RESURFACING IN PROGRESS ON ROAD

RIRCHWOOD: The promised improvement to the Birchwood Road was begun last week with the placing of a layer of crushed rock on the surface by the Department of High-

Also the road was widened where-ever possible, and the drainage im-proved where needed.

The schedule at this time calls for work on the Birchwood Loop, but not on the Birchwood Spur Road.

The surfacing with rock is expected to be completed this week, following which, the crews will move to the Eagle River Area, where plans call for a crushed rock resurfacing of six miles of the Eagle River Road.







SEWER ISSUE OFF BALLOT


ANCHORAGE: The GAAB Borough voted Monday night to carry on the ballot the proposition of whether or not sewer powers should be areawide. The \$20,000,000 bond issue will not be put ou the ballot at this time.

The Assembly aproved a study made by the Anchorage Engineering form Tryek, Nyman and Hayes on the sewers. This study was begun over a year ago, and was paid for by a Federal grant which makes funds available to areas with water and sewer problems.

Those who voted against placing the bond proposition at this time felt that there may be alternates to this plan which can be done more economically and would provide relief to the area east of Anchorage at an earlier date.

Assemblyman Glenn Briggs daid that it was not the intent of anyone to drop consideration of areawide sewer installations of some kind. He said they voted so as to permit further evaluation of the study and to consider other proposals. He felt that the assemblies should not ask the voters to decide on an issue that they did not fully understand themselves.

The proposition will be brought up for a vote at a special election to be held sometime before spring.



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
