## CONCERNED PARENTS TO PETITION SCH. BO.

BIRCHWOOD: A group of concerned parents met last Thursday night at Chugiak High School to attempt to learn why the School District Administration was planning to move the seventil grade students from the Eagle River Elementary School to Chugiak High School next fall. Mr. Gorden Guffey, Superint-endent of Instruction for the GAAP

School District was oresent, along with Mr. Dale Pierson, School Board member from this area.

Mr. Guffey explained that the move was made for a double purpose. One to avoid double shifting at the Eagle River School in the event that the new Birchwood School was not completed by October as scheduled; and secondly because it was believe that instruction would be available to the seventh graders with the superior High School facilities at their dis-

posal.

A spokesman for the parents A spokesman for the parents present felt that while this appeared to make sense on paper, it would not work out simply because the facilities at the High School are already overlaxed, and that there would not be room to accompdate the more than 130 seventh graders. the more than 130 seventh graders in the gym, science labs and lunch room. Also, since the re-locatables do not have their own sanitary facilities, this would mean the need to use the rest rooms in the high school.

The group plans to write a letter to the President of the School Board asking permission to appear before he board and discuss the matter horoughly, and see if a more work-ble solution can be devised.

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




