

GOAL FOR BOWLING ALLEY CLOSER

YOUTH JOB REGS TOLD

Summer approaching means "no more pencils, no more books" but for the child who is on vacation, it may or may not mean "lots of fishlines, lots of hooks,"

The minor under 18 is prohibited from work involved in operation of floating plant, including loading or unloading of boats and barges; the hanging, tending or brailing of fish traps; and aboard power-driven fishing vessels equipped with power

driven winches.
Otherwise, employment is permitted for boys 16 and 17 years of

a oard trol ing loats and seine fishing boats, provided they have registered on proper forms with Labor Commissioner, Thomas J.

Also, Commissioner Moore said an important exception to the rules is that a child of any age may be employed on a cat owned and operated by the parent. Mr. Moore emphasized that the purpose of the Alaska Child Labor Law is not to restrict employment, but to insure safety and protect wouth insure safety and protect youth interests.

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
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

THE CHUCIAK METHODIST CHURCE

SAN MALES

It was thirteen years ago, on November 29, 1954, that the Quarterly Conference of the Chugiak Methodist Church, Chugiak Alaska, passed a resolution that the Trustees be authorized to "sign, seal, execute and deliver to the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church, a Note or Bond in the sum of ten thousand dollars, and further to execute to the said Board a Mortgage in the sum of ten thousand dollars secured upon all the property of said church."

This sum of money was expended in true faith, for prior to this, a small band of worshippers had een meeting in various homes in the community. The money was used to purchase the building where services were held for nearly seven years.

From a small group of charter mem ers, the congregation increased to the point here it was decided to look for piece of land on which to wild a ew and larger church. At this time the mem ership had swelled to 84. The situation is vividly described in let er from Rev. Wayne Hull, who at that time was pastor of the church. "The present wilding, very inadequate in furnishings and arrangements, is 20 x 40 feet in size. We have a well-attended and growing church program, which includes a newly-organized choir, youth activities meeting on Wednesday evenings, Woman's Society and Church school. The building has reached the saturation point for church school use. Three classes of children meet in the poorly lighted basement. An average of 40 are jammed into an area of 18 by 20 feet of floor space. Adult and youth classes meet in the worship room upstairs. I know some families who are already reluctant to come or I ring their children because of the overcrowding and consequent difficulty of teachers to give the est kind of religious education.




