





APPLICATIONS BEING TAKEN FOR NROTC

BIRCHWOOD: Applications for the Navy's twenty-first annual Regular NROTC qualifications test are now available, according to Mrs. Betty Ramsey, counselor at Chugiak High School.

This nationwide examination will be given on December 10th, 1966, and all eligible male high school seniors and graduates may apply

and graduates may apply.

On the basis of this test, personal interviews, medical examinations, and other factors, over 1,7000 young men will enter the Regular NROTC program as misshipmen at NROTC units in 52 colleges and universities throughout the nation.

Male citizens of the United States who will be at least 17, but not yet 21 on June 30th, 1967, and who are now high school seniors or graduates, may be eligible to apply for the test. Those who attain qualifying scores will be interviewed and given medical examinations nest

January and February.

A successful candidate receives financial ald for four years of college. This includes tuition and educational fees, books, uniforms, and \$50,00 per month subsistence allowance. After successfully completing bascalaureate degree requirements and naval training, graduates are commissioned as officers in the U.S. Navy or Marine Corps.

Recular NROTC midshipmen perticipes in three summer cruises, wit various naval units. These crui es help them learn more about the variety of interesting end challenging opportunities available to them as naval or marine corps.



CLEANING BIRDS CAN LEAD TO ARREST

JUNEAU: Waterfowl may be picked in the field, but one fully feathered wing must remain attached to the oird while being transported, Don Roberts, Regional Protection Sup-ervisor, Arctic-Interior Region of the Department of Fish and Game

announced today.

Since the opening of water fowl season in the Interior, September 1st, numerous persons have been cited for cleaning their birds in the field and failing to leave the one fully feathered wing.

This is not a new regulation, Roberts said, but has been in ef-fect since 1963 and all waterfowl hunters should familiarize them-selves with it.

In addition, he noted, waterfowl may be taken with a shotgun or bow and arrow, but not with a rifle or pistol. Shotguns must be plugged to a 3 shell capacity or
