MAN SHOOTS SELF IN BIRCHWOOD



THE CHUGIAK PUBLIC LIBRARY, NOW LOCATED IN THE OLD CHUGIAK POST OFFICE BUILDING AT MI. 10 1/2 GLENN HIGHWAY, ACROSS FROM THE CHUGIAK ELEMENTARY SCHOOL.

BIRCHWOOD: An Anchorage man was found dead of a self inflicted gunshot wound, Saturday, April 1st near the Isaac Walton Rifle Range in Birchwood.

The victim was Gerald Roy David of 11703 West Hillcrest, Space 18.

His body was discovered in his car, which had been parked at the side of the road, by two brothers, Ronald and Tom Lundy, of Birchwood. A third man, Calvin Bruce Parks, of Anchorage also came upon Davids car at the same time the Lundy brothers drove up. Both the Lundy boys, and Parks had gone to the range to target practice and all three had noticed the car on their way down. When Parks passed the car on his return from the range he stopped to investigate. The Lundy boys were behind him, and also stopped. They found David dead in the seat, with a wound from a 38 caliber Colt Python revolver in his left chest.

State Police investigating the case ruled the death to be suicide. David, who was employed by the Port of Anchorage, had relatives in Colorado, but none in Alaska. Fellow employees said that he had been despondent of late, and had recently purchased the gun.

Ed Willis, assemblyman from Section one said that it does not appear that there will be any increase in this area.

STATE POLICE TELL OF NEW POLICY

ANCHORAGE: The State Police announced a new system of police coverage for the Greater Chuglak area starting next week.

The new system will eliminate the having two resident troopers in the area, but instead would assign a trooper from the Anchorage office to patrol the area between the scale house and the Knik River Bridge in eight hour shifts, twenty-four hours a day. This would give around the clock police protection, instead of only sixteen hours a day as when two troopers were permanently assigned to this area.

Local residents wishins to summon a State Trooper, will be asked to call the State Police office in Anchorage at 272-1561, the the trooper on duty at that time would be dispatched by radio.

FUNERAL SERVICES FOR HERMAN JONES

EAGLE RIVER: Funeral services were held last Sunday, April 2nd, at 2pm, at the First Baptist Church of Eagle River for Herman Jones, age 53, of mile 13 1/3 Glenn Highway.

Jones died suddenly last Wednesday at 2pm at the 5040th Air Force Hospital, the victim of an apparant heart attack.

Jones came to Alaska in 1953 from Callesville Texas. He was employed at Fort Richardson in the refrigeration section, and was a co-owner of Eagle River Cold Storage.

He was a member of the Chugiak Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and also a member of the Disabled American Veterans.

Jones had no previous history of heart trouble, and had worked the midnight to 8:00am shift at Fort Richardson on the 29th. He had complained that day of feeling ill, and asked a friend to drive him to the hospital, where he died shortly after his arrival.

He is survived by his widow, Dora, a son Ralph, who is a student at

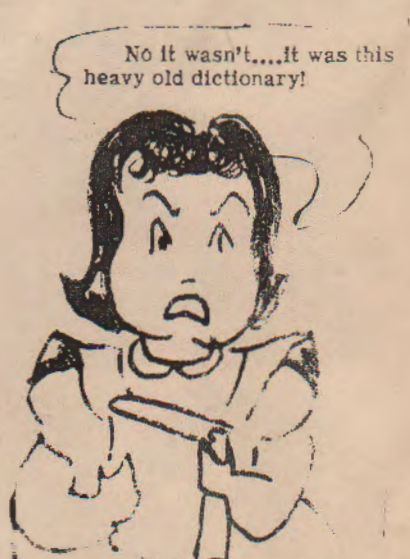
MEA manager, said. All nominees must be consumer members of MEA, he added.

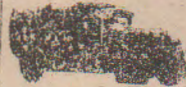

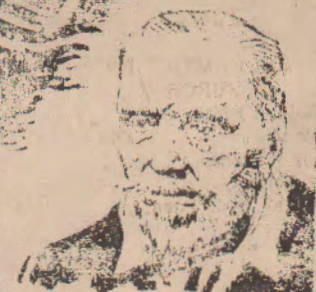

OPEN LETTER TO LOCAL RESIDENTS:

Thursday, April 13, the Assembly will approve the Borough budget for the new operating year, beginning July 1, 1967, which now calls for an increase in taxes from 10.9 mills to 12.8 mills. All of the increase will occur in the school budget, which if approved will go from \$20,096,830, to \$22,786,753.

The State and Federal governments provide \$12,561,016 of the total and Borough property owners make up the difference, which is \$10,255,737. Under our present narrow tax base, real property owners, representing only 54% of the beneficiaries of boroughwide services would be paying 88% of this tax bill.

Each year local governments get 3% less Federal and State support than the year before. Today the Borough receives one-third less in Federal and State support than it did four years ago.

If we continue to operate our Borough Government on the present narrow tax base real property owners' tax bills will increase at the rate of 30% each year for the support of schools.

We must continue to support a superior educational program. However, all who benefit from our educational system should contribute equitably to its support, which many are not now doing under our present tax system. The only legal means of broadening the tax base is by a sales tax approved by the voters at the polls. It is estimated that a 2% sales tax will bring in between 4 and 5 million - approximately half the amount required for support of schools. Forty percent of this amount will be collected from those who are not now contributing their fair share or any share.

Money alone does not assure a school administration, and the school board must be more attentive and more responsive to the parents' evaluation of school programs.

SUMMER KINDERGARTEN TO START IN JUNE

ANCHORAGE: The summer kindergarten Program of the Anchorage Borough School District will open on June 12, after registration June 8-9, according to William Tanner, director of the six-week pre-school program for pupils eligible to enter first grade next September.

"Our program will be similar to that offered in previous years," said Tanner. "Classes will be held at all elementary schools on a half-day basis from June 12 to July 21st. We expect to require about sixty teachers since all sessions will be held during the morning hours."

Tanner said that children are not required to attend Summer Kindergarten before entering first grade even though all educators recognize the importance of the program in preparing the children for the full-time requirements of the first grade.

"We can't require attendance in the summer because we can't offer school bus transportation service to those students who do not live within walking distance to school, and yet we can't emphasize too much that children need the program to ease the transition from their daily life in the home to spending more than six hours at school when they enter first grade."

Although an estimated 2,200 pupils will enter first grade next September, Tanner estimates that only 1,300 will attend summer kindergarten. He attributes the relatively low attendance to the lack of free school bus service and to a high number of conflicts with parental vacation plans.

"Many parents hold their children out of summer kindergarten so they can travel in the summer," he said. "This kind of conflict sometime can't be helped."

Tanner noted that only children who will be eligible to attend first grade in September may attend a summer kindergarten. They must reach their sixth birthday on or before November 1, 1967, to be eligible. The program should not be confused with the proposed Operation Head Start program which is scheduled at selected elementary schools June 26 to August 18, if federal authorization for the project is obtained.

Summer kindergarten was initiated several years ago when the regular half-day full-year kindergarten program was deleted due to the extreme growth pattern of the school district at that time.

SCHOOL BUSES TO IMPROVE LIGHTS

ANCHORAGE: The Anchorage Borough School District buses will have an improved warning light system next year, according to Joe D. Montgomery, assistant superintendent for auxiliary services.

"All our school buses will be modified this summer to include eight warning lights on the rear of each bus," said Montgomery. "The new system, required under state law as of next September, will be an integrated electronic system. Approximately 300 feet before the school bus will stop, four amber lights will begin flashing. When the bus comes to a full stop, the amber lights will switch to red and four additional red lights will begin flashing."

Montgomery said the existing safety code does not allow buses to use flashing lights except when actually stopped. The new warning system is expected to help trim the number of rear-end collisions involving school buses. About 20 such accidents per year have occurred, according to Montgomery.

"The \$12,000 cost of modifying our buses to meet this new safety requirement is certainly justified," he commented. "This School District is proud of its school bus operation. Our buses provide 10,000 passenger trips per day and travel about 5,000 miles per day with a very minimum difficulty and maximum safety," he noted.

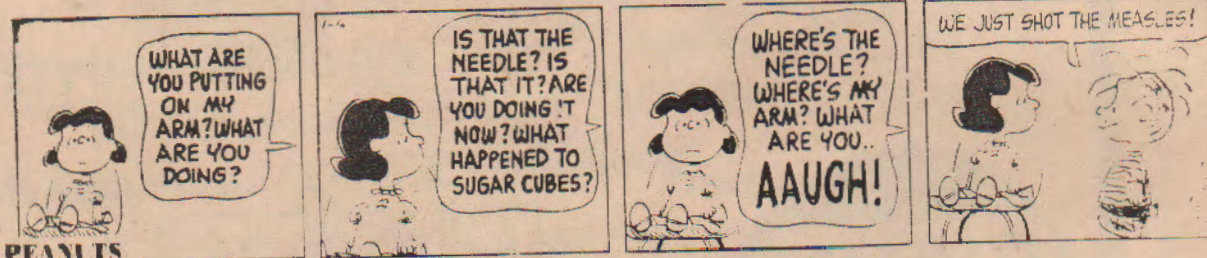

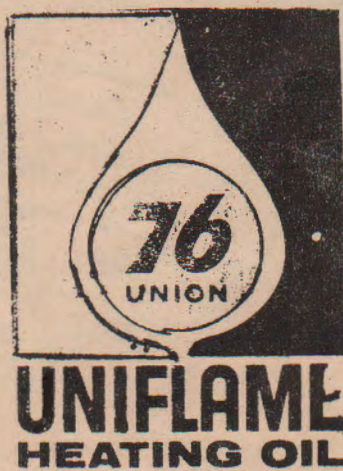

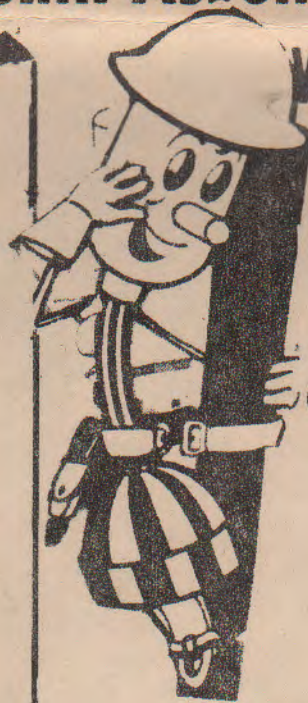
