NEW POST OFFICE DUE FOR EAGLE RIVER

EAGLE RIVER: Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien today advised Postmaster Lucile M. Fly of the Eagle River, Alaska Post Office, that the Post Office Department has accepted an assignable land option for the site of a proposed new post

office uilding in Eagle River.
The property, which is located at the corner of Glenn Highway and Cornado Road, comprises approximately 25,275 square feet, and is presently owned by Thomas James Take, Jr. and Vernon Roi ert Burger

both of Eagle River.

The site option will be transferred to the successful idder, who will purchase the land, construct the building to Post Office Department specifications, and lease it to the Post Office Department.

The proposed utilding will contain 4,187 square feet of interior floor space, with a 120 square foot platform, and 15,500 square feet of parking and maneuvering area.

FIRE GUTS OBERG BARN

PETERS CREEK: The cause of the spectacular fire which completely destroyed the hay barn belonging to Russell Oberg at mile 21 1/2 has not been determined.

Mrs. Oberg stated that when she first noticed the fire at approximately 9:00pm last Wednesday night the hay was already urning fiercly, and all she could do was get her family together and get the livestock out of the adjacent cow barn.

The Obergs, who have one of the very few working farms in the Greater Chugiak area, had approximately \$11,000 to \$12,000 worth of hay in the barn at the time of the fire. Mr. Oberg was away from home that evening, attending night courses at Anchorage. Mrs. Ob-erg called the Fire Company, and both the Chugiak and Eagle River Volunteers responded with their equipment. The Muldoon Fire Com-pany also sent a piece of equipment under the mutual aid agreement. All the firemen could do was keep water on the Oberg home and other farm luildings to keep them from catching fire from the fierce heat of the burning hay.

EKLUTNA: The tractor unit of a large truck and trailor was gutted by a sudden fire, last Sunday night at mile 30 on the Glenn Highway.

The driver of the truck, Walter Schuh of Anchorage, told State Police that the engine appeared to burst into flames just after he crossed the

railroad tacks near Eklutna.
The driver was unable to uncouple the trailer from the tractor unit, and it escaped the fire.

The truck belonged to the Budson Co. of Anchorage. The flathed trail-er, which belonged to Dave McAllister of Anchorage was empty at the time.

The driver, who was unhurt, suggested that the fire may have been started from an electrical short in the vehicle, which may have been jiggled when the truck crossed the tracks.

Someone had summoned the Chug-iak Volunteer Fire Company who responded to the call.

COLTS CONQUER CONTINENT

EAGLE RIVER With the interest in snowmobiles mushrooming all over Alaska, as well as the South 48, Danny Jensen, local dealer for the Polaris Snow Traveler has called attention to the coast to coast

endurance run which two Polaris
Colts completed last December.
Driven by two Minnesotans, Jim
Langley and Clark Dahlin, the two
machines began their historic winter Odyssey on November 28th from English Bay in Vancouver, British Columbie and arrived on December 21st at Portland Maine, thus com-pleting the longest snowmobile en-durance run on record, logging a tot-al of 4,018 miles during their grueling 24-day trek.

The machines were stock 15 hp Colts. They averaged about 23 miles to the gallon, and oten loped along at speeds up to 60 mph. Only minor mechanical problems occurred during the trip, Dahlin said,

Their machines, built in Roseau, Minn., by the biggest United States manufacturer of snowmobiles of snowmobiles, were specially equipped with turn signals, horns, high and low beam headlights, windshiled wipers, seat belts, stop lights, Minnesota vehicle license plates and wheel-ski kits. A out 750 to 1,000 miles of their journey were made on snow their journey were made on snow; the rest on state and interstate highways where they averaged 45 mph.

The millions of people in the United States and Canada who watched and cheered their gallant journey

into the unknown probatly wondered why two normal young men would strap ...selves to exposed, bumpy snowmobiles and set out to conquer a continent during its most unpleasant season.

Langley said he wanted to make the Langley said he wanted to make the snowmobile safari "to promote the young sport," while Dahlin, speaking for both of them said, "I wanted to see if it could be done."




