FREE MINING CLASS OFFERED AT CHS

BIRCHWOOD: A class in prospect-ing is being offered at Chugiak High School by the Mining Extension of the University of Alaska.

This is a four week course, taught by Henry Waterfield, registered mining engineers.

The classes began Monday evening April 10th in the biology lab at Chugiak High School. Late registration is being accepted through Monday, April 17th.

There is no charge for this course, although students are expected to purchase text books. These cost \$4.50.

The classes are held 7pm until 9rm Monday through Friday, and cover minerology, geology, pros-pecting and mining. No previous experience is necessary. Students will be learning prospecting meth-ods through lectures, movies and practical laboratory experience involving simple chemical tests.

The course is not accredited, but

a certificat is issued to students satisfactorly completing the work. Experienced prospectors who wish to increase their knowledge, and ovice prospectors eager to begin will gain valuable new stills. will gain valuable new skills.

ACCA WILL PAY CASH FOR SKETCHES

CHUGIAK: Mrs. Jeanette Beatty, trustee for the Chugiak Chapter of the Alaska Crippled Children's Association, would like to remind local artists that the ACCA pays cash money for sketches for their Christmas, stationery notes etc.

Mrs. Beatty says "While we hope artists will wish to contribute their sketches to help in our service program, we will pay up to \$50.00 for drawings which we can use. If the drawing is contributed to ACCA (and is accepted as a design for one of our items) the artist will receive a receipt acknowledging cost of donated design. Or if the artist prefers, we will be happy to supply them with a quantity of the finished product in lieu of payment for design."

The sketch should be in the same proportion and up to twice the size of the unished card or note paper. For the Christmas Cards the "Baronial Fold" (folded 4 1/2 by 5 1/2) AND "Tall Card" (folded 7 1/4 by 3 1/2) is used. There are, of course other suggestions and if the sketch is appropriate, a card or not paper size to fit will be chosen. Designs for stationery or note paper will be arranged to fit the required size.

Sketches should be made on white are paper and ... black india ink. Lines should be on the bold sice, and drawings kept simple (shading is permissible if kept within the immediate area of drawing). Fine lines and light shading do not reproduce well when art work is reduced in size. Design should not be boxed, and enough space left around design so it can "bleed off" the card or note paper if necessary.

To keep cost of production at a minimum, one color ink only should be used, however, an additional color can be used in a drawing is outstanding and warrents it.

There is no deadline for submitting art work to be used in special merchandies, as the ACCA is continually looking for appropriate designs, however, the Christmas season tends to inspore some artists to do special designs for Christmas cards.

Designs not accepted will be returned to the artist with a note of appreciation. Artists are asked to include their full name and mailing address on each desing submitted. The artists name will be used on the design if acceptable to the artist and acknowledgement will be made on the back of the cards.

PROJECT HEAD START ANNOUNCED

ANCHORAGE: The Anchorage Borough Schools in cooperation with the local Community Action Agency and the Office of Economic Opportunity expects to conduct Project Head Start in Anchorage this summer.

The program is planned for approximately 165 youngsters who will be six on or before November 1, 1967.

The dates for Head Start are June 26 through August 18, but children should be initially enrolled in the regular one-half day Summer Kindergarten from June 12 to June 26.

regular one-half day Summer Kindergarten from June 12 to June 26.

Beginning on June 26 and continuing until July 21, eligible youngsters may attend kindergarten in the norning and attend Head Start classes in the afternoon. When the kindergarten ends on July 21st, Head Start will continue until August 18 on a full-day basis.

ust 18 on a fnll-day basis.

Centers at Denali and Fairview
Schools are planued with bustransportation provided throughout the
city where needed. The cirriculum
again will include a variety of experiences to help children get ready
for first garde. The main purpose
of the Head Start program is to
prepare children for a happy and
successful school experience.

Since medical attention is a very important part of this program, each student will be given a physical examination and such "individual" attention as is possible. Diagnosis and some treatment of medical, osychological and dental problems also will be offered. In addition, all students will be served a hot lunch and a snack.

Approximately II teachers, 14 teacher's aides, I nurse, I social director, I secretary, I psychologist, I cook, I medical doctor, I dentist, and 8 colunteers will be needed. The Head Start Program is supported by 80% federal funds and 80% local contribution primarily in kind cost of building use, custodial service, administrative service and accounting service.

BILL TO INCREASE TAX EXEMPTION

WASHINGTON, D.C.: A bill to increase from \$600 to \$1,000 the per sonal income tax exemption of a taxpayer was introduced by Senator Ernest Gruening (D-Alaska).

The bill would include exemptions for a spouse, a dependent and for old age or blindness, now allowed under the Internal Revenue Code, Sentaor Gruening said.

"Tayrayers in my state of Alaska."

"Taxpayers in my state of Alaska, more than most," he said, "suffer a disadvantage from the \$600 personal income tax exemption provision. The cost of living in Alaska is nowhere less than 20 percent higher than the highest in any cent higher than the highest in any other state in the Union, Accordingly, the \$600 exemption, which is inadequate in the other 49 states, is intolerable in Alaska."

He maintained that the \$600 was fixed in the distant past at a time when that amount of money might when that amount of money might have provided sustenance for a resident of the United States and each member of his family. "As we all know," he said, "that time has long since passed. Yet the \$600 exemption has never been increased to a realistic level,"

"We are all aware," Senator Gruening continued, "that the sum of \$50 a month is woefully inalequate to cover the many expenses involved in rearing a child or feed-

involved in rearing a child or feed-ing clothing and otherwise support-ing a wife. In fact, agencies of our government have found officially that expenditure of \$500 a year per

that expenditure of \$300 a year per capita for a lamily would place it far below the poverty level."

Even though legislation dealing with revenues must under the Constitution be acted upon forst in the House of Representatives, Senator Gruening introduced the bill in the Sanate "as anexample and asymbol of a tax reform" which he feels is

long overdue.

He concluded, "I hope such legis-lation will be the subject of early hearings and early favorable action in both houses of Congress,"

WASHINGTON DC: The Geological Survey this week issued the first in a series of six volumes which will be published to provide a reconstruction of the Alaska earthquake and its effects.

The ll page hard cover volumn has many illustrations, some in color, plus sketches, maps and diagrams.

Entitled, "The Alaska Earthquake

- Investigations and Reconstruct ion", the book may be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, Y.S.







Area might be higher pending the establishment of a service area to take care of the local Sanitary Fill.


LOCAL MAN UNHURT AFTER HIT AND RUN
