PETERS CREEK: A violent disagreement among several boatowners on Mirror Lake last Sunday, led State Police to issue a warning to all local residents who use this popular recreation area for swimming and boating.

The rhubarb was instigated by an airboat, powered by a 180 horse-power aircraft type engine, which apparently created heavy wakes which threatened to swamp many of the smaller boats.

When the State Police arrived, having been summoned by an uniden-tified party, they found a number of the boats engaged in a "naval battle"

the boats engaged in a "naval battle" with the airboat, trying to swamp it with their wakes.

According to the State Trooper, this was creating a very dangerous situation, to the smaller boats, the swimmers and all concerned.

The trooper was able to talk to the individuals involved in the disagreement, and convince them that their behavior was both dangerous and childish. However, he was and childish. However, he was alarmed at the complete absence of water safety being observed by the individuals using the lake.

The proximity of Mirror Lake to Anchorage, and it's accessibility to the highway, has made it a mecca to boating enthusiasts from that city, as well as from the local area. On a warm sunny day, such as last Sunday, the surface of the lake is literally covered with boats ranging from high powered cruisranging from high powered cruis-ers to kayaks. This, with the waterskiers and swimmers adds up to a potential water hazard.

The state police pointed out that there has already been a near drowning a: Mirror Lake this year, and in view of the other drownings which took place in the State this past weekend, they predict that Mirror Lake could very well be the site of the next fragedy.



#### BOROUGH ASSEMBLY ASKS RE-DISTRICTING

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Borough Assembly at their semi-monthly meeting last Monday instructed the Borough Attorned to draw up an ordinance providing for the adjustment of the boundaries of borough sections 1 and 2 and sections 5 and 6, to comply with A.S. 07.30.100, which states that no section may have a number of voters which is less than one half of that of any other section.

This ordinance will be presented at a special session on July 25th,

at a special session on July 25th, with a public hearing to be set for two weeks later.

If the ordinance is adopted, a portion of the Muldoon area, with a population of 2,600 would be made a part of Section One (Greater Chugiak Ares). Likewise a aportion of Section Five with a population of 800 would be added to Section Six.

At this meeting the Assembly also turned down a resolution which would not have allowed an Assemblyman to also serve as a member of the State Legislature.

Kirk said that the first day the gym was opened on July 5th, not one single person showed up. However, he added, after about a week, the word got around and now a couple of dozen people participate every time.



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#### KEN HULING RECOVERS FROM SURGERY

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#### BOROUGH MAY TAKE OVER SANITARY FILL

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough may take over the operation of the local Sanitary Fill (dump) which is located one mile south of the Eagle River bridge.

This dump is currently being op-erated by John Grasse under con-tract to the Chugiak Benefit Associstion.

According to Glenn Briggs, Assemblyman from Section One, he recently visited the site of the dump in the company of Borough

Assembly Chairman John Asplund. The two inspected the dump area, and found it to be in an extremely unsanitary condition, with trash and garbage strewn uncovered along the road to the dump, and the fill pit standing uncovered.

Briggs said that he had contacted the Chugiak Benefit Association to obtain their official approval for the

cancelling of Grasse's contract, According to Birggs, Grasse had failed to live up to his contract obligations on at least three counts; namely, he had not paid CBA the contracted percentage of dumping fees, neither had he kept the dum open sufficient hours a week to make it convenient for the use of the local community, nor had he kept the area filled and covered according to the sanitary standards set.

Briggs said that the borough can operate the dump under the Health District authorization. If the bor-ough does take over this facility, it would be made into a free dump available to all residents of the Borough at all times.

"It is not possible to expect the residents of the borough to keep their streets and yards free of trash, unless an adequate place is provided for them to dispose of it' Briggs concluded.


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


