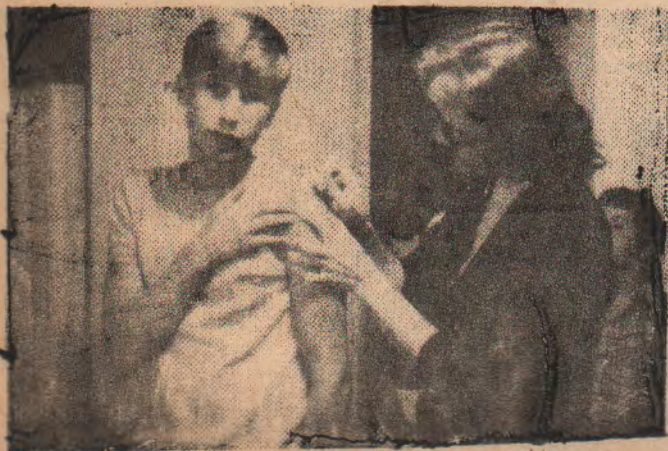


HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS MUST REGISTER

BIRCHWOOD: All students planning to attend Chugiak High School must pre-register, according to a statement from the school administration.

Students who will be attending CHS for the first time (regardless of whether they attended other district high schools last year or not) will register on Wednesday, August 17th (today) and Thursday, August 18th between the hours of 9:00am and 8:00pm. Students who attended Chugiak High School last year will pre-register on Monday, August 22nd from 9:00am until 8:00pm and on Tuesday August 23rd from 9am until 5pm.

Any students who register unaccompanied by their parents, must be prepared to give information as to their parents home and business phone numbers and addresses, parents employer etc.

No schedules will be given out until the first day of school.

LOCAL PRECINCT OFFICIALS NAMED

CHUGIAK: Officials for the six local voting precincts were named today, by Ruth Callen, election supervisor.

Chairman for the newly formed Eagle River Valley voting precinct is Mrs. Ralph (Louis) Long. Democratic Judge is Joyce Willis, Republican Judge, Jo Frankfourth and Clerk Carol Jones.

The polling place for the Eagle River Valley precinct is the rear building of the Eagle River Inn at the crest of the Eagle River Hill south of the bridge. Residents of the area to the east of Meadowcreek and south of the Eagle River will vote in this precinct.

Chairman for the Eagle River voting precinct is Pat Railing, Democratic Judge, Jeanette Beatty, Republican Judge, Eunice Vrem, and clerk Mary Lou Briggs. The polling place for his precinct is the Eagle River Elementary School. All persons living west of Meadow creek, north of the Eagle River, and south of the precinct line at mile 15 1/2 will vote in this precinct.

Chairman for the Chugiak voting precinct is Jewel Deal, Democratic Judge is Fanny Frye, Republican Judge is Polly Kallenbert and clerk is Noretta Kamholz. The polling place for this precinct is the Chugiak Elementary School. All persons living north of the precinct line, south of Peters Creek, and east of the Bureau of Reclamation

LOCAL RESIDENTS TO VOTE FOR FIRE DISTRICTS

ANCHORAGE: At the polls on October 4th, voters of the Chugiak-Birchwood - Peters Creek - Fire Lake and of the Eagle River Area will be asked to approve or disapproved a two mill tax levy on all personal and real property of their respective fire service districts for the support of their Volunteer fire Companies for the calendar year commencing January 1, 1967, according to Borough Assemblyman Glenn Briggs.

The Assessed valuation of the Chugiak-Birchwood-Peters-Creek-Fire Lake area (Fire District #8) January 1, 1966 was \$6,966,937; and District #9) \$8,505,155. It can be assumed that the tax base will not change greatly during the tax year 1967.

A two-mill tax on property of the Chugiak area would provide \$13,933.74, in revenue for the operation of that district. The budget as submitted for operation in 1967 totals \$10,182.47.

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A two-mill tax on property of Eagle River Area would provide \$17,010.23 in revenue. No budget has been submitted as yet by the Eagle River Fire Company to show how its funds would be spent.

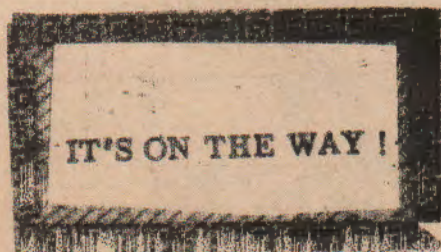
LOCAL STATE POLICE AID FBI IN ARREST

EAGLE RIVER: Local State Troopers assisted the FBI in capturing two deserters from the Navy who had taken refuge in this community.

The pair, William Richard Sharp age 18 and William Huff age 20 were also wanted by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police for illegal crossing of the border, and by the Montana Sheriff Department for the burglary of several firearms.

When the police located Sharp he was visiting with an Eagle River family with whom he had been acquainted when he had lived in the community some time in the past. The local family was unaware of his involvement with the law. The second deserter Huff, was captured when the local trooper spotted him walking down the street in front of the troopers home.

Three FBI agents and two local troopers had been assigned to the case.

VACATION DRIVING TIPS

If you are planning a vacation trip, you should devote special attention to how you plan to drive, if you want to do all you can to have a safe journey for you and your family, says commissioner Martin B. Underwood of the department of public safety.

First of all, before you start that vacation trip, make certain the vehicle you drive is a safe one, he said. The best way to do this is to have it safety-checked by a mechanic. Sustained high speeds on the highway place great stress on vehicle parts, and that safety-check is insurance against equipment failure.

Next, share the road. Courtesy is protection against the mistakes and carelessness of other drivers. Only the rude and careless driver considers courtesy to be "backing down" from the other driver.

Third, drive defensively—drive to prevent accidents. Obey all signs and adjust driving to conditions of weather, traffic and road. Make a special effort to be alert to everything happening around you. Expect mistakes from others and do not depend upon signs to control the actions of the other driver.

Fourth, be particularly careful when passing. Always signal and never pass until you are certain there is ample room to do so. When in doubt, don't pass.

Fifth, be especially watchful at intersections. The majority of accidents occur here. Don't trust anybody when your life is at stake.

Finally, don't drive when tired. On long trips, stop every two or three hours for a stretch or a cup of coffee. On any vacation trip, plan all of your stops in advance.

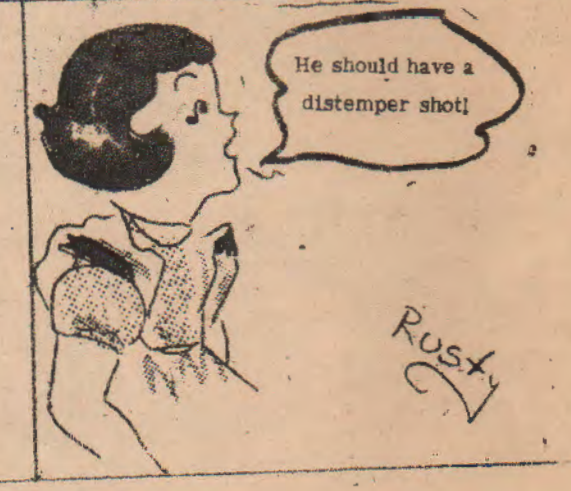
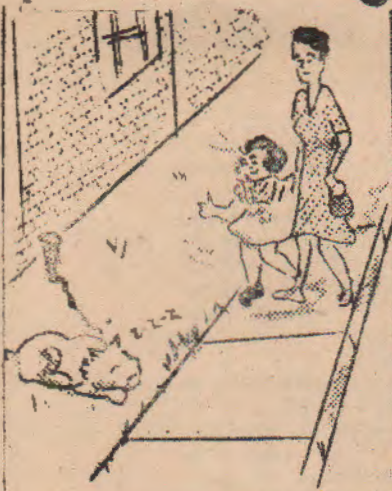

Wet Behind The Ears

A long-time, well-known Alaskan faces a stiff battle in the primary election this year.

Representative Ralph Rivers, who has consistently been considered a "cinch" in all previous primary elections, apparently faces a well-financed, versatile opponent in Mike Gravel.

From different areas around the state it appears that the vote for House of Representatives in the primary election will be a close one. While Gravel has been going full-tilt campaigning throughout the state, Rep. Rivers has been staying in his Washington office working for the good of his constituents.

Perhaps Rivers cannot match the flamboyant, "rock and roll" tactics of the younger candidate from Anchorage, but River's sincerity and dedication to his obligations far outshadow attributes of the challenger.

It is unwise to assume that anyone elected to the United States House of Representatives from Alaska is going to set Washington on fire. One lone vote is not much of a weapon in the traditional arena of trading.

What Mr. Gravel might hope to accomplish that Rivers has not is beyond our comprehension.

Actually about the only thing that will aid Alaska in the House of Representatives is seniority and nothing else—unless we can add a few million to our population.

Rivers has the seniority so vitally necessary in the Jungle of Politics. Gravel would be going to Washington without portfolio, so to speak.

Democratic party members, presently split throughout the State in the Egan versus Kay hassle, would do well to count their blessings and dump Mr. Gravel from the ballot in the primary election.

If a Democrat is to be elected to the House, Ralph Rivers would far outshine his opponent, who undoubtedly could use a bit of drying behind the ears.

POSTAL BOX ADDRESS OKAY FOR ABSENTEES

Attorney General Warren C. Colver announced this week that a voter who votes by absentee ballot may properly indicate a post office box number and city as his Alaska address.

Some confusion has resulted because the form accompanying the absentee ballots indicates that a post office box number is not acceptable as an address. Secretary of State Hugh J. Wade has indicated that the canvassing boards prefer a street or rural route address so that residency may be more conveniently checked, if a voter's residency is challenged. An absentee ballot may not, however, be rejected, Colver stated, because it contains a post office box number instead of a street number or rural route.

The Secretary of State's office has directed that the prohibition against use of box numbers will be blocked out of ballots sent out. Voters who already have absentee ballots are urged to disregard this prohibition and to send in their ballots indicating their address by street number, rural route, or post office box number.

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BIDS ASKED FOR WHITTIER TUNNEL

Sealed bids are invited for an Army contract for drilling a tunnel for the Whittier-Anchorage pipeline approximately 13-100 feet with a minimum seven foot diameter.

The project will include the construction of access roads, landing areas, snowsheds, portals and a subdrainage system. All tunnel and portal work is to be completed by July 1, 1967 so that pipeline may be installed by others.

Bids will be opened August 30.

AUGUST IS IMMUNIZATION MONTH

EAGLE RIVER: August is the month to bring all immunization shots up to date, according to Etta Thurmond, Public Health Nurse for the Greater Chugiak Area.

To facilitate this, Mrs. Thurmond has scheduled special immunization clinics every Friday from 9:00am to 3:00pm in her office in the basement of the Eagle River Baptist Church.

Regular immunization clinics will be held as scheduled. The first Wednesday of the Month from 1:00pm to 3:30pm at the Eagle River Baptist Church, the 2nd Wednesday of the Month at the LDS Church across from the Chugiak Grade School, and the 3rd Saturday of the month from 10am to 12 noon at the Eagle River Baptist Church.

SCHOOL PROBLEMS EXPLAINED TO BCC

BIRCHWOOD: Water problems at the Chugiak High School were explained to the Birchwood Community Club at the home of club President Charles Richner Monday night.

Dale Pierson, of the GAAB School Board explained to the thirty persons present that the Chugiak High School had been constructed by the State of Alaska, and that the water surveys made at the time offered scant information. He went on to say that the borough is trying to rectify this situation, but until further studies are made no solution is in sight.

Pierson also explained that the construction of the Birchwood elementary school had been delayed due to two reasons. Foremost was the lack of a certificate of entry from the Federal Government, and second was the lack of water study. He explained that an adequate water supply was considered to be fifteen gallons per day per student. Other information derived from Pierson's talk was the fact that Chugiak Elementary school was the only one in the borough which would be using quonset huts this coming year. This was to avoid the necessity of having double shifts.

Barney Sabo, Principal of Chugiak High School was present at the meeting, and he explained school budgeting from a Principals standpoint, as opposed to the school board's standpoint as presented by Mr. Pierson.

Delegates from the Birchwood Community Club will attend the next meeting of the GAAB school board which will take place on September 14th.

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LOCAL DOGS DO WELL AT OBEDIENCE TRIALS

ANCHORAGE: Locally owned dogs did well at the Obedience Trials held by the Anchorage Obedience Training Club last Sunday at the Park Strip.

Out of the 52 dogs entered, nine were owned by Chugiak Trainers.

George Scott, of Birchwood took highest scoring Great Dane, and his dog earned a second leg on his C.D. qualification. Other local owners whose dogs qualified were Mrs. Kenneth Rouse of Eagle River, Mrs. Ralph Rollins of Fire Lake and Mrs. Keith Osborne of Eagle River.

In the Novice class A (beginners) first place went to David Goode of Anchorage whose Shetland Sheep dog chalked up 196 points.

In the Novice class B (advanced) first place went to Betty Webley of Anchorage with her German Shepherd "Tony" with 187 points, second place to Christa Burg of Birchwood with her German Shepherd "Teddy" with 185 points, Third place to Gloria Jones and her dog of Anchorage, and Fourth place to Roscoe Robey of Peters Creek with his Irish Setter "Mona."

DRIVER IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM PLANNED

The proposed two mill assessment for fire protection service should be considered as part and parcel of the over all tax picture of the area, Briggs explained.

For the tax year 1966-67 an assessment of 10.9 mills was required for borough wide services. Schools alone take a 9.4 mill slice of the pie. The remaining 1.5 mills pays the cost of borough administration, assessment and collection of taxes, planning and zoning, Health services and dog control.

A stabilized mill rate of taxation for support of schools will not come in the foreseeable future, Briggs went on to say. Costs of schools will continue to rise. A 3 mill tax increase for support of schools is projected for 1967-67 which would boost the cost of boroughwide services to 13.9 mills, allowing no increase for other services. An additional 2 mill tax for fire service would bring the total tax assessment on property next year to 15.9 mills, an increase of 62% over the current year.

Briggs concluded saying, "Until the Borough can broaden its tax base there is some question in the minds of many tax payers whether it is reasonable to ask property owners to assume at this time a 2 mill tax for support of the fire districts."

VANDAL STEALS FROM FIRE LAKE CABIN

FIRE LAKE: A larceny was reported to State Police by Grace E. Collins of mile 17 1/2 in the Fire Lake Area.

A 25 pound propane bottle had been stolen from the cabin and the interior of the building vandalized.

The police are investigating the incident.

Department of Public Safety Commissioner Martin B. Underwood has announced the completion of the first phase of the nationwide driver improvement program sponsored by the National Safety Council— another step in an effort to reduce the high traffic fatality, injury, and accident rate in Alaska, he said.

Commissioner Underwood said approximately thirty instructors were recently trained in Juneau by members of the National Safety Council. These instructors were selected from the various state and federal agencies throughout the state and are now

preparing to hold classes in their respective areas.

All drivers who are interested in attending one of the driver improvement courses to increase their driving knowledge and skills are invited to contact the offices of either the Alaska state police or the department of highways nearest to them.

All state and federal employees driving on government business will be required to complete the course.

"I am deeply concerned," Commissioner Underwood said, "over the tragically rising toll of accidental deaths on our highways."

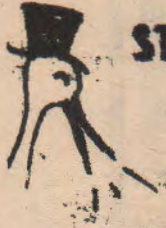

BOROUGH CRACKS DOWN ON TAX EVADERS

ANCHORAGE: The Borough Assessment department has started a crack down on personal property owners who fail or refuse to list their personal property.

Criminal suits were filed last week by Borough Attorney Vic Carlson against Tacktt's House Moving, Mort Clements, Alan Gruchow, Dean Settels and Raymond Burt for failure to report in 1965 or 1966. Items not reported include trucks, cars, a house trailer and a Piper Super Cub airplane.

Borough Assessor Glenn McKee states that property owners who fail to file are given ample opportunity in all cases to late file before his Department resorts to this legal means of collecting.

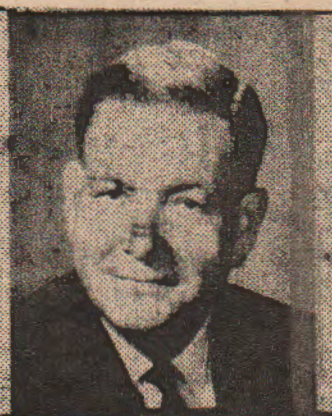

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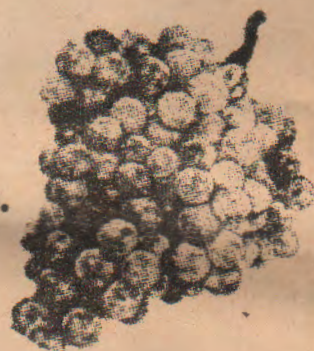
