STATE SKY DIVERS MEET AT EAGLE RIVER

EAGLE RIVER: Parachute jumpers from clubs throughout the State will compete for State Champion Jumper on February 17th, 18th and 19th at the Walter Pippel hayfield at mile 14 in Eagle River.

To accomodate the 50 competing contestants jumping, the event will start at 8:00am each morning and continue until 4:00pm on each of the three days.

The contest is being sponsored by the Alaska Sky Divers Club of Anchorage, the largest such club in the state.

The event is non-profit for the Club and will be free to the spectators.

Mr. Pippel is making no charge for the use of the alrstrip and jump area. Russell Oberg of Peters Creek will clear the snow from the alrstrip at a minimal charge.

LOCAL GROUP TO TRY FOR SEWAGE DISPOSAL

ANCHORAGE: The sewer study for the Greater Chuglak Area, authorized by the Borough Assembly a year ago and paid for by a Federal grant, has been completed and presented to the Assembly.

Federal agencies will not participate in funding of sewer systems planning and construction except and without such a study conducted by a recognized sewer engineering firm. This study was made by Trych Nyman and Hayes of Anchorage as a joint venture with Stevens and Thompson of Portland Oregon.

The conclusion of the two firms who conducted this study was that the only solution to a sewer problem in the Eagle River is a community system to carry the waste to a lagoon or treatment facility located near the mouth of Eagle River.

EAGLE RIVER: The Valu City Shopping Center has been purchased by the Carrs Food Center chain effective February 6th.

The store will now be known as Carrs, Eagle River, and is the fourth store in this chain. The others are located at Gamble St. in Anchorage, at the Aurora Shopping Center in Spenard and in Kenai.

Mr. Barber, General Manager for the Carrs chain, stated that they are now in the process of minor renovations, and when these are completed, store policy will be the same as in the Anchorage stores, including the same prices as advertised.

The only changes in store personnel are in the management. Clyde McCaughey will be the store manager, and Bob Oathout will be manager of the meat department. Both these men have been employed with Carrs at their other stores.

Mr. Barber said that plans are to increase and improve both the grocery line and the non-food items to make this a complete shopping center.

A PEEK INTO HISTORY

The Courier is deeply indebted this week to Mr. Bob Thomas of Eagle River for granting us permission to reproduce the copy of the newspaper which appears on the center spread of this week's Courier.

This paper is over one hundred years old, and has been handed down from one generation of the Thomas family to the next.

As will be noted, this is a copy of the front page of the New York Herald, dated April 15th, 1965. It's headlines tells of the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln. This paper was published the day after John Wilkes Booth shot the President in the Ford theatre in Washington, indicating that even one hundred and two years ago, news was received fairly rapidly.

This yellowed crumpling page is a Thomas family heirloom. Mr. Thomas received it from his grandmother, Mrs. Joseph Oringoff, who received it from her uncle who had clipped and saved it.

An interesting sidelight, which we noted in reading this paper is a historical fact which is not as widely known as Lincolns assassination. The fact that Secretary of State William Henry Seward was seriously wounded in an attempt to assassinate him at the same time that the President was shot. Secretary Seward was recovering from injuries sustained in a carriage accident, when the assassin entered his bed room and knifed him while he lay in his bed.

Secretary Seward recovered from his wounds, and went on to purchase Alaska in 1867, the Centennial of which we celebrate this year.

If the assassin had been more sure in his aim, then Seward would have never lived to perpetrate his folly, and Alaska would very likely still belong to Russia.

This evening at about 10 o'clock P. M. the President, the President, while sitting in his private box with Mrs. Lincoln, Mrs. Harris and Major Rathbun, made an appearance at Secretary Seward's residence and applied for admission. He was refused admission by the ser-

the Cabinet killed. Some time elapsed before authentic data could be ascertained in regard to the affair.

The President and Mrs. Lincoln were at Ford's Theatre, listening to the performance of the American Cousin, occupying a box in the second tier. At the close of the third act a person entered the box occupied by the President and shot Mr. Lincoln in the head. The shot entered the back of the head and came out above the temple.

The assassin then jumped from the box upon the stage and ran across the other side, exhibiting a dagger in his hand, flourishing it in a tragic manner, shouting the same words repeated by the desperado at Mr. Seward's house, adding to it, "The South is avenged," and then escaped from the back entrance to the stage, but in his passage dropping his hat and pistol.

Mr. Lincoln fell forward in his seat, his body surviving. Physician Bell, who will die before morning. All of his Cabinet, except Secretary Seward, are with him. Speaker Colfax, Senator Farwell of Maine, and many other gentlemen are at the boxes awaiting the termination.

The scene at the President's bedside described by one who witnessed it is most affecting. It was surrounded by his Cabinet ministers, all of whom were bathed in tears, not even excepting Mr. Stanton, who, when informed by Surgeon General Barnes that the President could not live until morning, exclaimed, "Oh, no, General; no; no;" and with an impulse natural as it is unaffected, immediately sat down in a chair near the bedside and wept like a child.

Colonel Stewart was seated on the right of the President's couch, near the head, holding the right hand of the President in his own. He was sobbing like a woman, with his head bowed down almost on the pillow of the bed on which the President was lying.

The physicians show that the assassin's bullet passed through the brain.

The President is still alive but there is no improvement in his condition.

would be unjust to name him until some further evidence of his guilt is obtained. It is rumored that the son alluded to is in custody.

The latest advices from Secretary Seward reveal more desperate work than at first supposed. Seward's wounds are not in themselves fatal, but, in connection with his recent injuries, and the great loss of blood he has sustained, his recovery is questionable.

It was Charles A. Seward, instead of Wm. H. Seward, Jr., who was wounded. Fred Seward was also badly cut, as were also the nurses, who were in attendance upon the Secretary, showing that a desperate struggle took place there. The wounds of the whole party were dreadful.



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
