

BOROUGH CALLS HEARING ON DUMP

TROOPER REAPS UNPLANNED BONUS

EAGLE RIVER: A state trooper, stopping a car to determine whether it was one that had been involved in a hit and run accident earlier that week, reaped an unexpected bonus.

An Eagle River resident had reported having been sideswiped by a car which answered the description of a vehicle the trooper spotted at mile 15 1/2 last Friday. When he signaled for the car to stop, it pulled over and four juveniles jumped out and proceeded to run away on foot. The trooper was able to detain the driver of the car, a 1953 Chevrolet and one juvenile passenger.

He found the car to contain a quantity of liquor, which was identified as some which had been taken from the Liquor Box Liquor store on 1551 Muldoon Road in a burglary on April 5th.

The driver, Robert Charles Webb age 20 of Anchorage, and his passenger, also of Anchorage were arrested and charged with burglary, larceny and "minors in possession." Approximately \$60 worth of bottled goods was recovered.

State police are still attempting to locate the four youth who fled.

It has not yet been determined if the car was the one involved in the hit and run.

FREE MINING CLASS OFFERED AT CHS

BIRCHWOOD: A class in prospecting is being offered at Chugiak High School by the Mining Extension of the University of Alaska.

This is a four week course, taught by Henry Waterfield, registered mining engineers.

The classes began Monday evening April 10th in the biology lab at Chugiak High School. Late registration is being accepted through Monday, April 17th.

There is no charge for this course, although students are expected to purchase text books. These cost \$4.50.

The classes are held 7pm until 9pm Monday through Friday, and cover mineralogy, geology, prospecting and mining. No previous experience is necessary. Students will be learning prospecting methods through lectures, movies and practical laboratory experience involving simple chemical tests.

The course is not accredited, but a certificate is issued to students satisfactorily completing the work.

Experienced prospectors who wish to increase their knowledge, and novice prospectors eager to begin will gain valuable new skills.

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ACCA WILL PAY CASH FOR SKETCHES

CHUGIAK: Mrs. Jeanette Beatty, trustee for the Chugiak Chapter of the Alaska Crippled Children's Association, would like to remind local artists that the ACCA pays cash money for sketches for their Christmas, stationery notes etc.

Mrs. Beatty says "While we hope artists will wish to contribute their sketches to help in our service program, we will pay up to \$50.00 for drawings which we can use. If the drawing is contributed to ACCA (and is accepted as a design for one of our items) the artist will receive a receipt acknowledging cost of donated design. Or if the artist prefers, we will be happy to supply them with a quantity of the finished product in lieu of payment for design."

The sketch should be in the same proportion and up to twice the size

of the finished card or note paper. For the Christmas Cards the "Baronial Fold" (folded 4 1/2 by 5 1/2) AND "Tall Card" (folded 7 1/4 by 3 1/2) is used. There are, of course other suggestions and if the sketch is appropriate, a card or note paper size to fit will be chosen. Designs for stationery or note paper will be arranged to fit the required size.

Sketches should be made on white are paper and in black india ink. Lines should be on the bold side, and drawings kept simple (shading is permissible if kept within the immediate area of drawing). Fine lines and light shading do not reproduce well when art work is reduced in size. Design should not be boxed, and enough space left around design so it can "bleed off" the card or note paper if necessary.

To keep cost of production at a minimum, one color ink only should be used, however, an additional color can be used in a drawing is outstanding and warrants it.

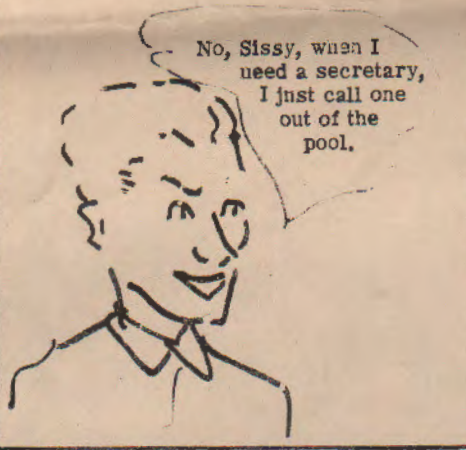
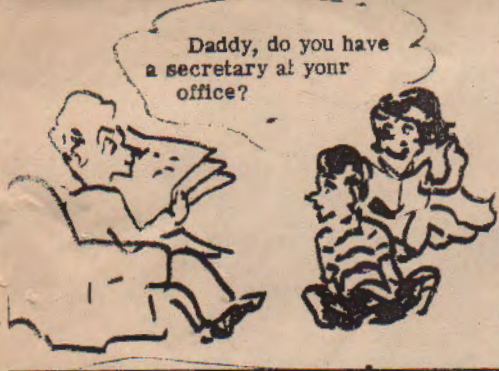

PROJECT HEAD START ANNOUNCED

ANCHORAGE: The Anchorage Borough Schools in cooperation with the local Community Action Agency and the Office of Economic Opportunity expects to conduct Project Head Start in Anchorage this summer.

The program is planned for approximately 165 youngsters who will be six on or before November 1, 1967.

The dates for Head Start are June 26 through August 18, but children should be initially enrolled in the regular one-half day Summer Kindergarten from June 12 to June 26.

Beginning on June 26 and continuing until July 21, eligible youngsters may attend kindergarten in the morning and attend Head Start classes in the afternoon. When the kindergarten ends on July 21st, Head Start will continue until August 18 on a full-day basis.

Centers at Denali and Fairview Schools are planned with bus transportation provided throughout the city where needed. The curriculum again will include a variety of experiences to help children get ready for first grade. The main purpose of the Head Start program is to prepare children for a happy and successful school experience.

Since medical attention is a very important part of this program, each student will be given a physical examination and such "individual" attention as is possible. Diagnosis and some treatment of medical, psychological and dental problems also will be offered. In addition, all students will be served a hot lunch and a snack.

Approximately 11 teachers, 14 teacher's aides, 1 nurse, 1 social director, 1 secretary, 1 psychologist, 1 cook, 1 medical doctor, 1 dentist, and 8 volunteers will be needed. Interested persons may contact the personnel office of the Anchorage Borough School District, 670 Fireweed Lane, concerning employment. For information concerning registration, eligibility, volunteer work etc., please contact the Community Action Agency or the director, Mrs. Etheldra Jordan at the Fireweed School from 3:30

to 5pm Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

The Head Start Program is supported by 80% federal funds and 20% local contribution primarily in kind cost of building use, custodial service, administrative service and accounting service.

Although the program is free to parents of eligible children, it does not effect local taxation and complete elimination of Head Start would not reduce the regular school operating budget.

While the project application has been approved by the ABSD school board and the local C.A.A., formal approval by the San Francisco Regional Office of the Office of Economic Opportunity is pending and expected before April 15.

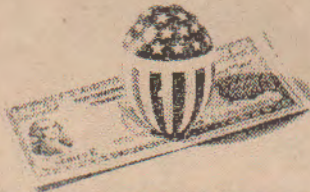
LOOPERS TO ELECT OFFICERS

BILL TO INCREASE TAX EXEMPTION

WASHINGTON, D.C.: A bill to increase from \$600 to \$1,000 the personal income tax exemption of a taxpayer was introduced by Senator Ernest Gruening (D-Alaska).

The bill would include exemptions for a spouse, a dependent and for old age or blindness, now allowed under the Internal Revenue Code, Sentaor Gruening said.

"Taxpayers in my state of Alaska, more than most," he said, "suffer a disadvantage from the \$600 personal income tax exemption provision. The cost of living in Alaska is nowhere less than 20 per cent higher than the highest in any other state in the Union. Accordingly, the \$600 exemption, which is inadequate in the other 49 states, is intolerable in Alaska."

He maintained that the \$600 was fixed in the distant past at a time when that amount of money might have provided sustenance for a resident of the United States and each member of his family. "As we all know," he said, "that time has long since passed. Yet the \$600 exemption has never been increased to a realistic level."

"We are all aware," Senator Gruening continued, "that the sum of \$50 a month is woefully inadequate to cover the many expenses involved in rearing a child or feeding clothing and otherwise supporting a wife. In fact, agencies of our government have found officially that expenditure of \$300 a year per capita for a family would place it far below the poverty level."

Even though legislation dealing with revenues must under the Constitution be acted upon first in the House of Representatives, Senator Gruening introduced the bill in the Senate "as an example and a symbol of a tax reform" which he feels is

long overdue.

He concluded, "I hope such legislation will be the subject of early hearings and early favorable action in both houses of Congress."

EARTHQUAKE BOOK IS NOW AVAILABLE

WASHINGTON DC: The Geological Survey this week issued the first in a series of six volumes which will be published to provide a record of the Alaska earthquake and its effects.

The 11 page hard cover volume has many illustrations, some in color, plus sketches, maps and diagrams.

Entitled, "The Alaska Earthquake -- Investigations and Reconstruction", the book may be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, Y.S.

Lee Jordan, spokesman for the committee said that he would like to see more representation from the Eagle River area on the committee. Interested persons are urged to attend the meeting.



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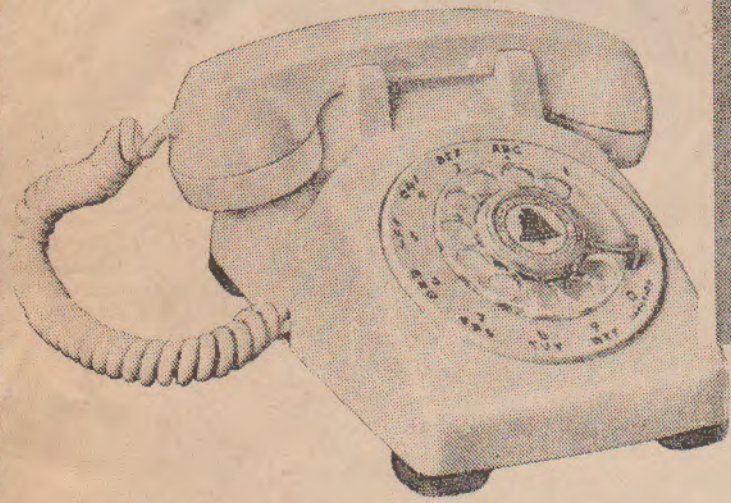
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LADIES CLUB TO MAKE SHOW PLANS

Edward A. Bellringer, of Mt. Eklutna Drive in Peters Creek, will now be responsible for Wildlife Conservation programs for all three components of the Alaskan Command. This includes the Air Force Alaskan Air Command, the Army, U.S. Army Alaska and the Navy, Alaskan Sea Frontier. He will be in charge of conservation programs conducted at all military installations in Alaska including far off Adak.

Bellringer was chosen for this position because of his background in hunting, fishing and conservation.

He is a member and past president of the Matanuska Valley Sportsmen and also a past president of the Alaska Sportsmen's Council, an organization composed of delegates from all the sportsmen's clubs in the State. He is a past secretary for the Outfitters and Guides of Alaska. He is a member of the Alaska Big Game and Trophy Club and is an official measurer for the Boon and Croquet Club. He is currently Secretary for the Anchorage area Fish and Game Board Advisory Committee, and is a member of the National Wildlife Federation Military Lands Committee.

Bellringer came to Alaska in 1951 at which time he was a member of the Air Force. He became involved in conservation activities almost immediately as Conservation agent for the 64th Fighter Squadron. Upon discharge from the Air Force he assumed the post of Conservation Advisor for the Alaskan Air Command, a position he has held since 1960. During the time he served in this capacity Elmendorf Air Force Base won three awards for Wildlife Con-

servation, Eilson Air Force Base two awards, Clair Air Force Base one award, and the Alaskan Command was selected as the outstanding Conservation Organization in Alaska in 1966 by the Sears Foundation and the Nation Wildlife Federation and Alaskan Sportsmen's Council.

Bellringer has been a resident of the Chugiak Area all the time that he has lived in Alaska. He is a commercial pilot and flight instructor and owns his own plane which is based at Birchwood Airstrip. 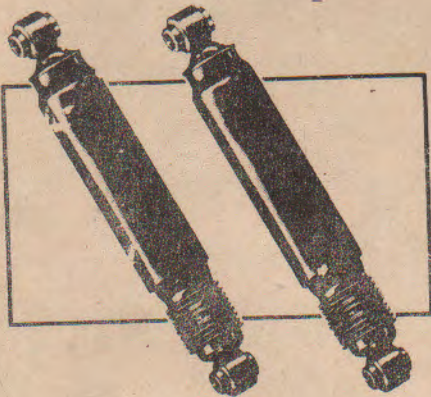

Chugiak's Bill Cahill came in 3rd in the 2 mile run.

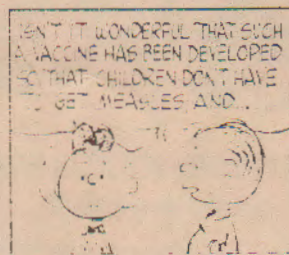
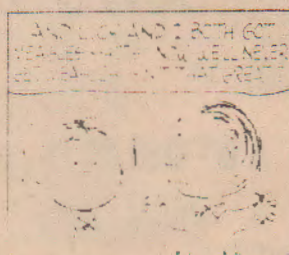
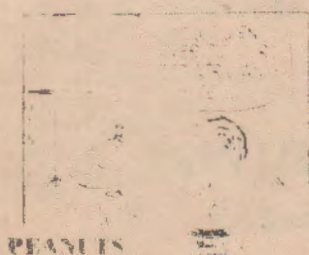

The proposed new rest area will be located on the Elliot Highway on Fox Creek, about 1/2 miles from where the Elliot leaves the Steese Highway. The area, located at approximately 65 degrees N. Latitude, will have six picnic sites, complete with tables, fireplaces, garbage cans, and modern rest rooms. Bids will be opened on April 25 at 11am.

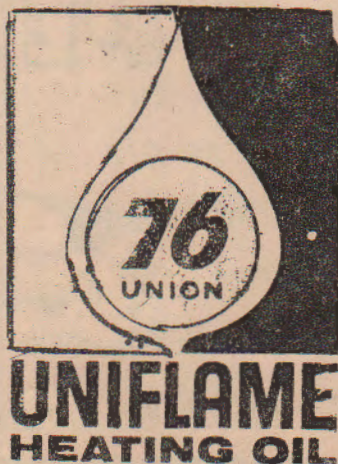
