CROSS COUNTRY SNOWMOBILE TREK ENDS LAST FRIDAY

ANCHORAGE: An Eagle River man returned home last Friday, following a much publicized cross country trip by snowmobile.

Dave Burns, of Cornado Road, along with two companions, spent twenty eight grueling days enroute from Crosby Minnesota to Anchorage. Burns is the Alaska distritutor for the Scorpion, which is manufactured by Trali-A-Sled of Crosby.

Burns said that the purpose of the trip was not to attempt to set any record, but as an experiment to test the equipment, and to see how the machines would hold up over long distance over the most adverse winter conditions and over the roughest terraine that might be encountered. These conditions were certain to be met over and over again on the trip through Canada and up the Alaska Highway.

The 'trio left Crosby at 1:30pm on January 28th. Burns said they averaged 130 miles a day, traveling approximately 10 hours each day. From Crosby to Dawson Creek, they traveled cross-country exclusively, avoiding all roads, and using railroad tracks, pole lines, and farmers fences for navigational theck points. BIRCHWOOD: A Birchwood woman took her own life late last Friday night, according to State Police. Mrs.

The victim was Mrs. Bernice Eula Jacobs, age 38. Mrs. Jacobs and her husband Pete, shared a home with Bill Williams on Birchwood Road near Inlet View Drive.

According to the report, Mr. Jacobs and Williams were in the living room of their home when they heard the shot. They rushed into the next room and discovered nat Mrs. Jacobs had shot herself, the left side with a 22 caliber

oistol.

The Churiak Volunteer Fire

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance was summoned, but Mrs. Jacobs had apparently died of internal bleeding by the time they arrived. The incident took place at 11:30pm on Friday.

Funeral arrangements are being handled by the Evergreen Memorial Chapel.

The Jacobs family figured in the news last January 7th, when Mr. Jacobs shot himself accidently with the same 22 caliber pistol. He was demonstrating 'he pistol to his wife at the time of that accident.

LOCAL MAN CLEARS DUMP AT OWN EXPENSE

CHUGIAK: A local resident, concerned by the fact that there is at present no one maintaining the Greater Chugiak dump, which is located south of Eagle River, has taken it upon himself to maintain the fill at his own expense.

Glenn Briggs, of Eagle River, stated that the road to the fill has been plowed out and the maximum area is now available at the site cleared for disposal of refuse on a temporary basis and for a test period to determins is users will respect the requirements outlined below.

Briggs feels that the residents of the area have no choice but to find a method of operating it as a community sanitary land fill. "This can only feasibly be done through taxation to support maintenance of the fill, which will be open to the residents seven days a week and without a unit fee tharge," said Briggs.

across field, through woods, brush, over streams and mountains. Many times they traveled at night. In North Dakota they traveled through a wind storm with the wind blowing 40 miles per hour and the temperature 2 degrees below zero. When they passed through Coal River at mile 500 on the Alaska Highway, the temperature was 32 degrees below zero.

The trip was not without problems, some mechanical and some man made. When the men arrived at Dawson Creek, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police refused to permit them to proceed up the Alaska Highway. They were delayed there five days before, thanks to the efforts of Don Leach, President of the Dawson Creek Chamber of Commerce, and the Mayor of Dawson Creek, the red tape was cut and they were permitted to proceed.

Another delay and a four day layover was encountered at Whitehorse. There one of the machines

broke a chain, and Burns wired ahead for a replacement. Although he instructed his supplier to send the chain in chare of the Canadian customs, somehow or other it ended up in the hand of the U.S. Customs at Fairbanks, who impounded it. Burns finally decided not to wait, but made an emergency repair, and proceeded to Haines Junction, where he had instructed his wife to meet him with the chain and other spare parts. Mrs. Burns drove their pick-up truck with the parts to Haines Junction, and then accompanied the three men back to Anchorage. Burns pointed out that this was the only time on the entire trip that they had any outside assistance.

The only incident which marred their cross country effort, occurred in Alberta, when they were forced to put their machines on trucks and ship them for 600 miles. The reason for this was the lack of any snow whatsoever. When they arrived at

Alpine Alaska, they also ran into bare pavement, and in order to be able to continue, they installed the wheel kits that Mrs. Burns had brought with her, and drove the rest of the way in on wheels.

They arrived in Anchorage on the morning of Friday, February 25th, and drove into town down Third Avenue, and turned tack to Muldoon Road where Burns has his shop.

Burns two companions on the trip were, Swueek O'Conner, who is employed by Burns as a mechanic, and Duane Parks of Anchorage.

All three of the machines were new when they left the factory. Two of the machines will be replaced by brand new ones by the manufacturer, and the originals returned to Crosby where they will be placed in the factory museum. Burns said that he wouldn't part with the machine he drove for any money. The Scorpion is all horsepower machines, the only size that is made by Trail-A-Sled.

Burns is not certain as to whether this trip is any world record for

Burns is not certain as to whether this trip is any world record for a snowmobile under winter conditions (of the 3,400 miles they traveled 2,800 on their machines), but he says that they are the first to challenge the Alaska Highway and the Yukon on this type of equipment. All three men were in excellent health, the only physical mishap suffered was when Parks frosted his face during the North Dakota wind storm. The machines are presently on display at Motor-

If your wife asks your opinion on anything, I think she should expect an honest ans er. However, if you are offering these views without being asked, then I can understand why she might feel hurt. If you


can't bring yourself to say a complimentary thing when you don't feel it, then keep silent and say nothing.

MTA STATES EQUITY REFUND POLICY

The Matanuska Tele-PALMER: phone Association has announced the following program on refunding equity payments to subscribers.

This follows last week's announcement that MTA will no longer require the payment of the \$40 equity that was required in the past before telephone service would be given.

This program is to be adopted so that it will equize the require-ments among all members. This entails refunding the \$40 equity that has been supplied by members to date.

"The association", said Max Clements, manager of the MTA, is not in the financial position to is not in the financial position to refund this amount (approximately \$70,000) all at one time. In addition any refunds to members of capital supplies, must be approved by REA.

It has been recommended that the Association approval of REA the Association approximate approval of REA the

pending approval of REA, the Association refund up to \$10,000 each year of the equity provided by subscribers. This limit schedule would be conditioned by a statement of policy that no repayments of equity capital would be made that would reduce the cash reserves of the association below an amount equal to sixty days estimated operating capital re-estimated operating capital requirements.

"The retirement schedule would be based on the age of the equity provided by subscribers with the oldest contributions being retired first.

A review of each account would determine if a portion of the equity stock would be retained as a security deposit.

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

The classes will be held every Mouday, Wednesday and Friday eve-uing from 6:30pm until 10:30pm, for


a total of 14 weeks, to end July 1st. There will be no tuition charge, but a registration fee of \$5.00 is required.





U.S. CANADIAN TOUR SET FOR THIS SUMMER

COLLEGE- Dick Wechter, an instructor at Sheldon Jackson College in Sitka, Alaska, has announced a "Geographical Seminar" and tour of the United States and Canada to take place this summer between June 10 and, September 3. The tour will cover 15,000 miles in 83 days of travel. The seminar will provide Alaskan students with the opportunity of travel outside their own state and will enable them to earn up to six credits of economic and physical geography. An important aspect of the trip will be the presentation of illustrated lectures about Alaska across the country.

The trip begins with visits to the Alaska Centennial site at Fairbanks and Mount McKinley National Park. 

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
