



FIRE DESTROYS EAGLE RIVER HOME

EAGLE RIVER: Fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed a \$25,000 log dwelling at mile 8 1/2 Eagle River Road last Sunday evening.

The building was the residence of C.J. McIntyre. Mr. McIntyre was not at his home when the alarm was turned in.

The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company responded, but the building was totally involved when the equipment arrived, and the house burned to the ground.

Although Mr. McIntyre carried fire insurance, he had a collection of many valuable personal items which could not be replaced.

The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

RESURFACING IN PROGRESS ON ROAD

BIRCHWOOD: The promised improvement to the Birchwood Road was begun last week with the placing of a layer of crushed rock on the surface by the Department of Highways.

Also the road was widened wherever possible, and the drainage improved where needed.

The schedule at this time calls for work on the Birchwood Loop, but not on the Birchwood Spur Road.

The surfacing with rock is expected to be completed this week, following which, the crews will move to the Eagle River Area, where plans call for a crushed rock resurfacing of six miles of the Eagle River Road.

YOUTH WOUNDED IN GUN ACCIDENT

EAGLE RIVER: A fourteen year old Eagle River youth was accidentally shot while helping his older brother clean a rifle.

The victim was Frederick O. Pollard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Pollard of mile 12 Eagle River Road.

The gun, a 22 caliber rifle discharged while the boys were cleaning it and struck Frederick in the right hip. His brother, Jeffery age 16 was unhurt.

The youth was taken to Providence Hospital by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance where he was treated for a flesh wound.

The Courier's choice this week should be a hands down winner of that title.

When the members of the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company rushed to the fire house to answer a fire call last Sunday evening, they discovered that someone had drained all the gasoline from the tank of their largest and most important piece of equipment, 1,000 gallon GMC tanker. The gas tank of the vehicle had been filled only the day before.

By the time the firemen were able to get enough gas in the tank and get to a service station to have it filled and arrived at the fire, the building (the story of which appears on page one of the Courier) was completely destroyed.

According to Rogers, the driver had too wide a latitude of choice when turning either from the Glenn Highway on to the Eagle River Road or vice versa. This frequently made it difficult for drivers to see these cars turning and the result was numerous cars turning into the part of outgoing traffic.

With the addition of the new guard rail, all traffic will be channeled to a specific point before turning, and all cars approaching the Glenn Highway from the Eagle River Road will have no question but that they must come to a full stop.

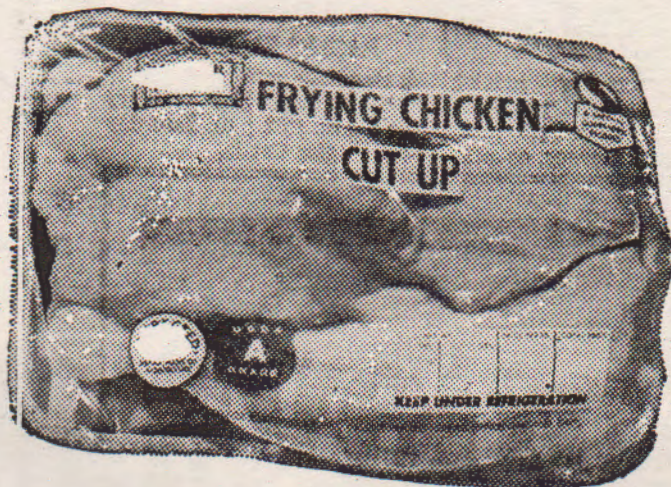

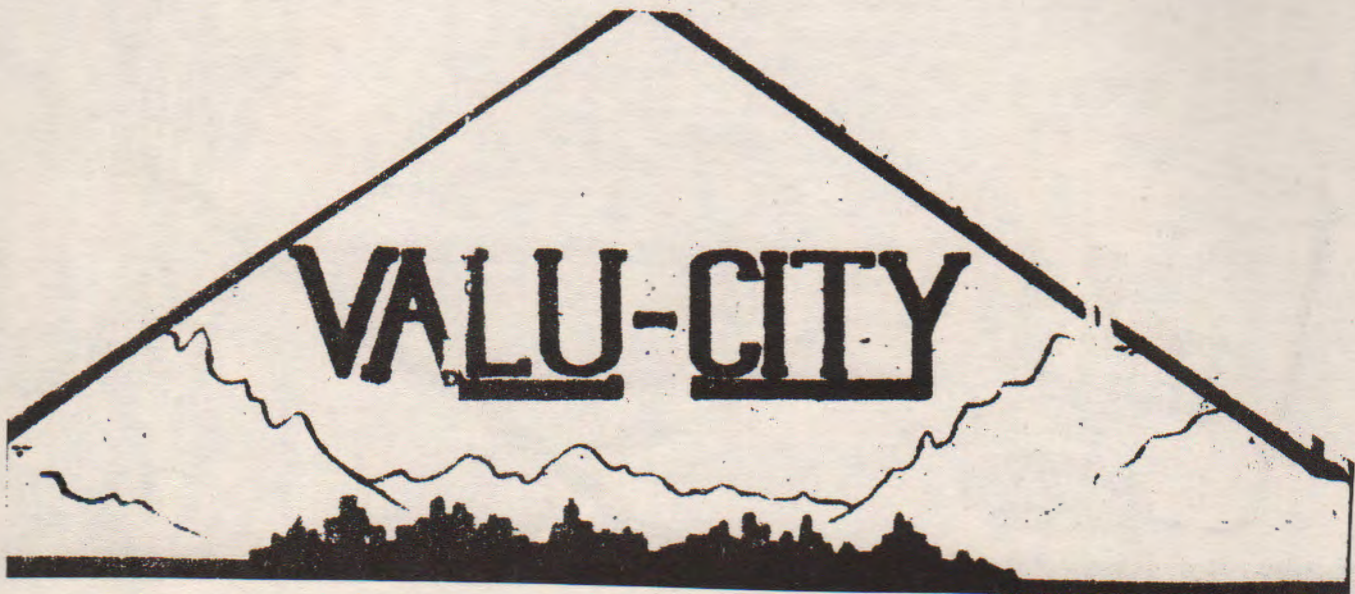

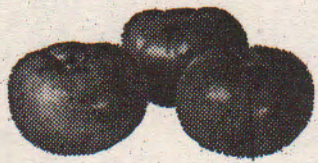

Ford was cited for driving too fast for conditions. Neither driver was injured.

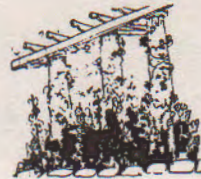
FRANK MARTIN TRANSFERRED TO SEATTLE

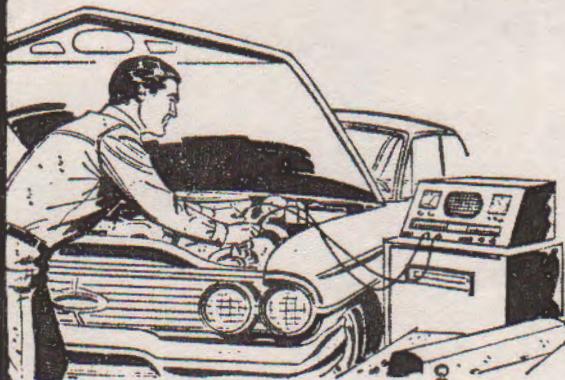

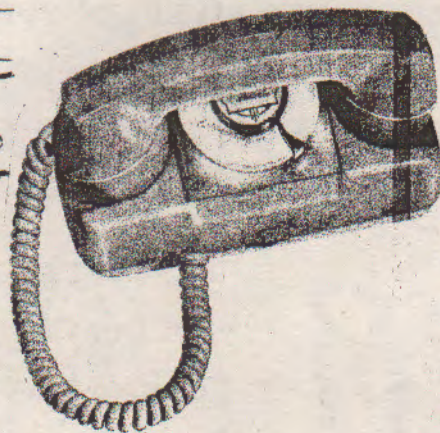

The Chugiak Fire Company has said that if they were supported with taxes one half mill would give them two to three times more money than they had ever been able to raise by donation.

ANCHORAGE COMMUNITY COLLEGE

announces that the deadline for enrollment in their General Electronics class will be September 30th.

This course is offered by the University of Alaska in conjunction with the GAAB School District through the Anchorage Community College. It is a full time course, consisting of 6 hours a day for 45 weeks out of the year for two years. Upon graduation, the student will be a 100% Certified Electronics Technician.

This course was designed by most of the major airlines operating in and out of Alaska, and was set up to help fill a need for electronic technicians, a shortage of which exists throughout the entire United States. Graduates are eagerly accepted as technicians at full scale journeyman's pay throughout the industry.

At the end of the first year the student will be eligible for a First Class FCC licenst, First Class FAA certification is given to graduates at the end of the second year. During the second year of instruction the students spend three hours a day working on operational aircraft under the supervision of the participating airlines.

Tuition is \$225 per semester with a total of three semester per year. The course is fully approved by the Veterans Administration. Also arrangements for deferred payment will be made on an individual basis. Applicants must be 19 years of age or have graduated from high school. Registration is daily from 9am to 3pm at 419 Barrow Street in Anchorage. This class is open to registration only once a year.

SEWER ISSUE OFF BALLOT

ANCHORAGE: The GAAB Borough voted Monday night to carry on the ballot the proposition of whether or not sewer powers should be areawide. The \$20,000,000 bond issue will not be put on the ballot at this time.

The Assembly approved a study made by the Anchorage Engineering firm Tryek, Nyman and Hayes on the sewers. This study was begun over a year ago, and was paid for by a Federal grant which makes funds available to areas with water and sewer problems.

Those who voted against placing the bond proposition at this time felt that there may be alternates to this plan which can be done more economically and would provide relief to the area east of Anchorage at an earlier date.

Assemblyman Glenn Briggs said that it was not the intent of anyone to drop consideration of areawide sewer installations of some kind. He said they voted so as to permit further evaluation of the study and to consider other proposals. He felt that the assemblies should not ask the voters to decide on an issue that they did not fully understand themselves.

The proposition will be brought up for a vote at a special election to be held sometime before spring.

MEETING TO EXPLAIN GRASS ROOTS

OLD CHUGIAK: A public meeting has been scheduled for September 28th at 7:30pm in the multi-purpose room of the Chugiak Elementary School.

The purpose of this meeting is to explain "Operation Grass Roots" to the public. This meeting is under the sponsorship of Greater Anchorage Action Agency, which is under the federal Office of Economic Opportunity.

Mr. Ivan DeSoto, community aid, will acquaint the people with the program which deals with individual as well as community problems.
