JERRY RANKIN GETS ARMY SCHOLARSHIP

LAFAYETTE, IND: An Eagle River youth is one of six Purdue Uniiversity students who have won two pear scholarships to that institution. All six are members of the Army reserve Officers Training Corps. (ROTC).

The local student, is Jerry A. ikin, a sophomore in Chemical Rankin, Engineering. Jerry is the son of James Rankin of Monte Road in Eagle River. Jerry was a member of the last class of seniors from the Greater Chugiak Area to graduate from East Anchorage High School. He was awarded a scholarship from the Alaska Federation of Women's Clubs under the sponsorship of their local affiliate the Chugiak Ladies Club upon his graduation. In his senior year at East High he won first place in the State Science Fair in his division, and represented Alaska at the National Science Fair,

The scholarship which he has recently won will pay for all tuition, fees and books for his remaining undergraduate study and allow \$50 a month living expenses.

The Department of the Army selected the six Purdue students in a group of 153 outstanding Army ROTC STUDENTS OF THE Fifth Army There ware 356 scholarships awarded nationwide.

Ft. RICH: The local sanitary fill again made the local headlines when a number of local residents went to dump their trash this weekend

dump their trash this weekend. The area, located within the Ft. Richardson military reservation had been recently publicized as a free public dump, open twenty-four hours a day.

Complaints poured into the Borough office, to the Knik Arm Courier and to Glenn Briggs, representative of the Chugiak Benefit Association from people who either had found the dump locked, or encountered an individual who demanded payment for the privelege of dumping. The dump area is under lease by

The dump area is under lease by the BLM to the Chugiak Benefit Association. CBA several years ago had entered into an agreement with John Grassee of Anchorage to maintain the sanitary fill. Recently, CBA had contacted the GAAB and proposed that they take over the dump, as Grassee did not appear to be living up to his terms of the agreement. The Borough had advanced \$1,000 from the contingency fund to clean up the area and keep the trash covered and filled as an interim measure until a service area could be established at the next election

CBA had then entered into a contract with Mr. Ramerd and Mr. Roteman of Hyland Hills to clean up, and keep the dump covered and filled on a twice monthly basis, at the rate of \$20 per hour.

the rate of \$20 per hour. The mixup this past weekend, was apparently caused when Grassee moved back, and was trying to charge for the use of the dump. Briggs stated today that Grasee

Briggs stated today that Grasee has received a letter from CBA notifying him that the agreement.has been terminated due to his failure to comply with even minimum requirements of the agreement.

Briggs advised local residents that the dump is open on a twenty-four hour basis and is free to the public.

He stated that in the event anyone should find the cump again closed off, or if someone is attempting to collect a dumping fee, to contact him immediately.

He reminded local residents that the dump will be kept open on a trial basis providing the public observe and respect the following simple rules. 1. No dumping or droping of materials of any kind except at the dump site. 2. No disposal of junk cars or car odies along the road or at the dump site. 3. No burning except by authorized persons, no shooting along the road or at the dump site.



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
LOCAL WRESTLERS GOOD AT A.A.U.MEET


ANCHORAGE: Eagle River and Chugiak schools were well represented in the recent A.A.U. State Wrestling Tournament which was held recently in Anchorage.

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
TIL'S TOWER TOPS TREES

were only three inches narrower than the space between the bridge railings, and gave everyone a few anxious moments before they were success fully eased across.

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
DON'T STICK MOTHER FOR EXTRA POSTAGE

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
