CARR'S HOLD GRAND OPENING THIS WEEK

EAGLE RIVER: Carrs Food Centers have completed stocking their new store in Eagle River, and are holding their Grand Opening this week.

week. Carrs took over the Valu City Shopping Center last February and have added to their chain of supermarkets. This store is designated officially as Carr's No. 7, althouth it is at the present time the fourth store which Carr's operates in Alaska. The other three are located on Gamble Street in Anchorage, in the Aurora Shopping Ceuter in Spenard and in Kenal, Eventually Carr's will have seven store total. The local store will be referred to as Carr's Eagle River in all advertisement.

The store has been complet ily restocked and features five complete departments.

Prices at the local store will be the same as at the two stores in Anchorage.

The meat department will offer USDA Choice beef, specially selected by professional buyers in Seattle. This has all been aged for flavor and tenderness, and very rigid standards of trim are observed to assure the customer of the very best value possible.

ed to assure the customer of the very best value possible. A special feature of all Carr's meats, is the "see thru" meat trays, which enable to customer EAGLE RIVER: A group of local citizens are rallying in an attempt to keep the Eagle River Bowl from going out of existance.

to keep the Eagle liver bow hem going out of existance. The owners of Eagle River Bowl Incorporated, Hazenberg, Hazenberg and Viau, have been unable to meet the payments, and the mortgage holder, Action Development of Anchorage is foreclosing.

Since there is no one interested in buying the property and operating a bowling alley, Brunswick who own the equipment, will re-possess the machinery and the alleys themselves will be chopped up.

The local group feels the loss of this recreation center would be very harmful to the community, and are attempting to raise enough money through the sale of shares to purchase the building, bowling equipment and property outright.

equipment and property outright. A spokesman for this group explained that the goal is \$240,000. This, he said would, cover the cost of the land, building, and all equipment including the restuarant and the 300 Room. He said they were hoping to sell 500 shares at \$500 each. Once this is done, the group plans to incorporate, and operate the bowling alley through an elected board of directors. He went on to explain that the

He went on to explain that the only reason that Eagle River Bowl has had financial troubles was because of the enormous payments on a short term loan. It is unon a short term loan. derstood that the monthly payments on this loan were in excess of If a corporation were to \$3,000. own the property free and clear, the only expenses would be those of operating the establishment and the overhead. He said that he felt sure the share holders would be receiving return from their invest-ment within two or three years. It was pointed out that the bowling alley provided recreation to both adults and children in the Greater Chugiak Area. Every Saturday during the winter bowling season 50 regular bantam bowlers, child-ren between the ages of 5 and 12 years of age have been bowling. In addition to these, about 20 young-sters are regular substitutes. During the past bowling season over 250 adults bowled in league each week. He concluded by saying that the loss of this would not only hurt the community from a recreation stand point, but it's failure would very likely discourage future investment in businesses in this area.

The group has been given a deadline of two weeks (until May 12) to raise enough money to accomplish this. After that date, the owners of the building (Action Development) will take over.

MOTORCYCLE SAFETY STRESSED

Department of public satety commissioner Mel J. Personett has announced a safety program stressing safe operating procedures for motorcyclists.

Several recent serious accidents with motorcycles might have been avoided if a few simple procedures had been followed. Personett said.

For greater motorcycle safety the commissioner offered the following advice:

Be on the lookout for objects in the road, uneven surfaces, pedestrians, people getting out of cars, traffic about to enter the roadway, and cars about to turn or change lanes. Drive well out in the roadway. . .where you can see and be seen.

Carry a passenger only if you are an experienced driver and if your bike is designed to carry one. Never carry a passenger in front of you.

Don't cut off your view by crowding to close to the vehicle ahead. Reduce speed before entering curves and corners. Don't tempt centrifugal force: it works, especially on wet, sandy or oily pavement. Stunting on public roadways is out!

Never assume you've been noticed. Be visible. Wear bright colors. Remember two most important things, wear a helmut, goggles or face mask, and don't speed. Speeding increases both the danger of not being seen and the severity of the consequences of not being seen.

The injury odds against a motorcyclist are high. While three out of ten auto accidents produce bodily injuries, nine out of ten motorcycle accidents are injury producing.

are injury producing. "The best overall procedure to follow is to slow down and obey all traffic laws," Personett concluded.



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



PORTLAND ORE: Dale Pierson, local representative to the GAAB School Board, accompanied other school board members to the annual meeting of the National School Boards Association in Portland which concluded on Tuesday, April 25.

The Alaska delegation, which consisted of thirty school board members representing nine school districts, was headed by Lloyd Nault of Ketchikan, State President, with Mrs. Kathryn Ostrosky of Naknek and John Hughes of Anchorage as official delegates to the NSBA Delegate Assembly. Denny Breaid of Fairbanks and Keith Lesh of Anchorage were alternate delegates.

Professional negotiations, urban school district problems and federal involvement in education were among the critical issues stressed in general and clinic sessions by the 8700 registrants. Representative Edith Green, and Senator Wayne Morse, both of regon, were featured speakers.

For the first time at an NSBA convention the Alaska association established a headquarters suite and hospitality room. Numerous displays of Alaskana, slides and movies attracted visitors from nearly every state. Informational pass-out materials recieved widespread acceptance.

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




