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

ANCHORAGE: The local Babe Ruth baseball team, sponsored by the Eagle River Branch of the First National Bank of Anchorage, played their first game of the season last Friday evening at Mulcahey Park in Anchorage.

The Bankers squeaked past the Boys Club team from City View 5 to 4. Ronnie Tyson gave out five hits, striking out eleven and collecting the win. Curt Brandon was the losing pitcher.

Boys club whipped ahead in the second inning, but the Bankers won a temporary reprieve in the third inning when Steve Jordan and Glenn Zmuda and Richard Martin bucked the City View team to gain two runs in their half of the inning.

The game remained three to two until the seventh frame when brothers Frankie and Richard Martin scored when Boys Club hurler Ted Jordan the wrong pitch, and the Bankers second baseman tripled.

Big Jim Kohring, then singled home Jordan with what proved to be the winning run. Boys Club returned in their half of the seventh gaining a single after one out on a fly ball to Kohring in center field. Banker Shortstop Neal Bullock ended the game by robbing the Boys Club third baseman of a hit into left field, making a running catch to match any major leaguer. A second game on Monday evening, also at Mulcahey, saw an easy win over an inexperienced Title Insurance and Trust team. Jim Kohring was the winning pitcher striking out eight batters in four innings. Allan Wallis, relieved Kohring on the mound in the fifth, striking out two. Neal Bullock took over the pitching chore in the sixth inning with the score 11 to 5. Bullock threw out one batter and struck out two. The Bankers tallied up nine runs in the seventh, to end the game with a score of 20 to 5. Chugiak sluggers gained a total of 17 hits in the game.

Manager Lee Jordan says that the Chugiak team looks strong, but figures that the Boys Club will be a tough team to beat.

CONCERNED PARENTS TO PETITION SCH. BO.

BIRCHWOOD: A group of concerned parents met last Thursday night at Chugiak High School to attempt to learn why the School District Administration was planning to move the seventh grade students from the Eagle River Elementary School to Chugiak High School next fall.

Mr. Gordon Guffey, Superintendent of Instruction for the GAAE School District was present, along with Mr. Dale Pierson, School Board member from this area.

Mr. Guffey explained that the move was made for a double purpose. One to avoid double shifting at the Eagle River School in the event that the new Birchwood School was not completed by October as scheduled; and secondly because it was believed that instruction would be available to the seventh graders with the superior High School facilities at their disposal.

A spokesman for the parents present felt that while this appeared to make sense on paper, it would not work out simply because the facilities at the High School are already overtaxed, and that there would not be room to accommodate the more than 130 seventh graders in the gym, science labs and lunch room. Also, since the re-locatables do not have their own sanitary facilities, this would mean the need to use the rest rooms in the high school.

The group plans to write a letter to the President of the School Board asking permission to appear before the board and discuss the matter thoroughly, and see if a more workable solution can be devised.

LADIES CLUB GETS CASH AWARD

FAIRBANKS: For the second year in a row the Chugiak Ladies Club has received a cash award from the Shell Oil Corp. for outstanding work in the field of Education.

Three awards are offered each year to affiliate clubs of the Alaska Federation of Women's Clubs, who compete for these honors.

Last year the Chugiak group received \$200 for third place in the competition. This year the local group was chosen first in the State of Alaska, and a check for \$500 was presented to the club at the regional convention held in Fairbanks on May 26th.

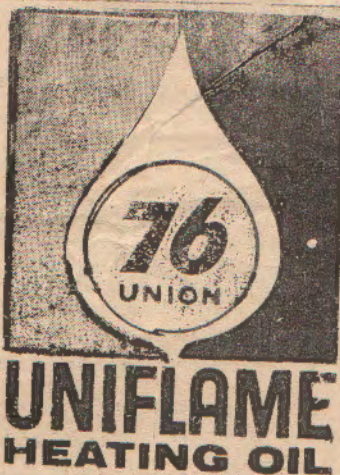

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

An eager crowd of thousands milled outside the main entrance of Alaska 67 last Saturday, May 27th, awaiting the cutting of the ribbon which would signal the opening of the official Alaska Purchase Centennial Exposition. At twelve noon, Governor Walter J. Hickel, flanked by a group of lovely Centennial Queen candidates snipped the symbolic ribbon, and amid the roar of cannons, shrieking sirens, whistles and horns A-67 blasted off.



The crowd streamed through the gate following the Governor and his party of State, National and International VIPs through Bartlett Plaza to the Main Street of Gold Rush Town. Here, while boy scouts from a troop from Ft. Walnwright stood at attention holding the crowd back, a color guard from the Sixth Battalion Ninth Infantry raised first the Stars and Stripes and then the Alaskan Flag at A-67. This is the same military unit who were present at Sitka and raised the first American Flag in Alaska when it was taken over from the Russians one hundred years ago.



The National Anthem and "Alaska's Flag" were then sung by the "Sweet Adelines", a group of Fairbanks housewives, mothers and even grandmothers. The Ninth Army Band provided appropriate music.



Opening day at A-67 was marked by many events. One of these such events was the unveiling of the new uniform of the Alaska State Troop. 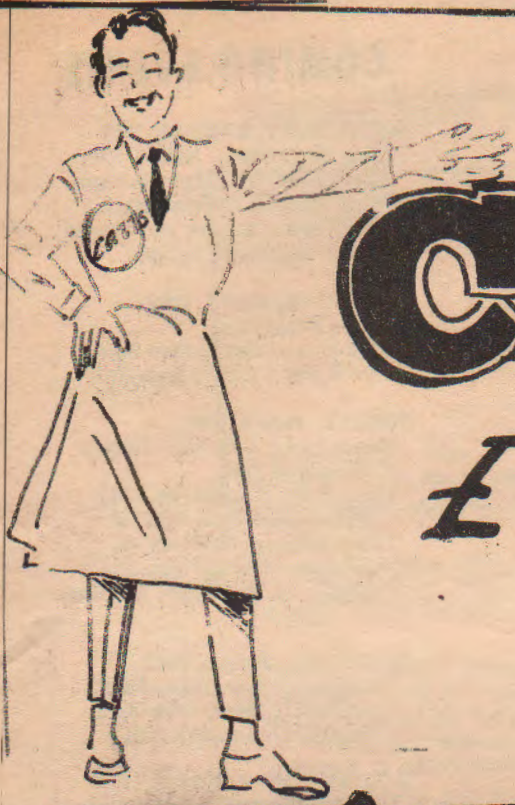
