

BRIGGS TELLS SALES TAX NEED

ANCHORAGE: At a meeting of the GAAB Assembly, a proposal by Assemblyman Glenn Briggs that the voter be asked to approve a 2% sales tax at the next election was voted down by the assembly 6 to 2.

Briggs, feels that this tax is necessary, to keep the rising costs of operating the borough schools from falling entirely on the shoulders of the real property owners.

Briggs points out that 84 7/10% of the tax bill for boroughwide services is paid by real property owners. The mill rate for 1966-67 which begins July 1st, is 10 9/10 mills for boroughwide services. Of this, 9 4/10 mills or 86 2/10% is for the support of schools. According to Briggs, this is an increase of 38.95% over the last year (1965-66) which ends June 30th. Briggs said that it is projected that the following year, there will be an increase of over 26% for boroughwide services over the 1965-67 school year, and that the following year there will be about the same increase. He added that it is projected for the foreseeable future, under the present taxing system, there will be an increase of 26% annually in tax assessment for the reason that the real property tax base is projected to increase at a rate of only 11% to 12% per year.

"86% of the increase will be for the support of schools", Briggs emphasized. "I feel very strongly that it is vitally important for the economic health of the borough that a study be made to evaluate the existing revenue source with an aim to broaden the tax base on some more equitable manner."

"I am confident in my own mind that the study will show a substantial segment of the people of the borough are not contributing to the support of boroughwide services."

"Presently because of the limitations of state statutes, sales tax is the only means by which the borough could broaden the tax base"

Briggs concluded by reminding that last October at an informal poll conducted during the regular election, of the 587 local voters, 63 1/2% favored a 2% sales tax for school purposes.

LOCAL RABIES CLINIC SCHEDULED

BIRCHWOOD: A rabies immunization clinic will be held on June 18th for the benefit of residents of the Greater Chugiak Area who wish to have their dogs immunized for the purpose of being eligible to secure dog licenses.

Dr. Jack Rasmusson, Anchorage Veterinarian will be at the Birchwood Kennels between the hours of 8:00am and 10:00am on that day to administer the rabies shots. The cost of immunization is \$5.00 per dog. Dr. Rasmusson will also be authorized to issue dog licenses at that time.

The charge for dog licenses is \$3.50 for all male dogs or spayed female dogs, and \$9.00 for unspayed females. Anyone having three or more dogs is eligible to have a kennel license at a cost of \$10. These must be secured by applying to the office of Animal Control of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough.

BANKERS LOSE ONE WIN TWO

PETERS CREEK: The Chugiak Bankers Babe Ruth team lost out 4-3, in a tightly played game with the L&K Nunaka Valley team Wednesday, June 1st at Lake Otis Field.

The visiting Bankers scored two runs in the top of the first, while the L&K nine returned to tie the score in the bottom half.

The game remained knotted at 2-2 until the 7th, when Nunaka's only error allowed Steve Jordan to reach second from where he scored on a hard double by Frank Dias.

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON By: U.S. Rep. Ralph J. Rivers

.....I will be in Homer this week to address the 47th Annual Convention of the American Legion, Department of Alaska. During my week's stay in the State I will also visit Kodiak and Anchorage.

.....As of June 1st, the House of Representatives has been in session for 77 days and has passed a total of 316 measures. Still, there is a large number of bills awaiting consideration and it is beginning to look as though Congress will remain in session through the summer months.

.....This should be the week the Senate takes final action on the House-passed measure calling for a pay raise for the Nation's Federal workers. Federal workers will be interested to know that the measure contains a provision which would enable a government employee to retire at age 55 if he has 30 years service or at age 60 after at least 20 years service.

.....Following up my action of last year, I testified before the House Armed Services Committee in opposition to an amendment to the military construction bill to authorize conversion of the power plant at Ft. Richardson and the power plant at Elmendorf Air Force Base from coal to natural gas. Congressman O.C. Fisher, of Texas is attempting to have this unbudgeted item added to the bill. If this proposed conversion were carried through it would wipe out the coal mining industry of the Matanuska Valley, as 90% of the market for coal is the fuel requirement for the military.

.....There were two key votes in the House this past week. By substantial margins, a measure to enable courts to deal more effectively with the problem of narcotic addiction and a bill to extend the Library Services Act cleared the House. I spoke in support of both pieces of legislation. The Library Serv-

Live entertainment is planned for later in the evening.



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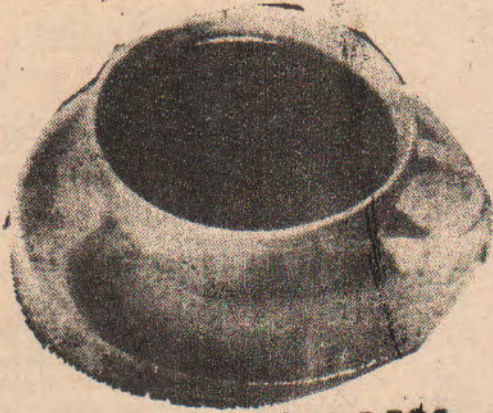

AMMENDMENT TO LOCAL FIRE DISTRICT PETITIONS SUGGESTED

ANCHORAGE: An ammendment to two petitions submitted by residents of the Greater Chugiak Area requesting that local Fire Control Districts be established, was recommended by the Administration of the GAAB assembly.

In the petitions, the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company and the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company had petitioned that the areas which each group respectively serves be designated a Fire Control District by the Borough and supported by borough taxes.

The Administration recommended that the petitions be ammended to change the boundary between the two fire districts from the precinct line at mile 15 1/4 to the south end of the Birchwood Loop and Glenn Highway at mile 17 1/2. The reason for the suggested change was to divide the area more equally between the two districts.

Ordinances were introduced at the Monday Assembly meeting providing for a public hearing on Monday July 11th on both the petitioned and the recommended fire districts. This hearing will be held in the Administration Building on Romig Hill.

It will be the responsibility of both petitioning groups to provide their proposed budgets in detail, showing their cost of operation, and to determine a tax base of the two areas and with these facts then determine what mill rate would be pu

Asse Local assemblyman Glenn Briggs, stated that if passed, the real property owners will be taxed for support of the Fire districts at the mill rate det

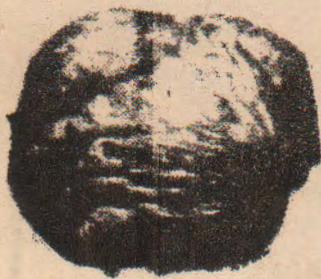

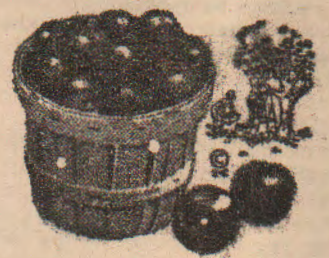
