BIRCHWOOD: Crushed gravel re-surfacing by mid-September was promised for the Birchwood Road at a meeting of the Birchwood Community Club, held last Monday night at the home of Lester Juhnke.

Representing the Department of Highways at this meeting was Mr. Claude Rogers, District Maintenance Supervisor and Jack Morrow, Anchorage Maintenance Station foreman.

Rogers told the more than fifty local residents gathered there that this was the earliest possible date that the re-surfacing could begin, since Campbell Creek Road, with a daily traffic load of over 9,500 cars per day had higher priority. A recent traffic count had indicated the daily load on the Birchwood Road to be 655 cars.

Rogers also said that while he could not promise heavy equipment for the improvement of the road, an attempt would be made to widen the road where ever possible with a blade, and also at attempt made to straighten some of the more dangerous curves.

He also promised improved maintenance of the road this winter.

A letter to Charles Richner, President of the Birchwood Community Club from the Commissioner of Highways stated that the Birchwood Road was scheduled for hard surfacing by 1970.

FIFTH VOTING PRECINCT FORMED

BIRCHWOOD: A fifth voting precinct, which had been formed in the Greater Chugiak area was brought to the attention to the Knik Arm Courier. This precinct had been omitted from a report received from the election board supervisor last week.

This fifth precinct is a portion of the Chugiak voting precinct and is located in the Birchwood Area. The boundaries of this precinct are, Peters Creek on the north, the Bureau of Reclamation Transmission line on the east, the Knik Arm on the west, and the mile 17 section of the Birchwood Loop on the south.

This is to be referred to as the Birchwood voting precinct. The four other precincts are as follows: Eagle River Valley, Louise Long election board chairman; Eagle River precinct, Pat Stelling; Chugiak, Jewel Deal; Birchwood, Cliff Wiggins; Peters Creek, Margaret Halverson and Eklutna, Mildred Alex.

SENATOR DENIES LINK WITH PRESSURE GROUP

EAGLE RIVER: According to a spokesman for the management of the Eagle River Bowl, the rumor of a link between State Senator Nick Begich, and a local group pressuring for the revoking of the bar license at the bowling alley was emphatically denied by the Senator.

The bowling lanes management said that they had received a call from Senator Begich in which he told them that he had received word that his name had been connected with the threatened with the removal of the bar license, and that he wished to be quoted as saying that he was in no way connected with the problems the Eagle River Bowl was experiencing.

The bowling establishment had received word last month that the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board would revoke their license as of the 20th of August. The reason given for this action was the supposed lack of sufficient population within a five mile radius of the bowling alley to justify the issuance of the disputed license.

PHONE STRIKE IS SETTLED

PALMER: The strike by the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers against the Matanuska Telephone Association was settled last Wednesday evening at a meeting between the MTA and representatives of the IBEW.

State Commissioner of Labor, Gil Johnson acted as mediator in the dispute.

The MTA agreed to a two year contract with the IBEW with an increase of 10¢ per hour the first year and an additional 10¢ per hour the second year.

No changes were made in the welfare benefits.

Mex Clement, manager of MTA said that they can now resume installations of new phones with the return of the Union members to work.

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON

In the area of my personal legislative activity: A bill by the Alaska Congressional Delegation to remove antiquated restrictions on disposition of University of Alaska lands has been approved by the full House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs. This Senate-passed measure (sponsored by me in the House) is now in line for House action on final passage. The legislation is of immediate importance because it would enable the University to swap some land adjacent to Valdez for state land elsewhere for the purpose of making the University land available for use in the urban renewal project at Valdez necessitated by the earthquake.

I have just introduced a resolution (H. Con. Res. 847), which requires that regulations promulgated by the Food and Drug Administration with respect to the "labeling and content of diet foods and supplements," must be approved by Congress before becoming effective. The introduction of this measure resulted from a plea by many of my constituents—with special dietary needs—to overcome a proposed Food and Drug edict which would, in effect, drastically restrict over-the-counter sales of vitamins.

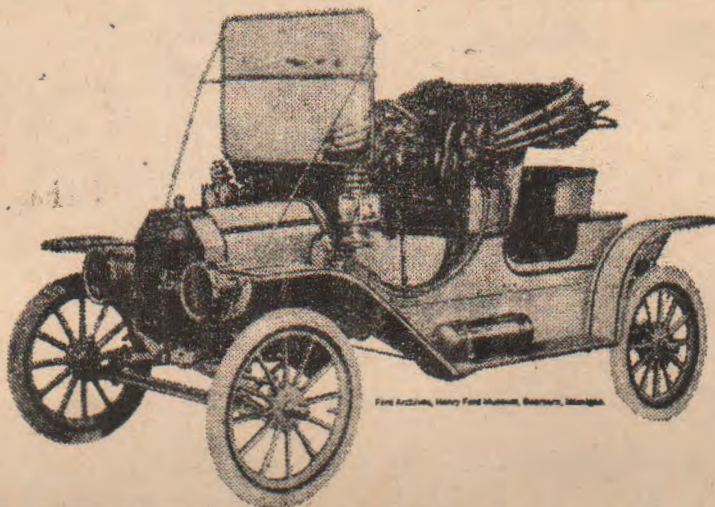
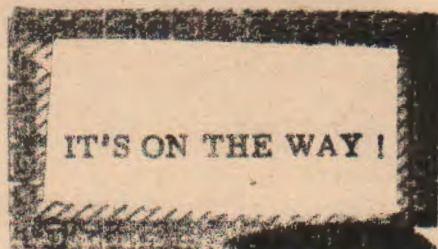
Registration is at 7:30 and the business meeting will begin at 8 p.m.

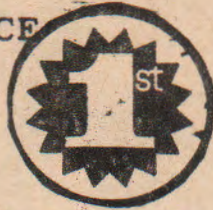
