COURIER TO CONVERT TO OFFSET

CHUGIAK: Beginning with the 1100th issue of the Knik Arm Courier, the local newspaper will be printed on the brand new offset press which was installed earlier this month.

This is a part of the complete new printing plant which will be used to put out the Courier in the future.

The local weekly, now in its ninth year of continuous publication has been printed on a silk screen duplicator heretofore.

VALDEZ: Word was received of an accident at mile 11 on the Richardson Highway which took the life of a Department of Fish and Game employee and injured a second one.

The accident took place at approximately 5:30am Tuesday morning. The Volkswagon micro-bus in which the two men were riding left the road and overturned in the Lowe River.

Dead is Dan McGinnis of the Palmer office. The second man, Jack Didrickson, also of Palmer, was taken to the Valdez Hospital where he was found to be suffering from shock and minor injuries.

The pair were both on leave, and were hurrying to Valdez to catch the ferry for Cordova where they planned to go goose hunting.

Organist was Mrs. Phillip Matlock of Birchwood, and soloist was Mrs. Kenneth Wert of Peters Creek. Interment followed the services at the Valley Memorial Gardens in Palmer.

The baby was born on July 7th, 1966. He is survived by his parents, two brothers, Ralph and Daniel, two sisters Polly and Patty, a grandmother Mrs. Blanche Kelm of Racine Wis., and a grandfather Fay Thorson of Menomonee Falls Wis.

Mr. and Mrs. Anderson operate Chugiak Sales and Service at mile 18 in Old Chugiak. Mr. Anderson is a candidate for election to the State House of Representatives.

To the uninitiate, we will explain briefly that this is the very latest most up-to-date equipment available, and a process to which many of the large daily newspapers are switching too.

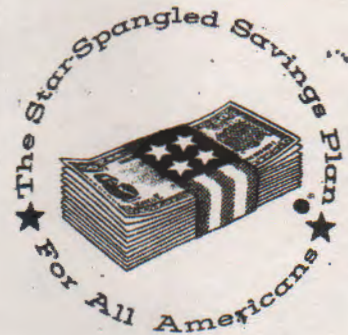
This not only involved a great expense to the Courier, but means that an entirely new process must be learned by the staff and entirely new routines adopted.

APPLICATIONS BEING TAKEN FOR NROTC

BIRCHWOOD: Applications for the Navy's twenty-first annual Regular NROTC qualifications test are now available, according to Mrs. Betty Ramsey, counselor at Chugiak High School.

This nationwide examination will be given on December 10th, 1966, and all eligible male high school seniors and graduates may apply.

On the basis of this test, personal interviews, medical examinations, and other factors, over 1,7000 young men will enter the Regular NROTC program as midshipmen at NROTC units in 52 colleges and universities throughout the nation.

Male citizens of the United States who will be at least 17, but not yet 21 on June 30th, 1967, and who are now high school seniors or graduates, may be eligible to apply for the test. Those who attain qualifying scores will be interviewed and given medical examinations next January and February.

A successful candidate receives financial aid for four years of college. This includes tuition and educational fees, books, uniforms, and \$50.00 per month subsistence allowance. After successfully completing baccalaureate degree requirements and naval training, graduates are commissioned as officers in the U.S. Navy or Marine Corps.

Regular NROTC midshipmen participate in three summer cruises, with various naval units. These cruises help them learn more about the variety of interesting and challenging opportunities available to them as naval or marine corps officers.

Registrations for the test will close November 18th, 1966. NROTC Bulletins containing eligibility requirements and qualifying test ap-

plications are available from Mrs. Ramsey, or the U.S. Navy Recruiting Station in Anchorage.

ANCHORAGE COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Announces that the deadline for enrollment in their General Electronics class will be September 30th.

This course is offered by the University of Alaska in conjunction with the GAAB School District through the Anchorage Community College. It is a full time course, consisting of 6 hours a day for 45 weeks out of the year for two years. Upon graduation, the student will be a 100% Certified Electronics Technician.

This course was designed by most of the major airlines operating in and out of Alaska, and was set up to help fill a need for electronic technicians, a shortage of which exists throughout the entire United States. Graduates are eagerly accepted as technicians at full scale journeyman's pay throughout the industry.

At the end of the first year the student will be eligible for a First Class FCC license, First Class FAA certification is given to graduates at the end of the second year. During the second year of instruction the students spend three hours a day working on operational aircraft under the supervision of the participating airlines.

Tuition is \$225 per semester with a total of three semester per year. The course is fully approved by the Veterans Administration. Also arrangements for deferred payment will be made on an individual basis. Applicants must be 19 years of age or have graduated from high school. Registration is daily from 9am to 5pm at 410 Barrow Street in Anchorage. This class is open to registration only once a year. **DEADLINE FOR REGISTRATION SEPT 30**

CLEANING BIRDS CAN LEAD TO ARREST

JUNEAU: Waterfowl may be picked in the field, but one fully feathered wing must remain attached to the bird while being transported, Don Roberts, Regional Protection Supervisor, Arctic-Interior Region of the Department of Fish and Game announced today.

Since the opening of water fowl season in the Interior, September 1st, numerous persons have been cited for cleaning their birds in the field and failing to leave the one fully feathered wing.

This is not a new regulation, Roberts said, but has been in effect since 1963 and all waterfowl hunters should familiarize themselves with it.

In addition, he noted, waterfowl may be taken with a shotgun or bow and arrow, but not with a rifle or pistol. Shotguns must be plugged to a 3 shell capacity or less.

A complete list of the Alaska Waterfowl Regulations may be obtained without charge from any license vendor or the Department of Fish and Game office.

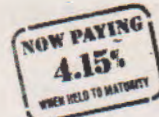
