PETERS CREEK: Plans to develop a recreation area at Mirror Lake at mile 23 were announced today by Mr. Ted Smith of the Department of Parks and Recreation of the Division of Lands, State of Alaska.

The plans call for a 12 acre area, to

he divided into a boat launching area with suitable parking space, picnic areas, and a swimming beach with picnic shelter, dressing rooms, sand be-ach and parking area.

The boat launching area would be located on the south shore of the lake, just at the point where the outlet of the lake enters the culvert at the highway. The picnic area would be located on the opposite shore near the outlet. The swimming beach will be located around the point from the picnic area, at the spot presently in use by the public for swimming. The entrance to the parking area will be approximately 1,000 feet beyond the lake outlet. The boat launching area would be

The swimming at ea would be mark-ed with floats and bouys, and be off-limits for all boats. A fresh water well will be drilled for the picnic

Funds for the project will be pro-

Funds for the project will be provided by the State, with matching Federal funds applied for. The total cost of the project will be \$27,000. Mr. Smith said the work on the project is scheduled to begin in July, and all work with the exception of clean-up and landscaping to be completed this summer. The area will not be closed to the public (within reason) during the time construction is underway. ion is underway.

The area is to be known at the "Mirror Lake Picnic Wayside." Smith said there are no plans at present to provide for lifeguards at the beach.





### THIS MAKES TWO STAMPS FOR SEWARD

SITKA -March 30 will no De the first time the U.S. Post office has issued a commemorative stamp to honor the unique and unusual prowess of former Secretary of State William Henry Seward.

In 1909, on the occasion of the Alaska Yukon Exposition a Seattle, a stamp was issued to honor the significance of Sew-ard's achievement in negotiat-ing the Purchase of Alaska from Russia in 1867.

Today's stamp, which will be issued in Sitka on Seward's Day, March 30, also honors the former Secretary and celebrates the a 100th anniversary of the acquisition of Alaska from Russia for \$7.2 million. The vertical 8 cent air mail stamp reproduces an Indian Totem. It is a line drawing in white against a dark brown background.

The cost of the First Day Covers is as follows: one first day cover, cancelled 25 cents; there first day lows: one first day cover, can-celled, 35 cents; three first day covers, cancelled, \$1; one first day cover, two stamps cancelled, 50 cents; one first day cover, block of four, 80 cents; one first day cover plate block, \$1.65.
