**PETERS CREEK:** A violent disagreement among several boat owners on Mirror Lake last Sunday, led State Police to issue a warning to all local residents who use this popular recreation area for swimming and boating.

The rhubarb was instigated by an airboat, powered by a 180 horsepower aircraft type engine, which apparently created heavy wakes which threatened to swamp many of the smaller boats.

When the State Police arrived, having been summoned by an unidentified party, they found a number of the boats engaged in a "naval battle" with the airboat, trying to swamp it with their wakes.

According to the State Trooper, this was creating a very dangerous situation, to the smaller boats, the swimmers and all concerned.

The trooper was able to talk to the individuals involved in the disagreement, and convince them that their behavior was both dangerous and childish. However, he was alarmed at the complete absence of water safety being observed by the individuals using the lake.

The proximity of Mirror Lake to Anchorage, and its accessibility to the highway, has made it a mecca to boating enthusiasts from that city, as well as from the local area. On a warm sunny day, such as last Sunday, the surface of the lake is literally covered with boats ranging from high powered cruisers to kayaks. This, with the water-skiers and swimmers adds up to a potential water hazard.

The state police pointed out that there has already been a near drowning at Mirror Lake this year, and in view of the other drownings which took place in the State this past weekend, they predict that Mirror Lake could very well be the site of the next tragedy.

It was felt that this situation should be brought to the attention of the local residents, with the hope that more caution and water safety will be exercised.

The items taken from the Brown home were found to be in Johnson's possession. All the stolen items were recovered and are being held by the State Police as evidence.

 APPRAISALS FOR

**ANCHORAGE:** Appraisals are now in progress for the purchase of the right of way for the new highway which will by-pass most of the Chugiak area between Eagle River and Peters Creek.

This is to be a limited access road, and will be built through the Birchwood area, leaving the present Glenn Highway just south of the Far North Service and re-joining it at Peters Creek.

According to Mr. Cosby Steen, bids will be advertised for later this fall, with construction scheduled to begin next spring. Mr. Steen estimates that it will take at least two seasons to complete the project.

The present Glenn Highway will be maintained as a secondary road following the completion of the By-pass.

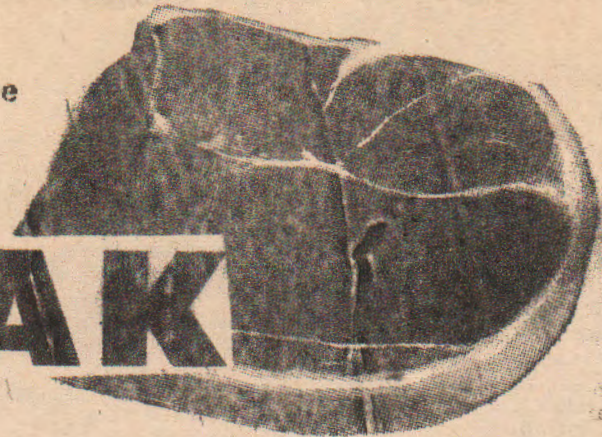

**BOROUGH ASSEMBLY ASKS RE-DISTRICTING**

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Borough Assembly at their semi-monthly meeting last Monday instructed the Borough Attorney to draw up an ordinance providing for the adjustment of the boundaries of borough sections 1 and 2 and sections 5 and 6, to comply with A.S. 07.30.100, which states that no section may have a number of voters which is less than one half of that of any other section.

This ordinance will be presented at a special session on July 25th, with a public hearing to be set for two weeks later.

If the ordinance is adopted, a portion of the Muldoon area, with a population of 2,600 would be made a part of Section One (Greater Chugiak Area). Likewise a portion of Section Five with a population of 800 would be added to Section Six.

At this meeting the Assembly also turned down a resolution which would not have allowed an Assemblyman to also serve as a member of the State Legislature.

BIRCHWOOD: The Chugiak High School Gym Recreation program is getting more support all the time, according to Andy Kirk, recreation director.

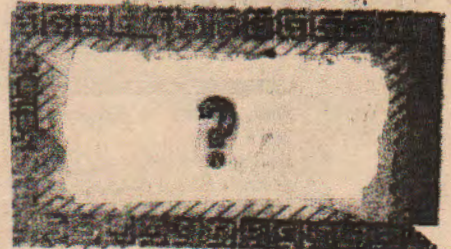
Kirk said that the first day the gym was opened on July 5th, not one single person showed up. However, he added, after about a week, the word got around and now a couple of dozen people participate every time.

## BOROUGH MAY TAKE OVER SANITARY FILL

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough may take over the operation of the local Sanitary Fill (dump) which is located one mile south of the Eagle River bridge.

This dump is currently being operated by John Grasse under contract to the Chugiak Benefit Association.

According to Glenn Briggs, Assemblyman from Section One, he recently visited the site of the dump in the company of Borough Assembly Chairman John Asplund.

The two inspected the dump area, and found it to be in an extremely unsanitary condition, with trash and garbage strewn uncovered along the road to the dump, and the fill pit standing uncovered.

Briggs said that he had contacted the Chugiak Benefit Association to obtain their official approval for the cancelling of Grasse's contract.

According to Briggs, Grasse had failed to live up to his contract obligations on at least three counts; namely, he had not paid CBA the contracted percentage of dumping fees, neither had he kept the dump open sufficient hours a week to make it convenient for the use of the local community, nor had he kept the area filled and covered according to the sanitary standards set.

Briggs said that the borough can operate the dump under the Health District authorization. If the borough does take over this facility, it would be made into a free dump available to all residents of the Borough at all times.

"It is not possible to expect the residents of the borough to keep their streets and yards free of trash, unless an adequate place is provided for them to dispose of it," Briggs concluded.

### FIRST GRADERS MUST HAVE PHYSICALS

ANCHORAGE: According to a new Anchorage Borough School District policy approved at last week's meeting of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough School Board, every child entering first grade this fall must have had a physical examination between March 1, 1966 and August 29th, 1966, before he will be permitted to enroll and enter school on August 29th.


Health examinations for entering first graders, are required under Alaska State Law.

In addition to the medical examination, the first grade students must receive small pox and DPT (diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough) immunizations.

All medical doctors in the Anchorage area have copies of the required examination form.

Copies of the queen contest rules and regulations as well as contest entry blanks may be obtained at this time.

Ticket sales will not be considered in the final judging for the selection of the queen, Mrs. Charlene Kockritz, general chairman, said. However, candidates must sell 300 tickets in order to qualify, and the contestant selling the greatest number of tickets will receive a special prize.

The queen will receive \$350 in prize money, with the first runner up receiving \$200 and the second runner-up \$100. A special trophy will be awarded to Miss Congeniality.

Contest rules and regulations are patterned after the Miss America contest and the winner of the state fair contest will be eligible to compete in the Miss Alaska pageant in Anchorage in February.

The entrant must be single, never married or never had a marriage annulled.

She must be a high school graduate and 18 years of age on or before Sept. 1, 1967 but not over 28 years of age.

She must abide by the rules and regulations of the local contest now in effect or to be announced later, and she must agree that the time, manner and method of judging of the contest will be solely within the discretion of the Alaska State Fair, Inc. queen contest committee and that the decision of the judges will be final.

The entrant must have been a resident of the state for the past six months. This rule will be waived only for the contestants who are residents of the area but who are attending school in another state. In this case her residence will be acknowledged to be that of her parents.

She must not have competed in more than one official preliminary contest this year.

The contestant must possess a talent, which she will display in a three minute routine. This talent may be singing, dancing, playing a musical instrument, dramatic reading, art display, dress designing or a three minute talk on the career she wishes to pursue.

The queen will be selected during the queen's pageant on Sept. 3, at 8 p.m. in Central school gym.

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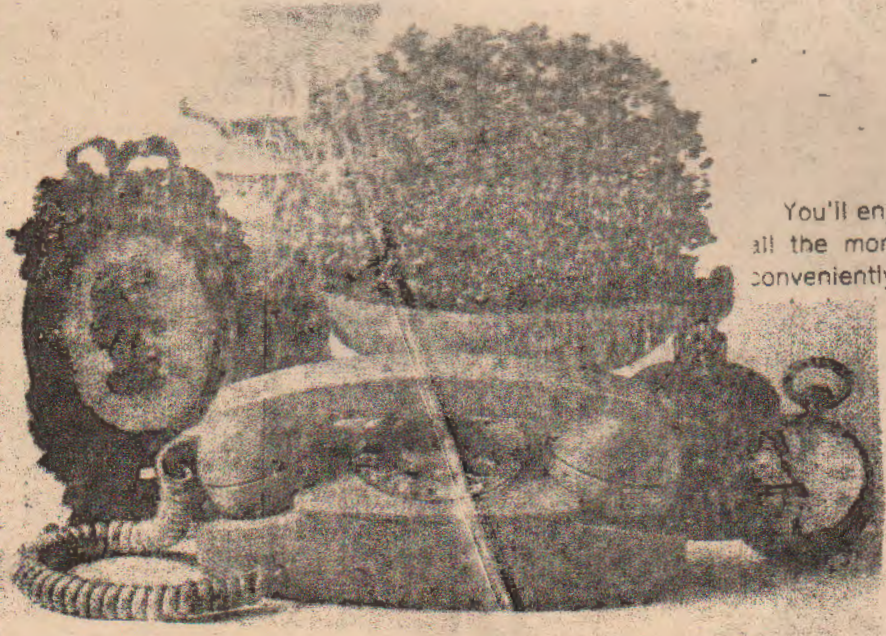
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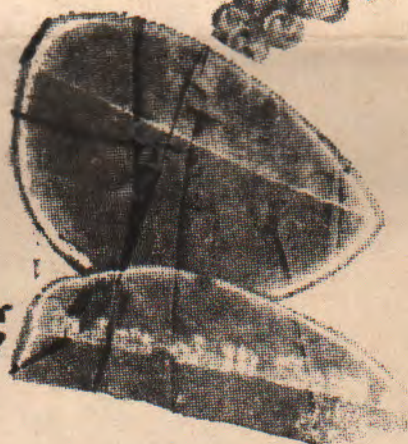
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
