ANCHORAGE: A proposal is to be brought up before the GAAB Assembly which would make the Sanitary Landfill (dump) which is located south of the Eagle River Bridge, a public supported facility, with no charge to the individual customer. The administration believes such

sanitary landfills should be supported entirely through general property taxation. It is the position of the borough attorney that the borough has the power to spend general tax revenues for sanitary landfills und-

er the areawide health power. It appears as if the sanitary land-fill problem in the area north of the military reservation is most acute, and therefore, as an interim solution the administration will prepare an ordinance to establish a service area for all of the borongh north of the military reservation. This will be introduced at the March 6th

meeting of the Borough Assembly.
If the assembly approves the establishment of the service area, the administration will budget for the new service area the sanitary landfill maintenance costs. These costs are estimated to be \$10.00 per year and the necessary mill tax levy will ab about .8 mills.

A study is presently underway to determine further sanitary landfill areas throughout the borough and expecially in the Eagle River area. Within the next several months, the administration will propose areawide sanitary landfill service supported through ad valorem taxes

for the assembly's consideration, Public hearings on the subject of Sanitary Landfill north of the military reservation will follow the meeting of the assembly.

The dump south of the Eagle River Bridge was established following the closing of the dump on the Birchwood Road. It was under the sponsorship of the Chugiak Benefit Association, who as the only incorporated entity that represented the Greater Chugiak Area were eligible to administer the property. The understanding was that CBA would let the dump under contract to a private operator who would maintain a sanitary landfill and charge the public for its use. A percentage of the gross take was to be returned to CBA for the use of the residents of the Greater Chuglak Area. In the years that the dump was

under the contract to the private operator, it was not kept open eexcept on weekends, a situation which was found to be inconvenient to local users, and was not kept filled in as specified by the Borough Health requirements.

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
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CHUGIAK HIGH HOSTS RONDY RIFLE MATCH

FAIRBANKS TO HOST BASKETBALL TOURNEY

FAIRBANKS: The Western Alaska High School Class A basketball tournament will be held in Fair-banks March 2-4.

Due to the limited housing available in the Fairbanks area, expecially at tournament time, the four Anchorage high schools (this includes Chugiak) must restrict the number of students authorized to attend the

tournament.

"While it is recognized that many students wish to go to the tournament it also must be recognized that school will be in session March 2 and 3," explained Gordon Guffey, secondary curriculum director. "The school curriculum director, "The school district is prepared to authorize attendance at the tournament by team members and cheerleaders and will approve excused absences for those students who will be ac-companied by their parents.

"No students will be allowed to attend without parental approval. The rules and regulations of the Western Alaska High School Activities Association stipulate that the individual schools must be responsible for the actions of their students attending the tournament as well as actual participants. Our schools cannot take the responsibility for the large numbers of students who may wish to attend the tournament."

Mr. Guffey said that unless accompanied by parents, students should not be allowed to travel in any chartered planes, buses or trains which may be organized for the tournament.

He added that special parental permission slips would be sent home to parents whose children will be authorized to attend as team members or cheerleaders. The school bands will not be authorized to attend the tournament.

He noted that the local restriction on tournament attendance by sutdents occurs only once every four years under present arrange-The tournament is held at ments. Fairbanks only in the years it is not held at East, West or Dimond High School here in Anchorage.

MEMORIAL TO FRANK CLINE HIGHLIGHT OF FOUNDERS DAY

BIRCHWOOD: A Memorial to Frank Cline, the first Principal of Chugiak High School will be presented at a program to be held as a joint effort of all three local PTAs at the High School tonight, Wednesday February

22nd at 8:00pm.

This is in observance of Founders Day, which commemorates the organization of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers on February 17th, 1897 in Wachington D.C. The celebration of the day was conceived in 1910 by Mrs. David O. Mears, one of the original members of the First Congress of Mothers, and its annual observation has been a part of the parent-teacher program since that


