## ASSEMBLY ACCEPTS COMMITTEE REPORT

ANCHORAGE: The GAAB Assembly last Monday, accepted the report of the Library study committee.

This group has been meeting to study the advisability of an area-wide library service in the Borough. Two members of the committee were from the Greater Chugliak Area, Mrs. Vernon Moore, and Mrs. Robert Kallenberg, both librarians at the local library branches.

The committee did not recommend areawide library service at this time, but felt that contracts with the city of Anchorage providing library service should be continued.

They also recommended that there should be provisions for additional branches in the Tudor, Lake Otis,

OLD CHUGIAK: Local residents were saddened this week to learn of the death of Fred Bustrin, known more familiarly as "Chief Chugliak".

Mr. Bustrin passed away at 2:30am Tuesday, June 28th at Providence Hospital. He had been hospitalized for the past three weeks with a heart ailment.

The funeral will take place Friday, June 30th, at the Anchorage Funeral Chapel, with graveside services at the Valley Memorial Gardens in Palmer.

Bustrin came to Alaska in 1945. He lived in Fairbanks for two years and came to the Chugliak area in 1947. He had his home and shop at mile 17 1/2, on the Glenn Highway where he manufactured and sold original Alaskan Jewelry and souvenirs under the "Chief Chugliak" label, from which came his nickname.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Arna Bustrin, of Ranier Oregon, a brother, Albert Bustrin, of Lincoln City Oregon, two sisters, Mrs. Laverne McKee of Sandy, Oregon and Mrs. Beverly Wilson of Longview Washington, two nieces, Barbara Barnett, of Redwood City California and Beverly Wences of Longview Washington and a nephew, Douglas Bustrin, of Lincoln City Oregon.

## MTA TO OFFER IMPROVED SERVICE

PALMER: The Matanuska Telephone Association is planning to upgrade the service of subscribers in the 688 exchange as soon as the new exchange building is completed and the equipment installed.

The new building will be located on the Birchwood Loop Road on the lot which was at one time occupied by the Mina Mart Grocery. The present exchange, which is located at the corner of Birchwood Road and Glenn Highway at mile 17 1/2 will no longer be used after the new building is completed.

Max Clements, manager for MTA said that the contract for installing the cable has been let to Gracie Electric of Anchorage, and work is scheduled to begin within the next two weeks.

When the new equipment is in and operated, all phones in the exchange will be upgraded to either one or two party lines.

### SENATOR ASKS FOR HIGHWAY FUNDS

Sen. Ernest Gruening, D-Alaska, testifying before the subcommittee on Transportation of the House Committee on Appropriations, strongly urged that the fiscal 1968 appropriation for the Department of Transportation include the \$14 million which he proposed and was authorized by the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1966 to begin highway construction in the state.

Impressing upon the subcommittee members the urgent need for their favorable action, Senator Gruening reviewed "the long sad history of Alaska's attempt to attain something like equal treatment in the dispensation of federal funds for highways."

In 1916, when Congress enacted the Federal Highway Act, Alaska was totally omitted. Year after year, Alaska's voteless delegates sought inclusion on some basis.

but their bill never got out of committee," he said.

"All this time," Gruening said, "Alaskans were paying all federal taxes without representation, which our forefathers in 1776 declared to be tyranny, and certainly was not less so in the 20th Century than in the 18th."

The senator explained that "Even now, in all the 586,000 square miles of Alaska, only 5,200 miles of road exist, of which but 1,200 miles are paved or blacktopped." He used a special map to demonstrate the state's severe lack of roads.

As soon as Gruening was elected to the Senate, began seeking an approach that would rectify the situation allow Alaska to catch up to the lower 48 states. "It seemed unthinkable, that while in the lower 48 states...

a great, vast, superb network of highways had been constructed and was constantly being improved, similar action for Alaska, long overdue, would not be forthcoming."

After years of delaying action on the part of the Administration and Congress, Gruening introduced and obtained enactment of an amendment to the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1966 which authorizes appropriation of a \$70 million fund to be appropriated in \$14 million annual installments for the next five years.

In the face of Administration opposition, it was demonstrated that Congress had come to understand the importance of highways for Alaska, Gruening said.

The new exchange should be completed sometime after January first, but because of an anticipated delay in the delivery of some of the essential equipment, the new exchange may not be ready to be cut in until next April.

These changes will effect only phones on the 688 exchange. The service for the 694 exchange will remain unchanged.

Clement, however, did say that there was a deal in the offing which would benefit the phone subscribers in both local exchanges. He said that MTA is once more attempting to re-instate the toll free service to both military bases. He said that he has been meeting with officials from both the Anchorage Telephone system and the Base Communications, and things appear very favorable.

Campbell Station, Abbott Loop, Klatt Road, O'Malley, Hillside, Rabbit Creek and Sand Lake Areas. Rented or relocatable quarters were recommended. The committee suggested that the present location of the Spenard Community Library be re-evaluated, with the thought of relocating it somewhere that would make it more accessible to adjoining areas. They also felt the City of Girdwood should either contract with the Anchorage Library, or continue to operate with funds from the Federal Grant.

The Borough Assembly was very pleased with the report and in the opinion of the Assemblymen it was one of the finest to be compiled by a citizen's committee.

The Assembly will again consider the subject of areawide library service at a July meeting, at which time all items which are likely to appear on the October ballot will be discussed. It was brought out that the property evaluation outside of Anchorage is \$321,343,659. This would provide library service for the residents at a cost of 1/3 mill.

Also to be discussed at the July

meeting will be resolution 173, which concerns the Sanitary Fill which serves the Greater Chugiak Area.

The Borough Assembly had allocated \$1,000 earlier in the year to maintain the fill. The cost experienced to date will be discussed.

Local Assemblyman Ed Willis said that it appears that the fill can be maintained at the cost of .25 mills to the local residents.

Reapportionment of Borough Sections was taken up at the Monday meeting of the Assembly, and it was agreed that the Rural Assemblymen would meet and come up with a plan. No date for this meeting has been scheduled.

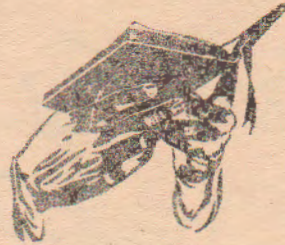
