

# CYCLE CRASHES INTO POST OFFICE

**EAGLE RIVER:** A young Eagle River woman miraculously escaped injury when the 1966 Honda motorcycle she was driving crashed through the plate glass window of the Eagle River Post Office.

Dolores M. Craig, age 19 had pulled into the parking area in front of the Post Office, and apparently hit the throttle instead of the brake. The cycle jumped the curb, and crashed through the glass, and traveled the full length of the box lobby, hitting the boxes along the back wall.

A four year old boy, who was in the post office with his mother at the time, was knocked over by the run-away cycle.

The youngster, Kurt A. Koehler, son of Mrs. Maryanne Koehler of Birchwood, escaped with a minor cut on his lip and a bruise on the back of his head. The driver was uninjured, and the motorcycle appeared to be undamaged. The Honda was owned by Louis M. Youngdahl of Anchorage.

Miss Craig was cited for driving too fast for conditions and not having an operators license.

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## BOXES OF EXPLOSIVES FOUND ABANDONED

**OLC CHUGIAK:** Three boxes of high explosives were found by a local woman beside an unoccupied house at mile 20 1/2 Glenn Highway this week.

Mrs. Fred Smith, of Ptarmigan Valley Road spotted the boxes at the intersection of Ptarmigan Valley Road and Glenn Highway and notified the State Police.

The boxes were found to contain 50 pounds each of dynamite. Two boxes containing 50% dynamite, and one 60% dynamite.

The boxes appeared to be in good condition, and had apparently not been there very long. One of the boxes was stamped with the lettering "Northern Supply Inc."

The manager of Northern Supply, upon checking their storage at the powder magazine at mile 15 1/2, discovered that the lock had been forced, and the box of explosive stolen. A complete inventory would be necessary to determine if any more dynamite was missing. The other two boxes apparently were taken from the powder storage of Yukon Supply, who also store their explosives at the Powder Magazine.

State Police had called in Ordinance disposal from Ft. Richardson who had taken custody of the dynamite

Governors of the forty nine other states of our union have a unique incentive to visit Alaska during 1967: they own property in the state.

It is unlikely any other state can make this boast, according to Dorothy Page, chairman of the Matanuska-Susitna Centennial Committee. Each governor was sent a deed to a square foot of land in the Centennial Acre at Flathorn Lake. Their plots are set aside as "Governors' Row."

Invitations were extended to the governors to visit in 1967 and also to have representatives from their states compete in the Iditarod Trail Centennial Race. Responses showed much interest in the event and even possible entrants for next year's race which is to be known as the Iditarod Trail Seppala Memorial Race.

Maine's Governor, Kenneth M. Curtis, "not only contacted the

Maine Sled Dog Racing Association for possible entrants in the race, but also sent a state flag 'of appropriate size to be placed on my new land in Alaska,'" Mrs. Page reports.

Cottonwood pillars will support the Mat-Su exhibit for Alaska 67 displays. Carl Fritzer is preparing the wood and John Ball of Wasilla has painted a backdrop


showing scenes from history of the Matanuska-Susitna region.

A gem stone and mineral display arranged with the assistance of Mary King of Palmer a huge relief map and a continuous slide show of vistas of the two valleys will also be featured in the exhibit.

Although not specifically designated a Centennial project, a tourist information center and museum is being put together by citizens of Palmer in time for the special year's visitors. Logs will give the 30 by 40 foot building a rustic air in keeping with its design.

Two notable features of the full concrete block basement will be a curator's room for renovating artifacts and a complete washroom facility for tourists. The latter attraction is in deed a thoughtful way to say welcome."

Judges for the show will be Mr. Robert Waters from British Columbia, and Mr. George Higgs, from Rosemead California.

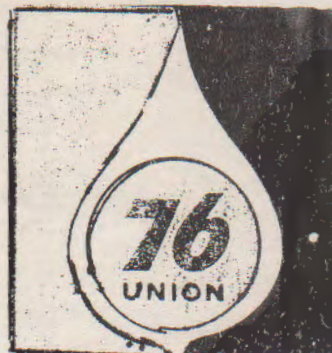
In the nature of a rehearsal for the show, a fun match will be held at the Orah D Clark School on April 23rd, starting at noon.

3: Disposal at no time of wrecked cars or car bodies in the dump area or along the roadway.

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### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

I writing in the hope that some of this information can be used in your newspaper.

The Borough Library Study Committee was appointed by the Borough Assembly last fall to study the library services now available to the residents of the Borough, and to gather information on library needs in the area.

This committee will report to the Borough Assembly in late May, and will try to give them information which will enable them to plan for the best possible library service for all the people of the Borough, within our means.

This committee has both professional librarians and interested citizens as members. An effort has been made to have representation from as many areas of the Borough as possible.

At present an effort is being made to give all citizens of the Borough an opportunity to express their views. This is being done through contacts with organizations and individuals, and also through a questionnaire. This was published in a newspaper advertisement April 8th; and through the courtesy of the city of Anchorage, a similar questionnaire is being distributed with city utility billings this month. Also a public open meeting is scheduled for May 3rd at Central Junior High at 8pm.

A sense of immediacy is given to our study of the possibility that federal funds, which have made possible the experimental programs at Eagle River, Chugiak and Girdwood, and the Bookmobile, will not be available much longer. The use of these federal funds has also resulted in the elimination of fees charged formerly at the Loussac Library. Do we want to see these programs lost? With the exception of the Spenard Library, the main burden of public library service throughout the area has been carried by the Loussac Library. The tremendous growth of our area, and the so-called "Knowledge explosion" which makes centers of reference more important than ever, make it

likely that we will need and want more, not less, library service in the years to come. It is necessary that we begin now, to plan intelligently for the future. This committee hopes that an awareness of this need and a pride in our community will cause many citizens to take an active part in this planning. Their participation will be most welcome.

Rear Admiral White will journey to Anchorage from Kodiak specifically to participate in this unusual event.

The Alaska U.S. Navy Centennial Company will depart this same day from Anchorage to San Diego, Calif., to commence an eleven week recruit training program prior to assignment to units and elements of the fleet. These 100 per cent voluntary enlistees represent 31 different Alaskan communities with 25 per cent being native Alaskans, Harrington said. Seventy-five per cent of the membership of this company represent communities other than Anchorage, making it an unusually splendid statewide representation, he added.

He noted with particular emphasis that 95 per cent of the Alaskan U.S. Navy Centennial Company are high school graduates, the average age being 18 years of age.



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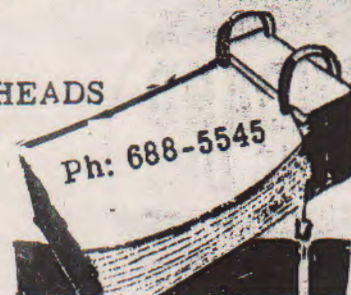
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## Tell it to Martha

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## CHUGIAK MAN FINED FOR GAME VIOLATION

PALMER: A Chugiak man was one of a pair who were cited for taking waterfowl in closed season and for having unlawful possession of water fowl.

James W. Doggett of Peters Creek and Miles M. Arent, of 4210 Cope St. Spenard were cited by protection officers Fred Smith and Carl Branham and Doug Jones of the Game Division of Palmer on April 20th at the Palmer Hayflats.

They were arraigned before alderman Magistrate Dorothy Saxton, where both plead guilty. They were fined \$350 each and sentenced to 75 days in jail (suspended). Their firearms, a Browning 12 gauge autoloading shotgun and a 22 caliber Remington rifle were forfeited. The latter weapon is illegal for shooting waterfowl even during the open season. They also lost their hunting privileges for one year.

The waterfowl which they had in their possession consisted of six Canada geese, 5 mallard ducks, and 1 pintail duck. Both Federal and State regulations had been violated.

The spring migration of waterfowl is now underway and are being carefully observed by both U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Bureau of Sport Fish and Wildlife, and the Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

The migration can be observed in the vicinity of the new bridge crossings on the road to Palmer.
