

BREAK-IN AT CHUGIAK SCHOOL



OLD CHUGIAK: A break-in which took place over the weekend at the Chugiak Elementary School, ap-peared to have the finesse of aprofessional burglar.

Both building were apparently entered, and a total of \$100 in cash and savings stamps were missing.

The break in appeared to have taken place sometime between the of 7pm on Sunday evening and Monday morning, Mr. Emerson Sortore, school principal, said that there were eachers working in the main building during the hours of 3:00pm until 5:00pm on Sunday, and nothing unusual was noted at this time. Window latches in both of the

buildings were found broken, and it was assumed that this is how the buildings were entered.

The money stolen was funds be-longing to the school district and some to the PTA. Locked cab-inets and a metal safe had been pried open as well as desk drawers.

Mr. Sortore said that it was his opinion that the burglar was not a chi¹ as in one instance some c y had been stored in a desk drawer and this was not taken. The only other items that appeared to be missing other than money or asshured and the store of cash redeemable stamps was some butter and milk from a refrigerator the school lunch room kitchen.

Th break-in was discovered Mon day norning by Mr. Sawyer, school cus odian, and Mrs. Lee, manager

of the lunch room.
Other items which tened to point away from the thought that it might it the act of ajuvenile, was the fact that there was noevidence of vandalism, or any exterior damage to the building, other than roken locks The State Police are investigating.

BIRTH DEFECTS QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

HOW ARE DISEASES INHERITED?

HOW ARE DISEASES INHERITED?
In every one of our cells there is a special substance which is actually coded chemically for each individual somewhat like the tape in an electronic computer. This "code of life" chemical is called DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid). It determines all inherited characteristics of man and of other forms of life as well. The code is carried from generation to generation through hereditary units called genes. Genes are "packaged" in the structural form known as chromosomes. Each person receives from his parents and passes along to his children several thousand genes, some of which lead to normal traits, others to abnormal ones.

DO BAD GENES ALWAYS CAUSE DISEASE?

No. In some instances a had gene rrom one parent has to be paired with a similar had gene from the other to cause trouble to the child. Other times harmful genes won't cause trouble unless some particular thing happens to the baby while it is developing in the mother's body, or unless some change or disturbance occurs later in life to trigger its negative effects. At least one hereditary disease, Huntington's chorea, may not appear until 60 years of age.

WHEN IS A BIRTH DEFECT SERIOUS?

Generally speaking, a serious birth defect is one which is fatal or shortens life, causes disfigurement, or results in a physical or mental handicap.

HOW ABOUT MENTAL RETARDATION?

Frequently a birth defect. Mental retarda-Frequently a birth defect. Mental retardation is a symptom with numerous causes. Birth defects cause a very significant percentage of cases of mental retardation. At least 30 hody chemistry hirth defects are now known to result in mental deficiency. In some of these, the damage can he prevented if the conditions are diagnosed early and treated properly. PKU is one of them. Other commonly known examples of retardation due to birth defects are Down's syndrome (mongolism) and hydrocephalus.

CAN BIRTH DEFECTS BE PREVENTED?

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To some extent, yes. Certain inherited diseases can be prevented by avoiding pregnancy when the risk is too high. Family histories can alert the physician to some inheritable defects (PKU, for example) thus preparing him to diagnose them in early infancy when treatment can prevent injurious effects. Much of the brain damage caused by both PKU and a disease called galactosemia (in which the hody can't handle sugars found in milk) can be prevented by special diets if the diseases are detected and treatment started in early infancy. Two effective detection tests for PKU have been developed. Similar advances in other such diseases are hoped for. Blood tests to determine Rh-factor type can alert the physician to potential trouble. If a vaccine for German measles can be perfected soon, birth defects caused by that disease will become prevented.

The U.S. Office of Education has informed Senator Gruening that \$1,649,236 in federal funds have been allocated to the state of Alaska to aid educationally deprived children.





RURAL 30 DISSATISFIED WITH MERGER BILL

ANCHORAGE: Representatives of Rural 30, who attended the public hearing on the City-Borough merger plan, feel that the proposed legis-lation still lacke many of the safeguards they deem necessary to protect the interests of the rural areas.

Ed Willis, Chairman of Rural 30, and Borough Assemblyman from Section one, said that although the City-Borough Study group had followed the suggestion of Rural 30 that areas both within the city and those outside the city must ap-prove the merger, however he felt that as a whole the bill was too loosely written.

He said there was no provision or the protection of the Borough Sections and that the law must be more specific in telling how assets and liabilities are to be taken care

He said it was the feeling of Rurai 30 representatives that the time for Public Rearings was be-fore the Study Group met to draw

the sill.

He added that he felt that the present laws were adequate to handie local government problems and that any additional legislation at this time is unnecessary.
