CLEANERS RE-OPENS UNDER NEW MGMT.

EAGLE RIVER: The Laundry and Dry cleaning plant at Eagle River opens today under new management. Formerly known as the Eusy Bee Laundry and Cleaners, the establishment will now operate under the name of Quality Cleaners.

The owner and operator of Quality Cleaners is Clarence La May, of Eagle River. La May had built the building, which had been under lease to the former operators of the Eusy Bee. La May is the owner of the Eagle River Laundry Center on Eagle River Road.

Quality Cleaners will operate house to house pick up and delivery anywhere in the Greater Chugiak Area. Two trucks will be in operation, and schedules will be published as soon as they have been worked out. Persons interested in having their laundry and cleaning picked up, may call 694-2700 and learn the time the route man will be in their area.

The cleaning plant will be open for business Monday through Saturday, from 7am to 6pm.

CHUGIAK SHOOTERS STATE CHAMPS

FT. RICHARDSON: The Chugiak High School Junior Rifle Team brought home two team trophies and one individual honor when they shot in the Alaska State Championship Tournament on Friday and Saturday, May 12 and 13.

The Chugiak Tyro Team topped their class with a fine score of 2,140 out of a possible 2,400. Members of the team were Mike Ford with a score of 552, Arm Braendel, 548; Mike Deal, 521; and Fred Arndt, 519.

The Novice Team also came through with a fine victory, with a score of 589 out of a possible 800. Members of the Novice Team were Jerry Vanover 168; Kave Ekstedt, 155; John Vanover, 154; and Neil L'erty, 114. Jerry Vanover also captured the individual State Championship Novice Award.

This tournament was fired on Ft. Richardson's outside 50 meter range at 50 meter International targets. Each member of the Tyro Team fired the English Match, which is 60 shots fired from the prone position. Each member of the Novice Team fired 20 shots prone.

PALMER YOUTH DIES IN AUTO CRASH

EKLUTNA: A Palmer area youth is dead following a head-on collision which took place at 2:30pm Sunday, May 14th at mile 25 1/2 Glenn Highway.

According to State Police, the driver of the 1959 Chevrolet sedan, Micheal James Cirafisi, of mile 39, was attempting to pass another car on a curve, when he met a 1963 Ford Station wagon, coming in the opposite lane.

The driver of the Ford was Ambrose B. Burns, of Ft. Richardson.

The impact totally demolished both vehicles. Cirafisi, apparently was killed immediately. A passenger in Cirafisi's vehicle, Frank D. Newton, 17, of Sterling Alaska, was taken to Providence Hospital where he is suffering from a fractured leg and lacerations of the face.

Burns was taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital. His injuries are listed as compound fracture of the left leg, possible broken hip, broken left hand and arm, and lacerations of the face. There were no passengers in the Burns car.

The deceased was the son and stepson of the proprietors of Del Roi's Restaurant at mile 39. He was 18 years of age.

Both local ambulances as well as the military ambulance from Ft. Richardson responded.

BOWLING ALLEY DEAL LOOKING BETTER

EAGLE RIVER: Prospects look a little brighter this week for the group who are attempting to raise enough funds to keep the Eagle River Bowl from going out of existence.

A spokesman for the group stated that if commitments for an additional \$28,000 can be shown, the owner of the building will allow the group to incorporate and give them sufficient time to raise the remainder of the money needed to purchase the facility outright.

Les Peterson, owner of the building told one of the group, that even though he has two prospective buyers (neither of whom plan to operate a bowling alley), he is reluctant to see the community lose this recreation facility, and is willing to do everything that he can within reason to help them save it. Anyone, who may have been considering investing in this is asked to please get in touch with either Lucille Fly, Bill Watkins or Ray Viau at the Bowling Alley, and they will explain the financial details to them. Time, however, is still of the essence, although an extension of the original May 12 deadline has been granted.

LIONS AND SCHOOLS
PLAN CENTENNIAL CLEAN-UP

CHUGIAK: Resident of the Greater Chugiak Area, will participate in the Clean Up Campaign, sponsored by the Centennial Commission this weekend.

Students at the area schools will clean up their respective school grounds on Friday morning. On Sunday, beginning at 8:00am, other local Lions Clubs will pick up trash along the Glenn Highway from the Eagle River Bridge to mile 24.

The Chugiak Lions will begin at the mile 24 end, while the Eagle River Lions begin at the Eagle River bridge. They plan to meet somewhere halfway.

A spokesman for the Lions Clubs said that if people who live along the Glenn Highway would like to clean up their respective yards, and place the trash along the road in suitable containers, the Lions will see that it is picked up and hauled away. He requested however that no junk car bodies or other bulky items be included.

He went on to say that members of the Centennial Commission are planning an inspection of the area

including private yards. Where piles of trash are in evidence, the home owner will be given a deadline in which to clean it up. If this deadline is disregarded, a pick-up vehicle will be dispatched to pick up the trash, and the home owner billed for this service.

VFW HALL BROKEN INTO AND BURGLARIZED

EAGLE RIVER: The Chugiak VFW Hall at Mile 13 1/2 was broken into sometime late Sunday night or early Monday morning, and approximately \$100 in cash was missing.

The break-in was reported to State Police by Donald R. Muetz of Eagle River.

It was believed that the door had been forced open with screwdrivers and a hammer, the latter having been left at the scene. Case is still under investigation.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL SEEKS INCORPORATION

OLD CHUGIAK: A meeting for the local Neighborhood Council of the Community Action Agency has been called for May 23rd, at 7:30pm, at the Chugiak Elementary School.

Chairman for the council, M. J. Elva Connell urges that each of the Churches, service clubs and other organizations in the Greater Chugiak Area will send a representative to the meeting to express their views on the incorporation into a group which can better serve the members of the community who qualify for aid under any of the Office of Economic Opportunity programs.

At an earlier meeting of this group, the following items were discussed, 1. Plans to combine small local groups into one council for the purpose of incorporating, 2. Plans for a Headstart program that would operate during the regular school year.

At this earlier meeting, the group voted that the chairman (Mrs. Connell) proceed with the development of the plans for the incorporation of the councils. Mrs. Connell was requested to have the plans ready for presentation at the May 23rd meeting.

The purpose for incorporating is to enable the councils to better serve the members of the community that qualify for aid. Those members of the community who do not qualify but do need aid of some kind will be helped to help themselves by participating in the Neighborhood council.

It is particularly hoped that the Board members and the General Body of the Chugiak Benefit Association will attend, as the council will be working in the same area as the CEA.

Mrs. Jean Flynn, who is with the "Grass Roots Program" of the Community Action Agency, has presented a resume of the plans for a winter headstart program. The school district has presented the plans to the Anchorage Area Community Action Office, and they have been forwarded to San Francisco for final approval. If the plans are approved as presented, the school district will operate the Headstart program with funds received from the Community Action Agency.

Mrs. Flynn had indicated that the children from the Greater Chugiak Area who attend the headstart program would have to be bussed into Anchorage. Further investigation proved that this would be necessary only if there were not enough children (at least 15) enrolled to fill a class locally.

Forms are now available at the elementary schools, from council chairmen, Mrs. Elva Connell at 694-2384, Mrs. Pat Sherman at 688-6471 and at Wooten's Taste Freeze in Eagle River. Information has been requested on three, four and five year olds, so that planning for future can also be accomplished.

The Council again urges all interested local residents to attend the meeting of May 23rd, at 7:30pm at the Chugiak Elementary School.

CITIZENS PATROL SUGGESTED HERE

EAGLE RIVER: A local man concerned with the rash of vandals and burglaries which have plagued the area recently is thinking in terms of organizing a citizen's protective patrol.

Dale Pierson, operator of Alaska Range Service, and Northern Drilling, hopes to interest responsible local men in forming a group to patrol, observe and report any evidence of law breaking.

This group, he said, could work in cooperation with the State Police, and render assistance whenever asked.

Pierson believes that with the great influx of visitors expected to the State this summer, things will become even worse, and he feels it up to local people to protect their interests.

WORK BEGINS ON BIRCHWOOD SCHOOL

BIRCHWOOD: The contract for the Birchwood Elementary school was awarded last month, and work on that facility has already begun.

The contract went to F. & W. Construction of Anchorage. This is the same contractor who recently completed the addition to Chugiak High School.

The Birchwood grade school will be located on the Birchwood Loop Road, just one quarter of a mile past the high school.

The school is scheduled to be completed and ready for use by the end of October.

There will be an awards assembly at Chugiak High School on May 23. All the athletic awards and scholarships will be presented at that time.

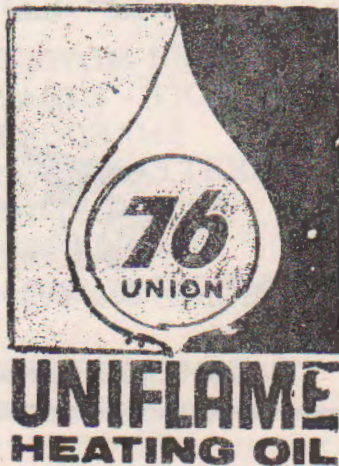
Friday, May 12, was the climax of the Data Processing course that several CHS students were taking. This was the night of the social where the certificates and pins were presented.

The driver of the car was Yolanda Cathers, 19 of Eagle River Road. The accident took place on Eagle River Loop Road, near the intersection of the Eagle River Road.

Neither Yolanda, nor the driver of the grader, John Stockhausen of Peters Creek were injured. The 1966 Ford sedan sustained major damages. No citation was given.

WOMAN INJURED IN ONE CAR ACCIDENT

BUTTE: A one car accident, which took place on the Glenn Highway Alternate in the Butte area, totally demolished the 1961 Ford Falcon Station wagon.

The driver of the car, Larry W. Walt, of Anchorage, 48, told the Police that he lost control of the car when the right front wheel got off the pavement and into the loose gravel of the shoulder. In attempting to correct, he veered across the road, and down a bank where the car rolled over once.

Mrs. May J. Walt, a passenger, received lacerations of the right leg. She was taken to Palmer Hospital for treatment. Two other passengers, as well as the driver were not injured.

SEVENTH GRADE TO MOVE TO CHS

ANCHORAGE: All seventh grade students in the Greater Chugiak Area will be attending classes at Chugiak High School next fall, according to Mr. Don Fridley of the GAAB School Administration.

Fridley said the student will be housed in re-locatable classrooms which will be moved from other locations to Chugiak High School.

He said the reason for this is threefold. 1. In that way all the seventh grade students would be in one central location, making it possible to present a better educational program. 2. This will make it possible to make better use of available teachers, and allow the students to take advantage of the better library and other facilities at the High School. 3. This will help avoid double shifting at any of the schools should the new Birchwood facility be completed on time.

Fridley stated that he hoped that parents realized that re-locatable classrooms were not anything in the "gounset hut" class, but complete self-contained, full sized and fully equipped classroom facilities.

BOAT WRECKED IN CAR ACCIDENT

PETERS CREEK: A Wasilla man lost control of his 1961 Chevrolet Pick-up truck, and smashed it into the railing of the Peters Creek bridge, totally demolishing the vehicle.

Otto Tollefson, 38, told the State Police that he was unable to control the truck as it came around the curve and down the hill.

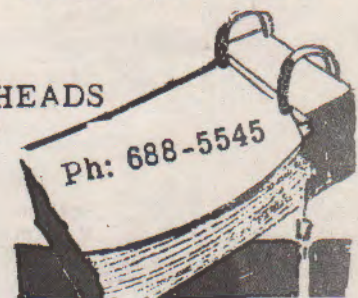
