GIRL UNHURT IN FREAK WRECK

PETERS CREEK: A Palmer girl sustained only minor injuries when her car left the road and overturned at mile 22 last Thursday afternoon.

Kathy J. Worley, age 17, told the State Police that a ball joint suspension member of her car gave way when she struck a bump in the road.

She said this caused the car to veer off the road and to roll over.

Damage to the car was estimated at \$750. Miss Worley did not require hospitalization. There were no passengers.

GOAL FOR BOWLING ALLEY CLOSER

EAGLE RIVER: An extension has been granted to those who are attempting to raise enough money to keep the Eagle River Bowl from closing.

A spokesman for the group who are planning to form a corporation to buy the bowling alley and property said that only \$26,000 is needed to achieve this goal.

Les Peterson, owner of the building, has told the local group that although he has a potential buyer for the building, he would prefer to see it remain as a bowling alley, rather than be converted to some other use, and has therefore extended them the extension to raise the remaining funds.

A total of 500 shares at \$50 apiece will be sold, and the establishment will be operated by a board of directors elected by the stockholders.

At present the bowling alley and the 300 Room are open for business evenings after 7:00pm.



GLENALLEN: Two escaped prisoners from the Anchorage City prison farm stole a vehicle from a local man, and wrecked at mile 175 last Sunday.

The 1953 1/2 ton pick-up truck belonged to F.S. Lee of Old Chugiak. State Police stated that the theft took place sometime between late evening on the 20th and early morning on the 21st.

The driver of the truck, Ronald T. Komak, age 20, lost control on a curve, and skidded across the road and into a ditch at a private driveway. Neither he nor his passenger Gerry B. Sokienna age 24 were injured. They were apprehended by a State Trooper at mile 175 at 10:00am on Sunday, May 21st.

They have been returned to Anchorage where they are charged with escape and other offenses.

The stolen truck was completely demolished.

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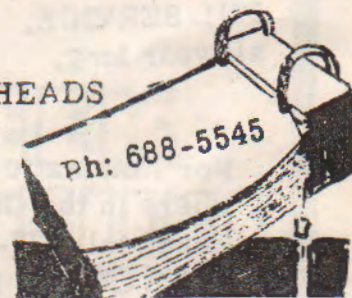

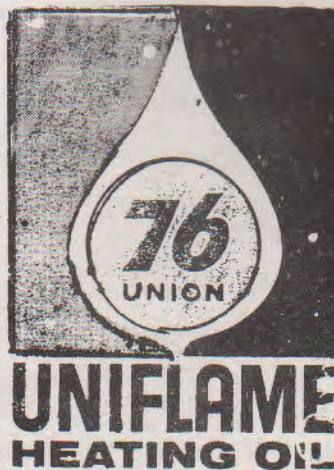
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Tell it to Martha

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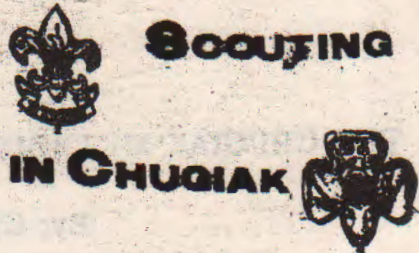
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SCOUT PACK TO MEET

The Eklutna Community Hall is located at mile 26 1/2 Glenn Highway.

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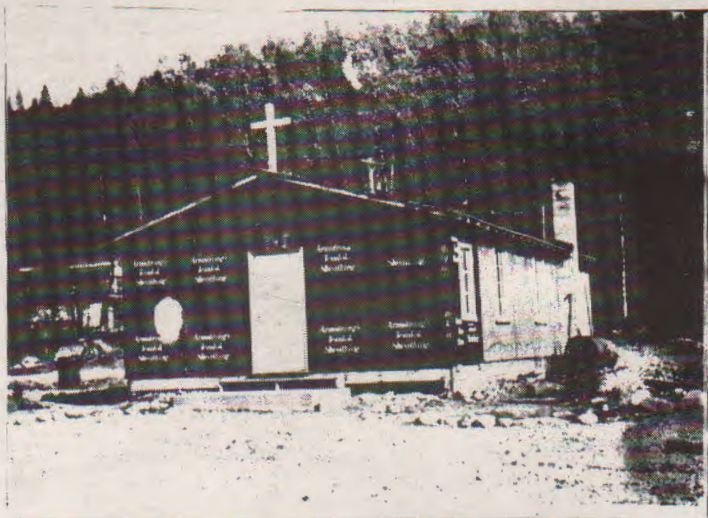
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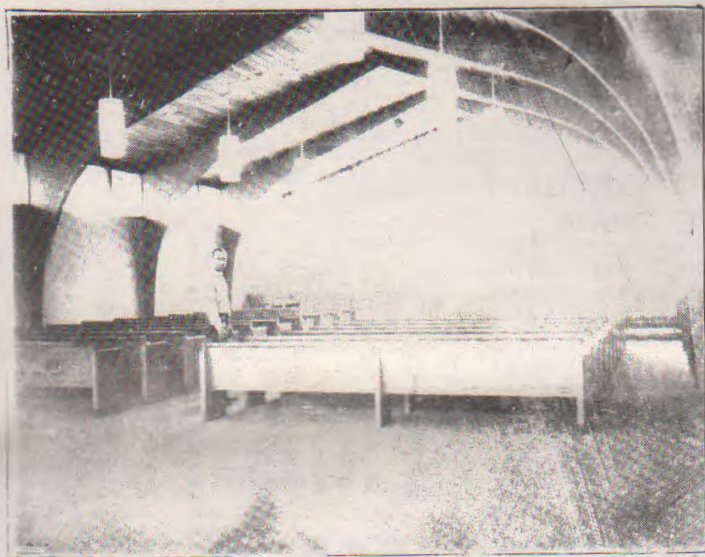
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One of the earliest photos of the original Chugiak Methodist Church. This building has since been remodeled and presently houses the Chugiak Post Office.

THE CHUGIAK METHODIST CHURCH

It was thirteen years ago, on November 29, 1954, that the Quarterly Conference of the Chugiak Methodist Church, Chugiak Alaska, passed a resolution that the Trustees be authorized to "sign, seal, execute and deliver to the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church, a Note or Bond in the sum of ten thousand dollars, and further to execute to the said Board a Mortgage in the sum of ten thousand dollars secured upon all the property of said church."

This sum of money was expended in true faith, for prior to this, a small band of worshippers had been meeting in various homes in the community. The money was used to purchase the building where services were held for nearly seven years.

From a small group of charter members, the congregation increased to the point where it was decided to look for a piece of land on which to build a new and larger church. At this time the membership had swelled to 84. The situation is vividly described in a letter from Rev. Wayne Hull, who at that time was pastor of the church. "The present building, very inadequate in furnishings and arrangements, is 20 x 40 feet in size. We have a well-attended and growing church program, which includes a newly-organized choir, youth activities meeting on Wednesday evenings, Woman's Society and Church school. The building has reached the saturation point for church school use. Three classes of children meet in the poorly lighted basement. An average of 40 are jammed into an area of 18 by 20 feet of floor space. Adult and youth classes meet in the worship room upstairs. I know some families who are already reluctant to come or bring their children because of the overcrowding and consequent difficulty of teachers to give the best kind of religious education. Every pew is filled for worship."

On August 18, 1959, the Land Committee found approximately nine acres of land about Mile 18 on the Glenn Highway. The church board members moved to inspect the land on "the first Sunday after the pastor returned from his leave in September." Just a year later, the Division of National Missions of the Methodist Church granted a donation of \$32,000 and an additional loan of \$25,000 for the construction of a basement church on this same property. In his pastor's report of May 1960, Rev. Hull said, "This Church is meeting increasingly the

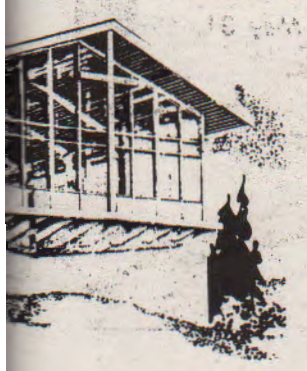

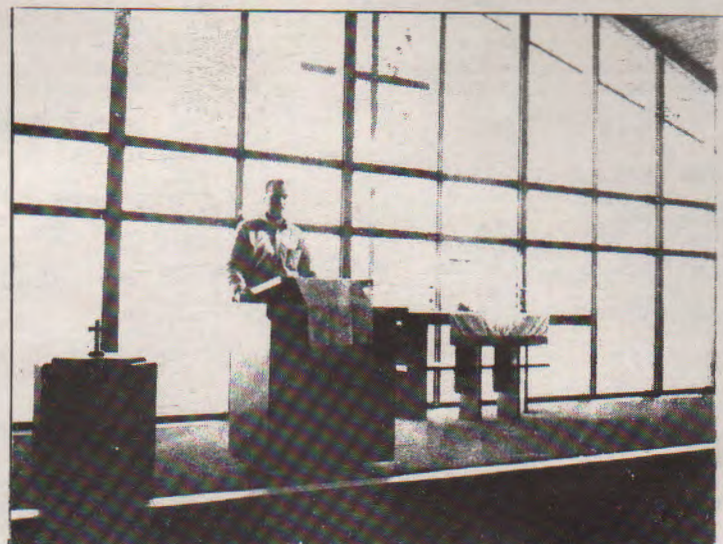

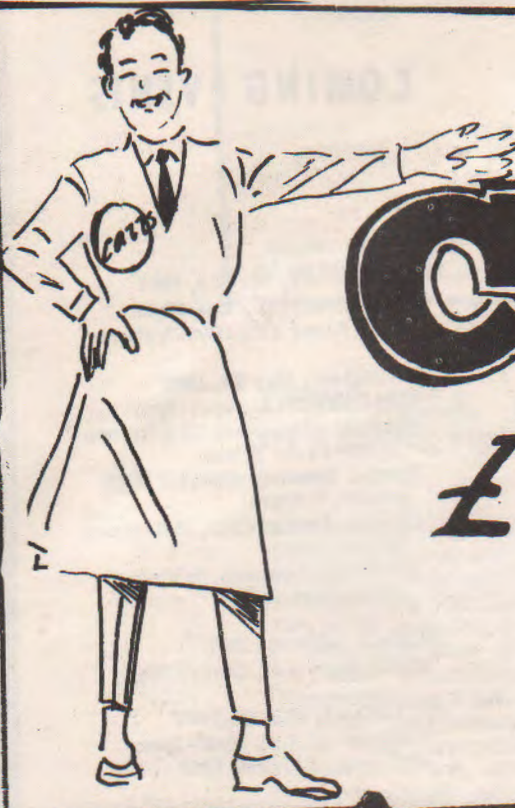
