SCHOOL LIBRARY PROGRAM STARTS

OLD CHUGIAK: The summer library program at the Chugiak Elementary school began this Tuesday, under the direction of Mrs. Patricia Wamsley.

Mrs. Wamsley is to be full time librarian at the school, not only during the summer months, but during the school year as well.

She is trained for this type of work, but due to the lack of a position within the borough school district, she had been teaching the second grade at Williwaw school in Mt. View for the past two years.

Mrs. Wamsley, who came to Alaska in 1965, with her husband who is also a teacher, lives in the Shady Lane Sub-division in Anchorage. Her assistant at the Chugiak School will be Mrs. Jane Montgomery of Birchwood.

Mrs. Wamsley explained the program at the local school, and told how it differs from the usual concept of a library.

Although, the familiar book shelves will still be very much in evidence, and youngsters will be encouraged to check out books to take home, a planned program will be followed.

One of the innovations will be a story hour for the younger children. Also, simple to operate film strip viewers will be available for the youngsters to use. These, teamed with record players will provide audio-visual education.

There have been about 3,000 new books added to those already at the school, making a total of 6,000 books available. A strong emphasis is placed on reference material, which will be co-ordinated with the subject the children will be studying when school begins next fall. Mrs. Wamsley said that the term "Instructional Material Center" is more descriptive of this type of program than is the word "library."

She went on to explain that the program is open to any children

living anywhere in the Greater Chugiak Area, although only those living in the area which is served by the Chugiak Elementary School during the school year will be provided free bus transportation. Any others who have their own transportation available are welcome to participate. She also said that there is no age limit on who may take part. She encouraged parents of preschool children to check out books for them. She said that although the reading level was geared for youngsters in grades 1 through 6, many of the books would be of interest to high school age children, and she welcomed them to attend.

She also went on to explain that although the school bus would bring students to the school at 12:30pm and take them home at 2:30pm, the library is open from 10am until 4:30pm daily, and any children who wish to come anytime during these hours are welcome to do so. She added however, that the school does not accept responsibility for any who attend outside the regular program, with the exception of the time they are actually in the library.

She added that beginning on Tuesday, June 27th, a recreational program will be held at the Chugiak school at the same time that the library program is in progress.

Youngsters will be encouraged to participate in both of these activities.

She also added that the school library will be working together with the Chugiak public library which is located across the road in the old Post Office Building.

GOAL ACCEPTS BYLAWS

OLD CHUGIAK: GOAL (Gaining Overall Advantages Locally) Community Council, met last Monday at the Chugiak Elementary School.

The group adopted the revised by-laws, and covered the other items on the agenda.

A plan to stock pile clothing and household items for the use of fire victims was tabled until a suitable building can be located in which to store them.

A committee was named to check the possibility of getting community college courses at Chugiak High School next fall.

The group was informed that the Anchorage Community College will, if funds are made available conduct another course in basic education in this area next fall.

No date has been set for the next meeting, but any future meetings will be announced in the Knik Arm Courier.

PARENTS QUESTION SCHOOL BOARD

ANCHORAGE: A delegation of parents from the Greater Chugiak Area met with the GAAB School Board last night for the purpose of getting some answers concerning the moving local seventh graders to Chugiak High School.

"They still haven't answered our questions", a spokesman for the group stated.

The seventh graders will be housed in four relocatable classrooms that are presently under construction at the high school. The move is being made it was explained for a twofold reason. One, to provide temporary classroom space for Birchwood Elementary School students at Eagle River school pending the completion of that facility, and two to give the seventh graders the advantage of facilities at the High School.

A spokesman for the group said that when it was pointed out that the high school facilities were over-taxed, and that they could not accommodate any additional students, the question was ducked.

Points that the local group brought out was the fact that seventh graders change classrooms every period, and this would mean either wasted time in putting on outer garments everytime they moved from one building to the other or went to the main building to use restroom facilities, or that more likely they would neglect putting on coats and boots, and expose themselves to colds and other ailments.

They also asked what plans were made for the use of the four classrooms and two relocatables at the Eagle River School when the Birchwood students moved into their own building. They gathered that no plans had been made, but it was thought that in time the school enrollment would increase to the point where there would be a need for the space.

A member of the local delegation said that he felt no ground had been gained at all. He said they learned that the relocatable buildings were costing the Borough just under \$20,000 apiece and that it cost a minimum of \$500 to move one.

The group was invited to meet again with the school board later in the summer when some type of schedule for the seventh grades have been worked out, and this will be presented to them.

BABE RUTH BANKER LEAD LEAGUE

CHUGIAK: The Eagle River Branch of First National Bank continues its lead in East Division of the Babe Ruth League.

After winning two more during the past week, the Chugiak team avenged its only loss by trouncing Lottsfeldt and Kyzer of Nunaka Valley 14 to 2 last Thursday.

Steve Jordan gave up one hit in pitching the victory while his team mates pointed Nunaka pitchers for 10 hits.

On Tuesday the Bankers over-ran defending champions Alaska Title and Guarantee 20 to 12.

The game was stopped after 4 innings when the City View team conceded defeat. Fred Olsou took the win for First National.

The Bankers collected 9 hits, all but one of 12 Bankers playing in the game scored.

Richard Martin tallied 4 times. Martin, Olson and Gary Ryan had perfect batting, collecting a hit for each time at bat. David Dias was walked all 4 times he faced the pitcher.

The Bankers play Friday, June 16th, at Mulcahy Park meeting the teamsters from Mt. View.

On Thursday, June 22nd, the final game of the first half of the season will be played at the Peters Creek Babe Ruth park against Alaska Title and Guarantee.

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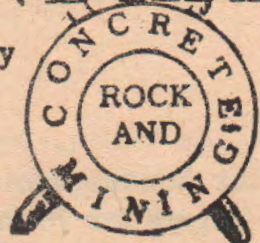

MIRROR LAKE PARK BOGGED DOWN

PETERS CREEK: The proposed recreation area at Mirror Lake has bogged down in paper work, awaiting approval of the Federal program which would provide the funds.

A spokesman from the State Department of Parks and Recreation said that preliminary work has begun at the swimming area. Some clearing has taken place, and drainage ditches will be dug to relieve the swampy section. He said that he hoped that approval would be forthcoming within 30 days in order to proceed according to schedule.

If Federal funds are not available, then the State still plans to go ahead with the project, however it may be on a more modest scale.

LOCAL BANK ISSUES FREEDOM SHARES

ANCHORAGE: According to Mrs. Helen M. Fischer, State Director, Savings Bonds Division, U.S. Treasury, the First National Bank of Anchorage, Eagle River Branch have qualified with the Federal Reserve Bank to issue the new "Freedom Shares", a Treasury note which went on the Market recently.

These new freedom shares are offered on a one for one basis with E Bonds, but only to people who belong to the payroll savings plan where they work or the Bond A Month Plan where they bank.

The Banks who have qualified for the freedom shares are now offering this new service; the Bond A Month Plan along with a bonus; "Freedom Shares"; and are available to all their checking account customers.

4H MEMBERS CAN GET COLLEGE HELP

Girls who have been 4-H Club members and are planning careers in home economics can get financial aid for college by applying for one of six 4-H Home Economics scholarships offered by three private enterprises.

Application should be made now through the state 4-H Club office or the extension office. Information regarding eligibility also can be obtained there. Winning candidates will be announced in November by the Cooperative Extension Service.

Two \$800 college scholarships will be provided by each of the following: Sunbeam Corporation, The S&H Foundation, Inc. and The West Bend Company. In addition, S&H will give one \$300 educational grant to 17 states to be used by current 4-H'ers for short courses, tours and trips, camps and meetings.

The scholarships and grants are distributed by the National 4-H Service committee, Chicago.

Practice begins at 12:30pm, and any interested women are invited to come on down and join in. Teen aged girls are also welcome.



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


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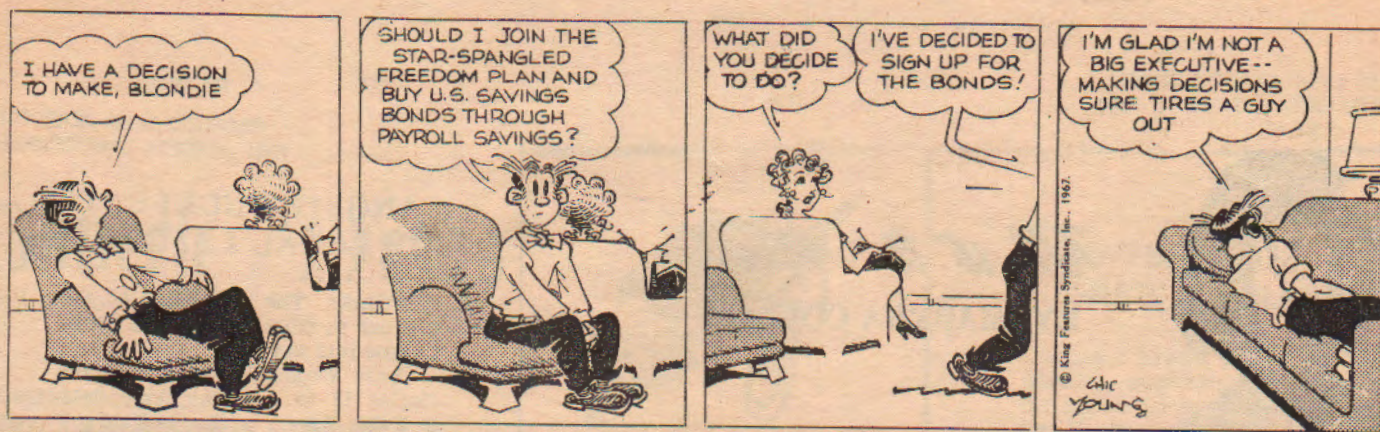

BINGO GAMES OVER FOR SUMMER

OLD CHUGIAK: The Bingo Committee of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company has announced that games will be discontinued for the summer.

They have asked that all those who participated accept their thanks for supporting the Fire Company, and look forward to seeing them next October when games will be resumed.

SENATOR ASKS HIGHER INSURANCE

Senator Ernest Gruening (D-Alaska), emphasizing the need for higher home loan insurance for Alaska and Hawaii veterans under the Veterans Home Loan Guaranty Program, recently won Senate approval for his amendment to the Vietnam Era Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act. The bill now goes to House-Senate conference.

Senator Gruening's amendment would raise from \$17,500 to \$30,000 the limit in the amount which can be insured under the present home loan program.

"My amendment," Senator Gruening said, "is designed to correct an existing inequity in the program which adversely affects the ability of veterans in Alaska and Hawaii to take advantage of it."

The Alaska senator pointed out that "because of the \$17,500 limitation . . . the program is in very little use in Alaska." For example, the senator reported that through April 30, 1967, not a single home guaranty loan had been approved for a post-Korean veteran, and the number of home loans under the program of the Veterans Administration totaled only 294. The amount of the loans totaling \$2,660,485 had a guaranty of \$1,250,832.

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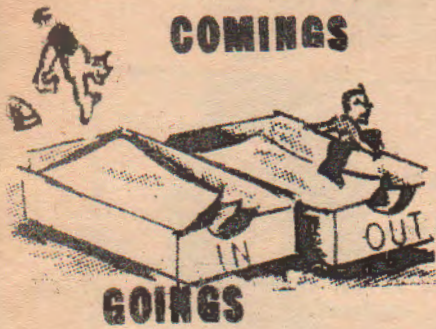

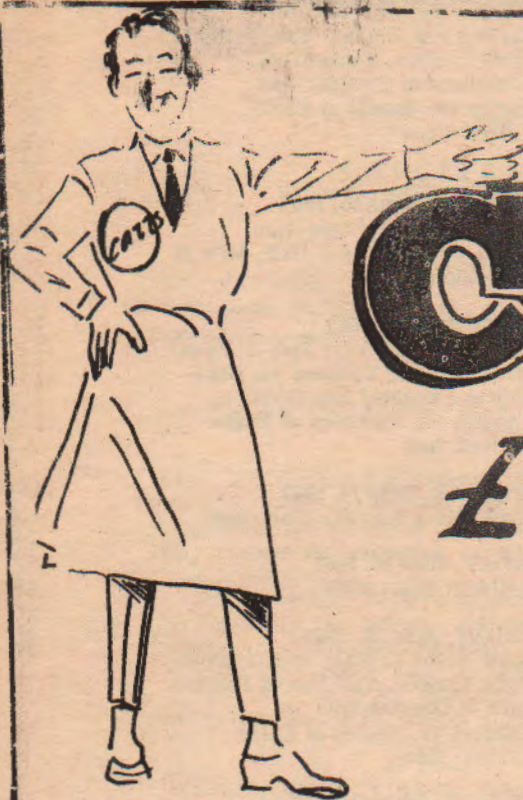
