CHUGIAK BOY CAUSE OF AREAWIDE OUTAGE

A report by WASHINGTON DC: the Federal Power Commission re-garding the May 13th power fallure stated that an eleven year old Chug-iak boy was responsible for the outage which interruped the power from Eklutna on the north to Homer and Seward on the South. According to the report, the boy



THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON By Ralph J. Rivers MC

Election Day, I testified in support of bills introduced by Senator Bartlett and me which would make important changes in the organization of government services on the Pribilof Islands and provide for local self-government. The legislation would permit the Interior Department to establish a townsite on St. Paul Island to enable the residents to obtain title to their lots. It also provides that educational responsibilities be transferred from the Department of Interior to the State; that Civil Service retrement beneats accrue to the residens of the Pribilofs; and authorizes transitional grants in the amount of \$150,000 over a 5-year period from the Federal Government to the municipal government. I will press for

favorable action by the House of Representatives during this session.

R. 6926 — which proposes to liberalize life insurance benefits for Federal employees — may be acted upon by the House of Representatives this week. The measure originally passed the House last August, but was rewritten by the Senate before adoption by that body in March.

After considerable discussion, the Senate and House conferees have agreed to authorize funds for the conversion

After considerable discussion, the Senate and House conferees have agreed to authorize funds for the conversion of the Fort Richardson and Elmendorf power plants from coal to natural gas. At the present time, the bases have contracts for coal and these contracts will rum until June 30, 1967. In approving the conver-

sion, the conferees declared that the coal contract should be fulfilled before the conversion from coal to gas. My next effort will be to head off the appropriation needed to carry out the conversion.

ment reports that 900,000 of Alaska's total land area is listed for farming, but nine tenths of the acreage consists of grazing land leased from the government. Thus, only about 70,000 acres are actually in farms and only a quarter of that is cropped for harvest. The rest is pasture and uncleared land. According to the Department's release, there are 330 farms in Alaska.

The prize will go to the youngster who sold the greatest amount of papers (total sales) during those months.



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

ANCHORAGE: A five dollar reward is being offered for the return of bands from spruce grouse shot on the Kenai Peninsula this fall. A banded grouse which is also wearing a radio transmitter will be worth \$7.50.

d Game biologist Larry Ellison stated today the bands or the transmater should be turned in to any Alaska Department of Fish and Game office.

Ellison said Fish and Game biologists have been elacing leg bands and miniature radio transmitters on grouse to learn more about the effects of himting pressure on grouse populations. The number of banded grouse shot will indicate the proportion of a fall population taken by hunters.

The biologist said the radio transmitters are being used to study the fall movements of spruce grouse to toads. Grouse move to roadsides, he added, to obtain grit to aid in the digestion of the fibrous spruce needles that the grouse feed on in the winter.

He said the birds should begin

He said the birds should begin showing up on roads regularly in early mornings by mid-September.

Grouse hunting should be as good or better than last hear, he said, because or good production that past summer. Brood counts conducted on the Kenai Peninsula showed that in mid-August each brood averaged 5 to 6 chicks and that over 90 percent of all hens were accompanies by broods.

Grouse season opened August 20 runs through March 15 with a daily bag limit of 15 birds. Ellison reminded grouse hunters

that it is unlawful to shoot from, or, or across any road open to public travel.

Department of public safety commissioner Martin B. Underwood has amounced the continuing effort of all Alaska state police personnel to insure public compliance with the state's anti-litter compaign.

"It is beneficial to all of

Alaska and its residents to do their utmost to keep our state clean and beautiful, both in dollars and cents and in personal pride," the commissioner said.

He noted that the state legistature passed an anti-litter law which took effect on May 30, 1966. Part or the anti-intercampaign asks any citizen seeing another in a vehicle dumperetuse on the highway to report the incident to the nearest state police office, giving particulars, including the license number.

State police personnel will then place the information on a "litterbug report" and mail it to the offender. "The litterbug report" consists of a card bearing a gentle warning to the offender asking his cooperation in keeping the state a pleasant and enjoyable place.

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
