BRIGGS ELECTED TO MEA BOARD

P.iLMER: Dale Briggs, of Eagle River, was elected to the Board of Directors of the Matanuska Electric Association at the annual meeting, held Saturday, April 8th at the Central School in Palmer. Briggs, who received 99 of the 303 votes cast, will represent the

at the Central School in Parmer. Briggs, who received 99 of the 303 votes cast, will represent the represent the interests of the Greater Chugiak Area of the Board, replacing James Ekstedt who did not seek re-election.

Also elected were Robert Douglas (incumbent) who received 137 votes,

and Phil O'Neil who received 131. Of the other candidates, John Nichols received 92 votes, Minnie Swanda, 88 votes, Randy Frank (neminated from the floor by Gus Scheele) 88 votes, Lee Twing 40. There was one write-in vote, and one nomination from the floor, This was for Dan Bell, of Eagle River, who declinded.

NEW LIBRARY PROGRAM FOR CHUGIAK GRADE SCH.

OLD CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Elementary School is slated for an expanded Library program, under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, PL 89-10. This federal act, is designed to

This federal act, is designed to offer special educational library program to economically deprived areas.

A survey of Anchorage School District schools, conducted last year, showed three schools in greatest economic need. These were Fairview, Denali and Mt. View Schools. The program has been in effect in these three schools this past year. Fourth in line for this program was North Star School, and fifth was the Chugiak Elementary School. However, in view of the fact, that Chugiak Principal Emerson Sortore, submitted an extensive survey which he had conducted outlining the way the program could be incorporated in the Chugiak school, it was decided that the program would begin at the Chugiak school before North Star where uo ground work had been done.

Mr. Sortore described the program and the way the school would be modified to accomodate it.

A wall between two of the class rooms would be removed to triple the area of the present school library. Sortore said this would be a multi media center, with a section designed 1.r showing of educational movies, and an area set ANCHORAGE: The GAAB School District Administration today announced the appointment for a new principal for Chugiak High School.

The new principal will be Laurence N. Graham, who is presently assistant principal at East Anchorage High School.

He is married and has two children, Mike 5 and Scott 3, He lives at 1430 E. 27th Avenue in Anchorage, He will officially take over his duties as principal on July 1st.

Mr. Graham will be replacing Mr. Barney Sabo as Chugiak High School Principal. Mr. Sabo will be transferring to Romig Junior High School, where he will serve as assistant principal. Mr. Sabo explained that the transfer was at his own request. He explained that his interest has always been primarily at the Junior High School level, and he desired the transfer so that he could become oriented with the Junior High School program, and return in several years as the Principal of Chugiak Junior High School. He will continue to make his home in the Chugiak area.

ASSEMBLY VOTES FOR LOCAL SERVICE AREA

ANCHORAGE: The GAAB BAssembly, following a public hearing last Monday night, voted to establish Service Area No. 11, in Section 1, for the maintaining and operation of a Sanitary Fill near Eagle River. In order to comply with the con-

cept of a second class borough the residents of Section 1 will be asked to vote on whether they will accept the Service Area at a special election scheduled to be held later this year. As an interim measure, the bor-

ough assembly appropriated \$1,000 from the general fund to pay for the costs of operating the sanitary fill until July 1st.

Glenn Briggs, former assembly-man from Section one, had sub-mitted a proposed duget for operation and maintenance of the san-itary fill. He felt this could be supported by a two-tenths mill tax on real and personal property in the service area. This would cov-er Obligated road and dump site clearing which took place last February and March and continue this through June 15th. It would also allow for semi monthly main-tenance at the rate of \$20,00 per hour. The sanitary fill would be hour. The sanitary fill would be open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and no supervision would be required, as no dump fee would be charged,

The Borough Assembly also authorized a study group to look into the matter of areawide maintenance of sanitary fills by the borough,



aside for primary readers. In addition to conventional books, there will be sound-viewers, equipped with earphones, so the individual student could view film strips without disturbing others in the library. He said there might also be viewers with film strips which could be checked out and taken home like library books.

A full time librarian and a full time assistant librarian are anthorized to conduct this program. The librarian would be a teacher with a

library science background. The program is slated to go into effect on May 1st, 1967, and con-tinue every weekday during the summer. A school bns , which would circumvent the community will pick up interested children during the school vacation months and trans-port them to the library.



BLM CALLS FOR CAMPGROUND CLEANUJ

The Bureau of Land Manage ment in Alaska is conducting ar anti-litter campaign called "Operation Clean-Up." In announcing the campaign Burton W. Silcock, state director for BLM in Alaska, s a id that the program is developed to encourage the public not only to p o l i c e their own litter but also to pick up that left by others.

The BLM is presenting "Clean Camp Commendation" certificates to those people who maintain clean camp and picnic sites on BLM land. In addition to the certificates, colorful litter bags are provided by BLM personnel. Silcock went on to say that "Operation Clean-Up" differs

Silcock went on to say that "Operation Clean-Up" differs from many other anti-litter campaigns in two key respects: first, it encourages the public to remove trash and debris left by previous visitors in addition to disposing of their own refuse (an attractive plastic litter bag is supplied for this purpose):

is supplied for this purpose); and second, it provides adequate and easily accessible locations for disposal of litter.

While persons may pick up their own debris, they fail to be concerned about that left by previous campers, BLM personnel have observed. Also, people hauling their own litter away from camp sites frequently become discouraged carrying it around in their vehicles searching for a place to deposit it, and as a result, it ends up in a ditch further down the road. "Everyone has seen truck loads of beer cans, botties and other rubbish trewn along the ditche., id campgrounds and streams each summer," Silcock said. "Much of this presents a sanitation problem and must be picked up. It costs money to clean up this unnecessary mess."


