

PHONE STRIKE NOW GOING ON

BOROUGH OKAYS TWO FIRE DISTRICTS

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough Assembly approved petitions requesting the establishment of Fire Protection Districts in the areas currently being served by the Chugiak and Eagle River Fire Companies.

The approval followed a public hearing which took place at the regular Monday meeting of the Assembly on July 11th.

The Fire Districts would cover the areas which the two local companies traditionally serve, with the boundary to be the line between the Chugiak and the Eagle River voting precincts.

The two companies must now prepare budget for approval by the Assembly, who will arrive at a mill rate which will be placed on the ballot for the approval of the voters at the October borough election.

Glenn Briggs, Assemblyman from Section One said that the assembly felt that this situation was unique in that it might be construed as stretching the powers of the borough to have such a loose arrangement whereby two nonprofit organizations enter into such an agreement with the borough.

Since there is no precedent for such an arrangement, Briggs said, it was the unanimous feeling of the Assembly that this should be accomplished with the least amount of "red tape" to eliminate as much administrative cost as possible.

The Assembly would require that a member of each company be bonded. Also a simple auditing method drawn up which would be audited once or twice a year by the fiscal department of the borough to represent the interests of the taxpayers.

CAR FIRE INFLICTS DAMAGE

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company responded to a call on July 7th at the Dorman residence on Eagle River Road.

They found an older model car which had been parked on the Dorman property was on fire.

The fire was extinguished, but the interior of the car was gutted. The origin of the fire was undetermined.

PALMER: The threatened strike by the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers against the Matanuska Telephone Association is now in effect, following a breakdown in negotiations last Friday.

The union and MTA were unable to reach an agreement on a contract.

The Union is asking a three year contract with a 4% increase in pay the first year, a 4% increase the second year and 3% the third year. They are also asking that MTA assume one half the cost of the Health and Welfare program.

Max Clement, manager for MTA stated that board feels that the present salary is adequate.

The IBOE have stationed pickets at the Eagle River and Palmer offices of MTA.

Clement said that phone service would continue uninterrupted, with members of MTA management answering outages and trouble calls. There might be some effect on installations and moves, he added.

Negotiations are scheduled to be resumed next Friday, at which time an agreement may be reached.

LOCAL FAMILY HAS HARROWING EXPERIENCE

CHUGIAK: A local family underwent a harrowing experience while on a camping trip over the July 4th weekend.

The parents and two small daughters were camping at mile 84 on the Glenn Highway. The two children were asleep in a small tent, while the mother and father were in sleeping bags on camp cots at the entrance of the tent.

The mothers said that she was awakened by the insistent whispering of the older child. When she inquired what the child wanted, the youngster said that a large dog had bitten her. The mother thought the child might be dreaming, when she looked up and saw the "dog" near the head of her own cot. It was a brown bear, approximately 3 or 4 years old. The mother said that she struggled to get out of her sleeping bag, the zipper of which had jammed, calling to her husband all the while. He finally awakened and realizing the situation, managed to drive the bear away with the only weapon available, a camp hatchet.

The bear had apparently attempted to claw its way into the back of the tent and had clawed the seven year old girl on the top of the head.

CAMP TRAILER DESTROYED IN HIGHWAY WRECK

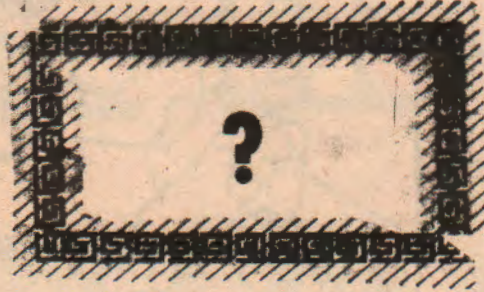
EKLUTNA: A camp trailer was completely destroyed when a car sideswiped the vehicle towing it, and crashed into the trailer.

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON

I am informed that the House Committee on Appropriations will clear the fiscal 1967 Rivers and Harbors Appropriations Bill for Floor consideration shortly after Congress returns from its July 4 holiday. I have asked the Committee to approve \$2,120,000 for 31 Alaska rivers and harbors projects, including \$1.3 million for starting construction of the Snettisham hydroelectric project.

House and Senate conferees have resolved their differences with regard to the legislation to amend and extend the Library Services and Construction Act, and the measure has been cleared for Presidential action. As a sponsor of this legislation, I was, of course, quite pleased to see it win the approval of Congress prior to June 30, when the present Library Services and Construction Act was due to expire.

Taking advantage of a Congressional recess during the July 4 holiday, I have returned to Alaska where I will spend the next ten days. My schedule calls for me to be in Anchorage, Fairbanks, Nome, Unalakleet and Kotzebue this week. Last weekend I visited Ketchikan, Juneau and Sitka with the Public Land Law Review Commission, which is presently holding hearings in Alaska.

In the "key vote of the week" the House of Representatives, by a 374-10 vote, passed and sent to the Senate the bill to extend and improve the Federal-State unemployment compensation program. The bill — which I supported — extends coverage of the Federal-State unemployment insurance system to an estimated 3.5 million additional workers and establishes a permanent program of extended benefits to workers who exhaust their basic entitlement to unemployment compensation benefits during periods of high unemployment. The bill was rewritten by the Ways and Means Committee, which deleted controversial provisions before bringing it to the Floor.

The newest addition to my staff is Mary T. Walsh, of Ketchikan, who is serving as a summer intern. Mary is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Walsh and attends Portland University. She recently completed a year of study in Europe.

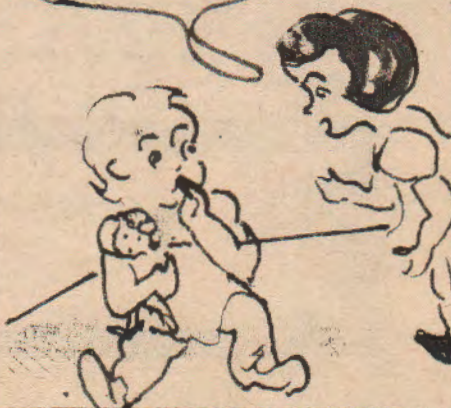

BANKERS CINCH FOR SECOND

PETERS CREEK: Second place in the East Division of the Anchorage Babe Ruth League was cinched by Eagle River Branch of First National Bank with two wins the past week.

On Friday the Chugiak Bankers downed Lottsfeldt and Kyzer Equipment 4 to 3, with Ron Tyson bringing in the winning run in the bottom of the 7th inning. His double to left field brought a wide throw to 2nd base which allowed him to score when the ball rolled into the outfield.

Winning pitcher Rick Stephens gave up four hits. Taking the loss for Nunaka was Kip Lewis.

The division leading Fifth Avenue Chrysler team from City View, were over run 16 to 11 by the Bankers last night in a makeup game rained out last Wednesday. The Bankers started off with 6 runs in the first inning off losing pitcher Kip Watsvold and stayed in front the full seven innings.

RESIDENT REQUIREMENT SHORTENED

Secretary of State Hugh J. Wade reports that Alaska voters, in addition to nominating party candidates for statewide and legislative offices in the August 23 primary election, will also vote on a proposed constitutional amendment to permit passage of legislation shortening residence requirements for persons voting for U.S. President and Vice President.

The Alaska State Constitution presently provides that a person must have been a resident of Alaska for at least a year prior to becoming eligible to vote in state or local elections. According to Wade, the proposed amendment would make it possible for the Legislature to enact a law permitting new residents of the State to vote for President and Vice President after fulfilling a shorter residence requirement, which would be determined by the Legislature. However, such voters still would not be allowed to vote for state offices or the U.S. Congress. Wade pointed out

The proposed amendment will go on the primary ballot in compliance with Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, passed by the Senate in the 1965 session, and by the House in the 1966 session. The resolution directs that the amendment be placed before the voters of the state at the next statewide election. If approved by a majority of the voters, the amendment will become effective 30 days after certification of the election returns by the Secretary of State.

Secretary Wade said similar provisions for a "shot ballot" have been made in the voting laws of a number of other states. The main purpose of such a provision is to keep persons who have moved within a year of a presidential election from losing their right to vote for President. Under the present system, a person moving to Alaska from another state less than a year before a presidential election not only would have given up his voting rights in the other state, but also still would not qualify to vote in Alaska. He would therefore not have the right to vote for President in any state. Wade said it has been estimated that more than one million voters in the U.S. were disenfranchised for this reason in 1964.

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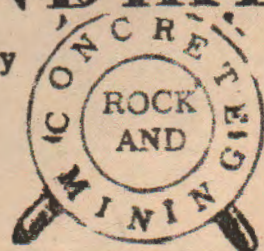


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Mr. and Mrs. Reese Tatro of Peters Creek have returned to spend the summer at their home on Mirror Lake.

FIRST GRADERS MUST HAVE PHYSICALS

ANCHORAGE: According to a new Anchorage Borough School District policy approved at last week's meeting of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough School Board, every child entering first grade this fall must have had a physical examination between March 1, 1966 and August 29th, 1966, before he will be permitted to enroll and enter school on August 29th.

Health examinations for entering first graders, are required under Alaska State Law.

In addition to the medical examination, the first grade students must receive small pox and DPT (diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough) immunizations.

All medical doctors in the Anchorage area have copies of the required examination form.

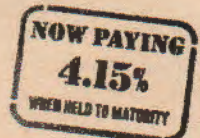

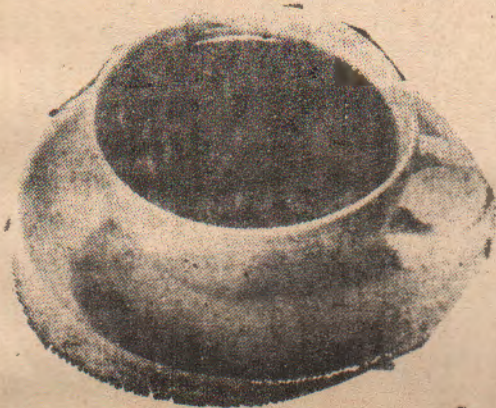

Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor,

During the years that I have parked my airplane at Birchwood Airstrip it has been tampered with, drained of gas, had holes punched in it, and had every loose article in it stolen. This has not happened just once, but repeatedly.

Although it is recommended that the tanks be kept full to minimize water condensation in the fuel system, this cannot be done since thieves quickly siphon the gas and at times leave the tank caps off for rain and snow to enter. Every drop of gasoline that goes into an aircraft must be strained through a chamois to remove water and other sediment. A dirty old siphon hose inserted into a plane's tank could deposit dangerous foreign matter which may cause engine falter or failure. Engine falter or failure on take off (the most likely time for sediment to obstruct fuel flow) results in a high percentage of really serious and often fatal accidents.

Several times emergency equipment and survival rations have been taken from my aircraft. Flares appear to hold special appeal to the thieves. Canned concentrated survival rations are usually opened on the spot and when found to be not especially palatable, are strewn, along with the can upon the ground in the vicinity of the aircraft.

A small fire extinguisher (the loss of which could well result the loss of the plane some cold day), along with a tire pump, aircraft registration papers, axe, radio head-set and miscellaneous tools and articles, have from time to time been stolen from my plane. Conversation with other aircraft owners at Birchwood indicates that every aircraft on the strip has been looted at one time or another. The value of articles stolen and damage to aircraft at Birchwood will, I am sure, amount to thousands of dollars.

Locking the aircraft is not the answer. Thieves could inflict disabling damage to an airplane by their efforts to enter and steal items of only small value.

The gasoline thieves are obviously old enough to be driving cars. The persons stealing small articles and emergency equipment could well be teenage or sub-teen children. These thieves, of whatever age, obviously do not know just how serious a crime they commit when they loot or tamper with an airplane. Our understaffed and overworked State Police are aware that the aircraft at Birchwood are being looted and tampered with, but even at sixteen hours a day, it is impossible for them to find much time to patrol the area. Since it appears that most of the looting and tampering is the work of children, I feel that all parents must face the responsibility of at least informing their children just how serious and dangerous aircraft looting and tampering can be.

A recent issue of the Frontiersman of Palmer carried an article citing aircraft tampering which may have caused a serious crash. This article also emphasized, better than I am capable, the serious nature of such crimes. You will do your readers a genuine service by printing the item titled "Tampering with Aircraft is Federal Aviation Sabotage."

(Editor's note: The following is reprinted from the Palmer Frontiersman July 7th, 1966.)

"Reports are yet unconfirmed but the May 28 plane crash just off the Palmer Air Strip which hospitalized local pilot Norman Stadem with a broken nose and undertermindd back injury may be attributed to an empty gas tank from which fuel is believed to have been stolen. If so the persons involved in this offence must face a charge of Federal Aviation Sabatoge when apprehended.

According to information received from safety agent George Chapman, tampering with aircraft of U.S. registry or emergency gear or aircraft fuel or supplies was made a federal offense, as well as he could remember, in 1958 after a Denver resident named Graham sabotoged a commercial plane killing some forty-seven persons.

The Ari-Pacer in which Stadem crashed belonged to the Matanuska Flying Club and according to reports made by officers of the club one of the gas tanks was empty. It is a club regulation the tanks are filled

after a plane has been taken out by club members. This is done as a safety factor as well as a precaution against condensation in a partially filled gas tank.

Last week Mason LaZelle, general manager of the Matanuska Electric Association, reported the loss of gas from both the M.E.A. plane and his personal craft, saying that about 10 gallons had been siphoned from each. LaZelle had been airborne for several minutes before he could positively determine the loss which forced him to return for refueling because he would probably have run out of gas before reaching his destination.

Other persons reporting losses of gas from fuel tanks on their planes are Miles France, Ray Robinson and the Matanuska Flying Club. Such tampering is considered sabotage and the death penalty for such violation, as in the Graham case, can be demanded.

State Police are investigating.

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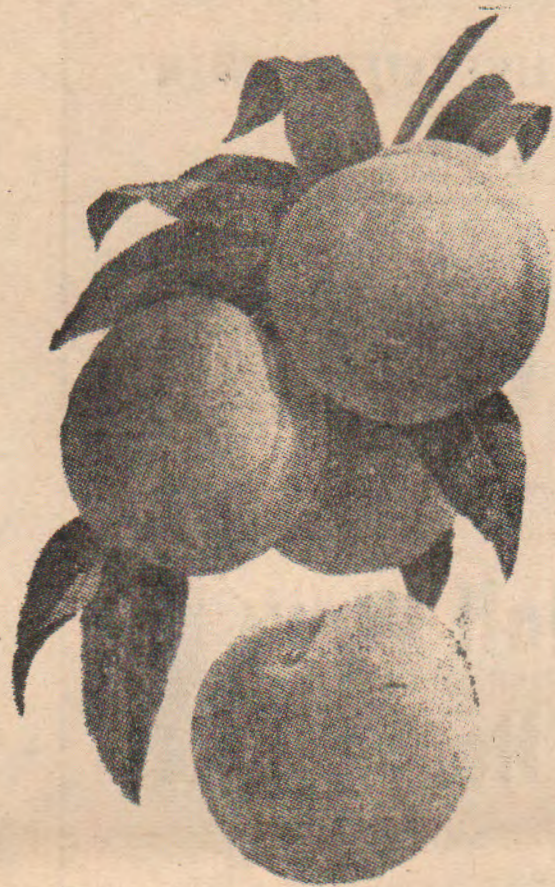
