$10.00. This license covers each dog in the kennel, and individual licenses for each dog is then not required.

Borough Assemblyman Glenn Briggs said today, that as the first of this week, the Borough has revised its policy of not issuing individual metal dog tags to kennel owners. An individual metal tag will now be given for each dog in the kennel. Kennel operators who have applied for and received kennel licenses prior to this ruling will be mailed metal tags for their dogs. Anyone not receiving their tag should contact the Animal Control Officer.

All dogs must have been inoculated for rabies before a dog license will be issued. Dog licenses may be purchased at the Borough Office on Northern Lights Boulevard in Anchorage.

FOUR HURT IN CAR-MOOSE CRASH

FT. RICHARDSON: A Birchwood family was involved in a car moose collision, which resulted in injury to two children and two adults.

The driver of the car was Mrs. Jack Phillips (Katie) of Klondike Drive in Birchwood. Mrs. Phillips was driving a 1962 Falcon which they had purchased only a week earlier. The accident took place at 2:00pm on Sunday afternoon as the Phillips family was on their way into Anchorage to have dinner with friends.

Mrs. Phillips said that the moose just dashed in front of her car, and she was unable to avoid the collision.

Injured were her daughters Sarah, age 8, who received a cut tendon in her right arm, and Coleen age 3 1/2 who received numerous cuts about her head and face. Also injured were Mr. Phillips, who had been holding Colleen in his lap in the right front seat. He was cut on the leg. A passenger, Palmer Hoagley, of mile 14 1/2, who was sitting in the back seat with Kathleen, twin sister of Colleen, received a cut

artery in his head while attempting to shield the child from injury.

The Phillips family received assistance from a passing motorist, who help administer first aid to the injured and then transported them to the hospital.

Damage to the car was estimated at \$400. The injured moose had to be shot.



Boating Tips...



LOADING

Never step on the gunwale of a small boat (it's pronounced "gun-nel" and refers to the top edge of the boat's side). Step as nearly in the center of the craft as possible. Step aboard, don't jump, and use your hands to steady yourself. Never let your fingers come between the gunwale and dock. Don't carry your Mercury outboard or other gear aboard. Place it on the edge of the dock, get aboard, then lift the equipment in after you. If the dock is high and you are alone, consider lowering the motor into the boat with a line while standing on the dock. If the boat is pulled to shore for loading, one person should steady the boat while others climb in over the bow. Those who go aboard first should sit near the stern to raise the bow so it can be easily shoved off by the last person to climb in.

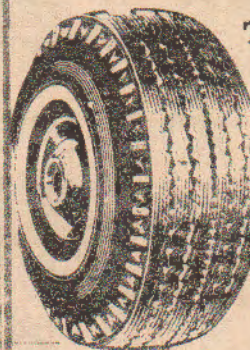

LAND AUCTION AT COPPER CENTER

The division of lands will offer 25 units of foreclosed land for sale at auction at 1 p.m. July 14 at the Copper Center roadhouse. These tracts constitute patented mining claims widely scattered throughout the Wrangell and Chugach Mountains east of the Copper River.

The division of mines and minerals has declared the mining claims to be of no known significant mineral value, however the mineral rights are included in the sale. These lands are classified as utility lands as they are considered suitable for several uses.



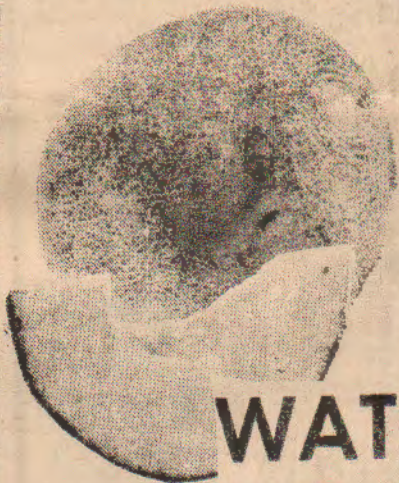

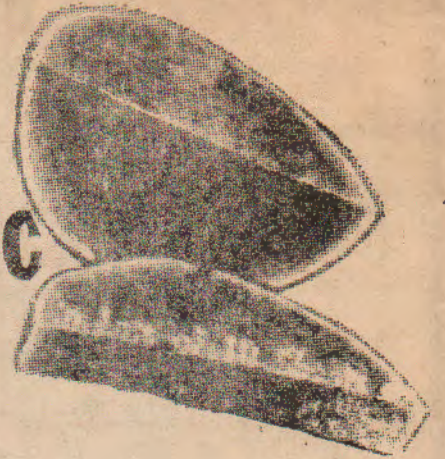

On Wednesday, July 6th, the Panthers and the Yankees meet on the home field at Chugiak while the Argels and the Eagles play at Eagle River.

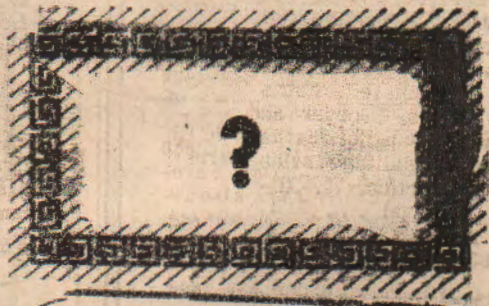

The fee for dog licenses is \$3.50 for each male dog or spayed female, and \$9.00 for each unspayed female.

Anyone owning three or more dogs must purchase a kennel license for \$10.00. This license covers each dog in the kennel, and individual licenses for each dog is then not required.

Borough Assemblyman, Glenn Briggs said today, that as of the first of this week, the Borough has revised it's policy of not issuing individual metal dog tags to kennel owners. An individual metal tag will now be given for each dog in the kennel. Kennel operators who have applied for and received kennel licenses prior to this ruling will be mailed metal tags for their dogs. Anyone not receiving their tags should contact the Animal Control Officer.

All dogs must have been inoculated for rabies before a dog license will be issued.

Dog licenses may be purchased at the Borough Office on Northern Lights Boulevard in Anchorage.
