ASSEMBLY ACCEPTS COMMITTEE REPORT

ANCHORAGE: The GAAB Assembly

last Monday, accepted the report of the Library study committee. This group has been meeting to study the advisability of an area-wide library service in the Borough. Two members of the committee were from the Greater Chuglak Area, Mrs Vernon Moore, and Mrs. Robert Kallenberg, both librarians at the local library branches.

The committee did not recommend

areawide library service at this time, but felt that contracts with the city of Anchorage providing library service should be continued.

They also recommended that there should be provisions for additional branches in the Tudor, Lake Otis,

OLD CHUGIAK: Local residents were saddened this week to learn of the death of Fred Bustrin, known familiarly as "Chief Chugiak''.

Mr. Bustrin passed away at 2:30am Tuesday, June 28th at Providence Hospital. He had been hospitalized the past three weeks with a

heart allmeut.

The funeral will take place Friday, June 30th, at the Anchorage Funeral Chapel, with graveside services at the Valley Memorial

Gardens in Palmer.

Bustrin came to Alaska in 1945. He lived in Fairbanks for two years and came to the Chuglak area in 1947. He had his home and shop at mile 17 1/2, on the Glenn Highway where he manufactured and sold original Alaskan Jewelry and souvenirs under the "Chief Chugiak" label, from which came his nickname.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Arna Bustrin, of Ranier Ore-gon, a brother, Allert Bustrin, of Lincoln City Oregon, two sisters, Mrs. Laverne McKee of Sandy, Oregon and Mrs. Beverly Wilson or Longview Washington, two nieces, Barbara Barneti, of Redwood City California and Beverly Wences of Longview Washington and anephew, Douglas Bustrin, of Lincoln City Oregon.

SENATOR ASKS FOR HIGHWAY FUNDS

Sen. Ernest Gruening, D-Alaska, testifying before the subcommittee on Transportation of the House Committee on Appropriations, strongly urged that the fiscal 1968 appropriation for the Department of Transportation include the \$14 million which he proposed and was authorized by the Federal Aid Highway Act

of 1965 to begin highway con-struction in the state. Impressing upon the subcom-mittee members the urgent need for their favable action, Sentor Gruening reviewed "the long sad history of Alaska's attempt to attain something like equal treatment in the dispensation of fed-

eral funds for highways."
In 1916, when Congress enacted
the Federal Highway Act, Alaska was totally omitted. Year after year, Alaska's voteless delgates sought inclusion on some basis. but their bill never got out of

committee," he said.
"All this time," Gruening said,
"Alaskans were paying all federal taxes without representation, which our forefathers in 1776 declared to be tyranny, and certainly was not less so in the 20th Century than in the 18th."

The senator explained that "Even now, in all the 586,000 square miles of Alaska, only 5,200 miles of road exist, of which but 1,200 miles are paved or blacktopped," He used a special man to demonstrate the special map to demonstrate the state's severe lack of rads. As soon as Gruening was el-

ected to the Semate, began seek-ing an approach that would re-ctify the situation allow Alaska to catch up to the lower 48 states. "It seemed unthinkable, that while in the lower 48 states...

a great, vast, superb network of highways had been constructed and was constantly being im-proved, similar action for Alaska, long overdue, would not be forthcoming."

After years of delaying action on the part of the Administraion and Congress, Gruening in-troduced and obtained enactment of a amendment to the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1966 which authorizes appropriation of a\$70 million fund to be appropriated in \$14 millian annual installments for the next five years,

In the face of Administration opposition, it was demonstrated that Contress had come to un-derstand the importance of high-ways for Alaska, Gruening said.

The new exchange should be completed sometime after January first, but because of an anticipated delay in the delivery of some of the es-sential equipment, the new exchange may not be ready to be cut in until next April.

These changes will effect only phones on the 688 exchange. The service for the 694 exchange will remain unchaged.

Clement, however, did say that there was a deal in the offing which would benefit the phone subscribers in both local exchanges. He said that MTA is once more attempting to re-instate the toll free service to both military bases. He said that he has been meeting with officials from both the Anchorage Telephone system and the Base Communications, and things appear very favorable.

The Borough Assembly had allocated \$1,000 earlier in the year to maintain the fill. The cost experienced to date will be discussed.

Local Assemblyman Ed Willis said that it appears that the fill can be maintained at the cost of .25 mills to the local residents.




