TWO LOCAL MEN FILE FOR SCH. BD.

ANCHORAGE: Two residents of the Greater Chugiak Area were among those who have filed for the one-year seat on the GAAB School Board.

The seat is presently unoccupied due to the resignation of Dale Pearson of Eagle River, who had moved his well drilling operation to Kenai, and was forced to resign for personal reasons.

The local men filing for the seat are Emil Notti of Birchwood, and William Watkins of Fire Lake.

Also filing for the seat are Art Ashley, John Strachan and W. Ralph Foster, all for other areas in the Borough.

The school board has not appointed anyone to fill Pearson's seat for the remainder of the term, and it is not known if they plan to do so at this late date.

SCHOOL ZONE BOUNDARY MOVED

CHUGIAK: The problems of overcrowded classrooms at the Eagle River Elementary School and the vacant classrooms at the Chugiak Elementary School, which was created by changing the school attendance boundary back to mile 17, may be alleviated by another change in the boundary.

The boundary will be switched from its present location at South Birchwood Loop entrance (approximately mile 17.8) to the voting precinct line (approximately mile 15.8).

This adjustment in boundaries is effective Thursday morning, September 14th.

The change has been made, according to the School Administration "In order to better utilize existing school facilities, thereby improving the instructional program for all children in the area.

Those involved are asked to call the school principal about any questions or problems concerning attendance changes.

Zone exemptions will be considered upon application through the school principal.

EAGLE RIVER: A public hearing was held Thursday evening, September 7th at the Eagle River School by the State Division of Highways on a road reconnaissance report embodying four proposed road alignments and paving of approximately 4.6 miles of Eagle River Road.

The public hearing, attended by approximately 80 local residents was conducted by Mr. Charles Matlock, District Engineer for the State Department of Highways, Mr. Bomhoff and other members of his staff.

Of the four routes under discussion, designated as proposals A, B, C, and D, proposal C, which would run 1/4 mile north of the present Eagle River Road from Eagle River Loop straight to the Glenn Highway near the Eagle River Cold Storage plant and turn north to Artillery Road, was favored by the State.

It was pointed out that this route would open up more of the community for development with a minimum of disturbance of existing community facilities. It would also put all through traffic on just one side of Eagle River school, reducing the safety hazards to the school.

Proposal A would follow the present Eagle River Road alignment, eliminating the present hazardous curve as it turns east up the valley. However, it is considered the least desirable route because of its greater disturbance to the community due to acquisition of a 200 foot right-of-way to comply with the Federal regulations for 94% funding of the project. Also because of additional through traffic at the school.

Many local residents asked questions and testified on the various proposals. A point of interest was all proposals were objected to, but few comments were heard favoring any particular route.

An interesting counter-proposal by a local resident suggested that Eagle River Loop be extended straight across Eagle River via a new bridge and then to the weighing station.

Evidence gathered at the hearing will be evaluated and one route will be chosen and finalized within the next 30 days.

The actual roadway will be 44 feet wide. It will be paved with bituminous concrete to a width of 24 feet. The State's recommended route C would cost an estimated \$1,340,000 with a 5% maximum grade. All other proposals would cost approximately the same.

PETERS CREEK: A Palmer woman was injured when the car she was driving was involved in an accident at mile 23 last Wednesday, September 6th.

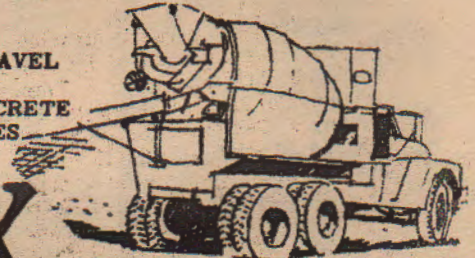
DON'T FORGET NORMA

MTA PUBLISHES SEPERATE PHONE DIRECTORY

PALMER: The Matanuska Tel Association has had a number of inquiries regarding the distribution of the new directory to subscribers in the Greater Chugiak, area. Max Clement, MTA Manager has attempted to clarify the issue with the following statement.

In the past several years, the phones in the Chugiak and Eagle River exchanges were listed in the Anchorage Directory, and the subscribers in that area received copies of the Anchorage Directory without charge.

This year MTA has contracted with the Frontiersman of Palmer to publish their directory. This will include all exchanges in the Matanuska Telephone Association, with the Chugiak and Eagle River numbers listed together in a separate section, and a listing of Anchorage telephone numbers as a convenience to MTA subscribers. The yellow pages will contain advertising from those merchants in the areas served by MTA who have purchased these ads, plus any Anchorage firms who may have wished this.

The Anchorage phone directory will contain the phone numbers of residents of the Greater Chugiak Area intermingled with the Anchorage phone numbers as it did last year. The yellow pages will contain principally ads from Anchorage merchants plus any from the MTA served area who may have

purchased them when a salesman from the publisher solicited them earlier in the year. Copies of this directory will not be distributed without cost to MTA subscribers, but may be purchased from the Anchorage Telephone Company.

Subscribers purchasing yellow page ads in the Anchorage edition of the phone directory do not automatically get an ad in the yellow pages of the MTA phone book.

These may be purchased from the Frontiersman who is publishing the MTA book. A salesman from the Frontiersman is currently soliciting ads in the Greater Chugiak Area.

CHUGIAK: There is a need for 4H Leaders throughout the Greater Chugiak Area, according to Kathy Walkerfield worker for the Community Action Agency.

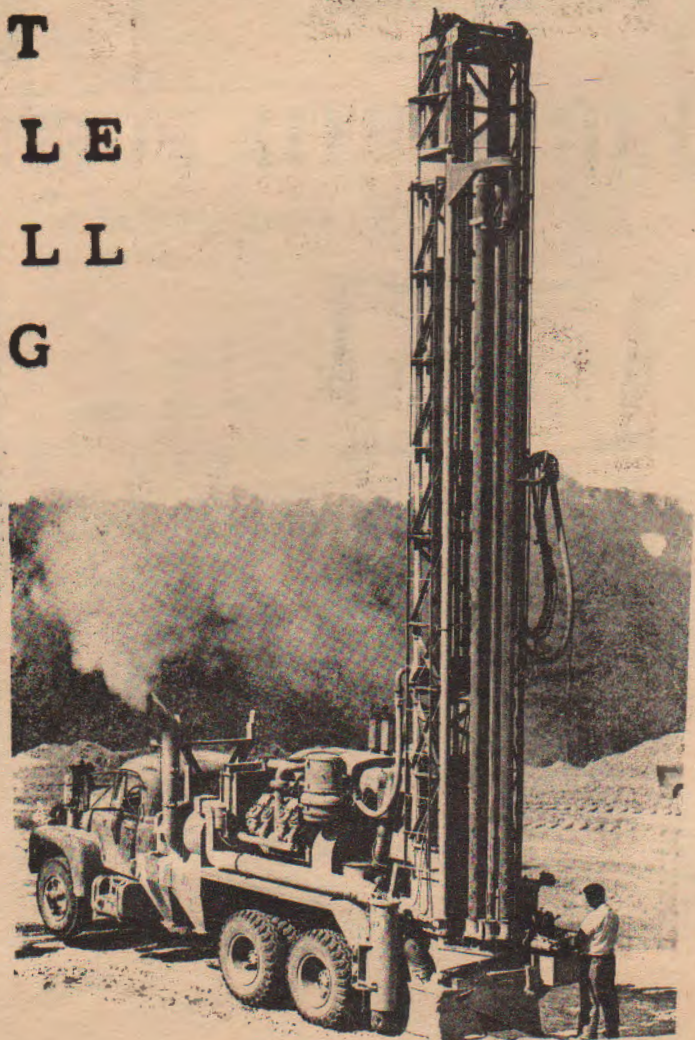

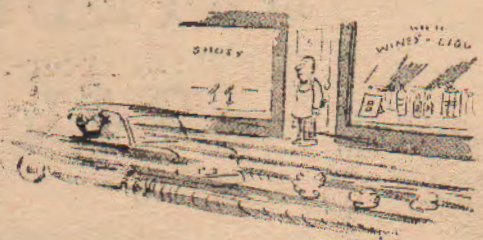

Traffic counts in 1965 indicated that 870 vehicles per day used the Eagle River Road up to the Loop. By 1965 it is estimated that 2600 vehicles will use this section of the road.

KINDERGARTEN CLASSES START

OLD CHUGIAK: A pre-school kindergarten, sponsored by the Chugiak Methodist Church started this Monday, September 18th, with an enrollment of 18 children.

The classes are held in a specially prepared classroom in the church basement, and offer a complete slate of kindergarten activity.

The cost to parents of children participating in the program is \$25 per month. Transportation is not furnished by the church.

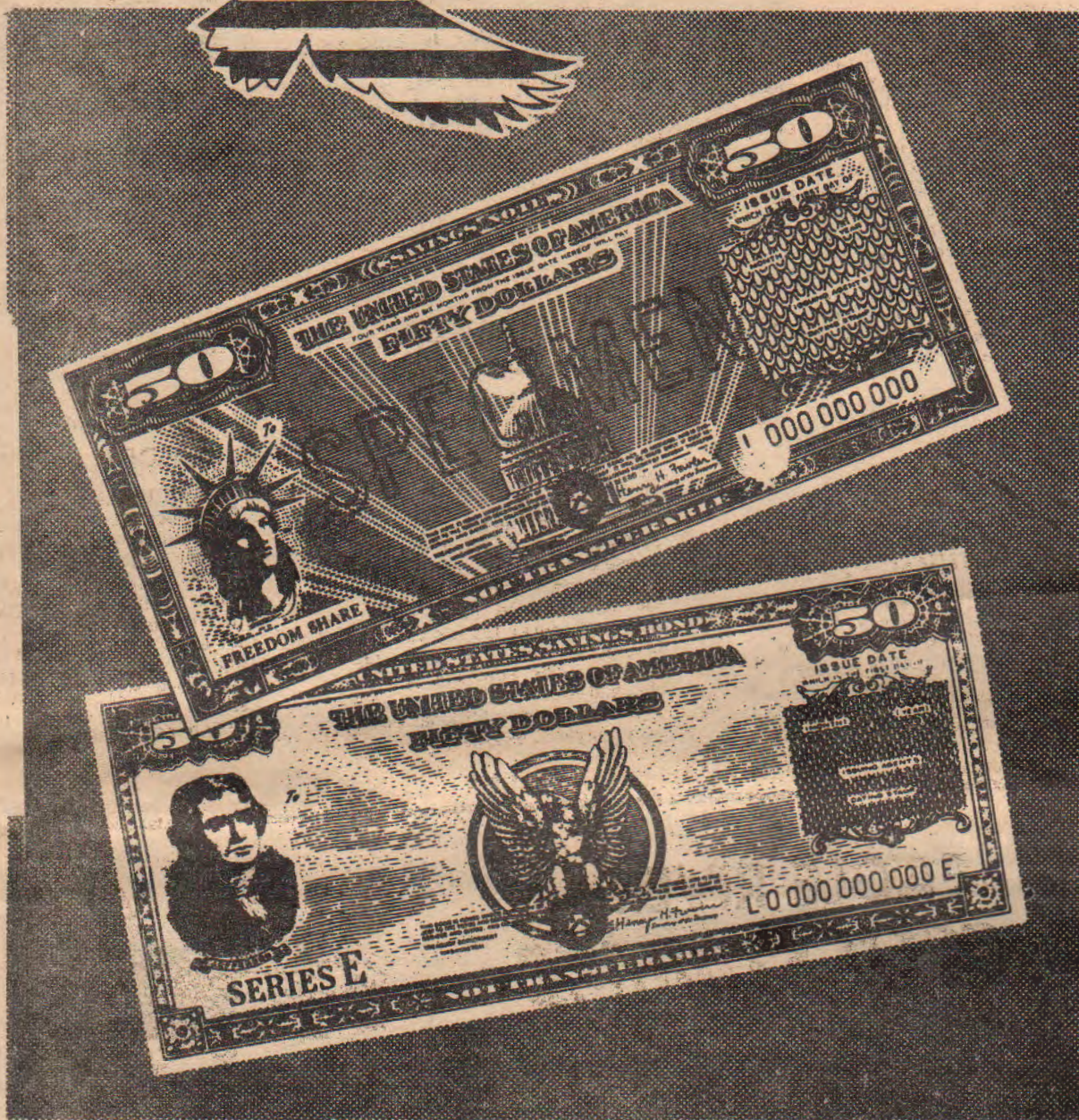

**U of A LOOKS FOR
FLOOD PHOTOS ETC.**

A drive to collect documents, personal experience narratives and photographs of the 1967 Chena River flood in Fairbanks has been launched by the University of Alaska Library Archives.

Donations from Fairbanks residents of letters, photos, reports, and any pertinent data on the flood are being sought for permanent preservation.

A similar collecting of material was undertaken in 1964 just after the Good Friday earthquake in Southcentral Alaska. Since then the "Earthquake Archives" has developed into a substantial collection of data on the disaster, according to Archivist Paul McCarthy.

"The 1967 Flood Collection will encompass written and photographic documents, as well as provide the opportunity for interviewing public officials and others who played key roles during the recent flood," says McCarthy.

Any letters describing personal experiences during the flood, particularly documents with specific references to incidents and developments, times and places, would be valuable, McCarthy says.

Well-documented photographs taken at various stages of the flood, showing particular buildings or subdivisions, would also form a valuable part of the collection, he adds.

Contributions to the collection can be made by contacting McCarthy at the UA Library.

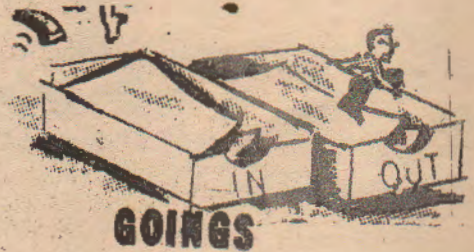

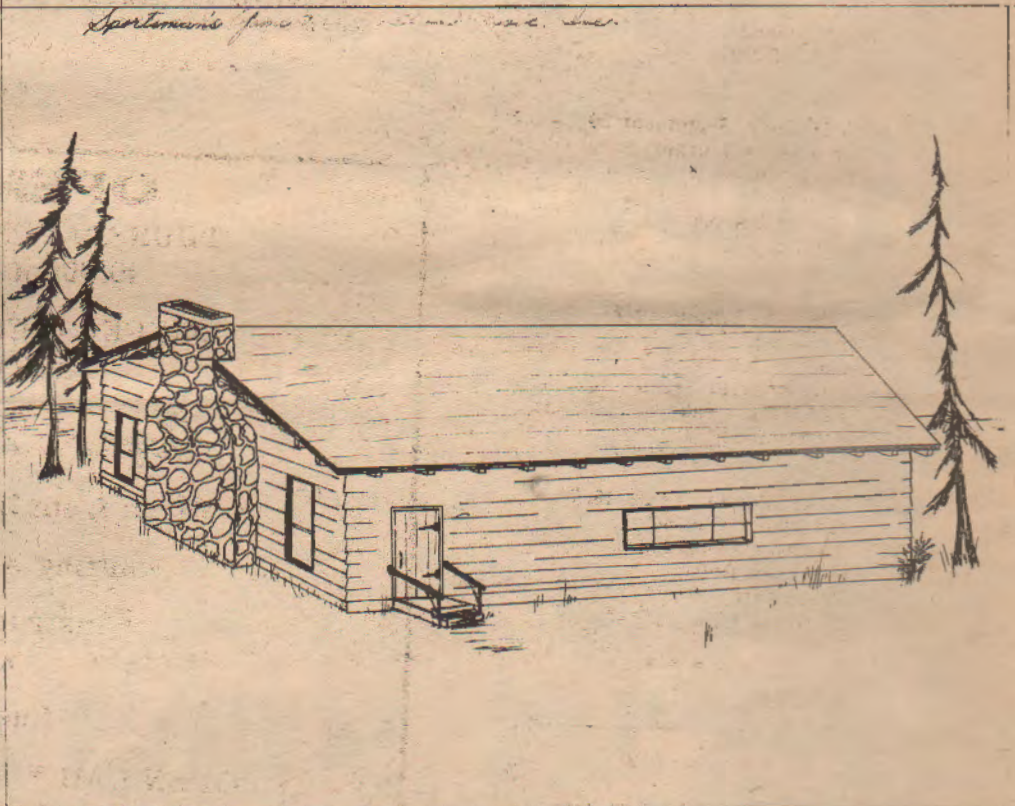
Calendar - year corporations must pay the third installment of their 1967 estimated Federal income tax by Friday, Sept. 15, 1967.

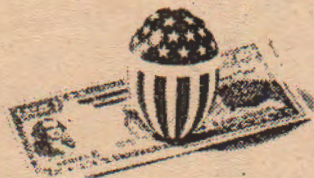

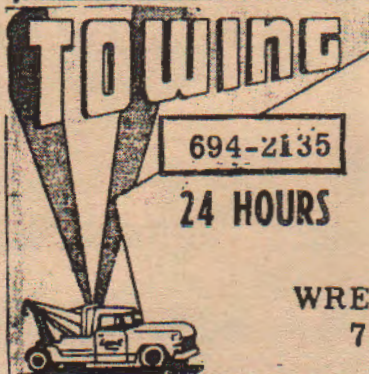

CASH OFFERED FOR BANDED GROUSE

The Alaska Department of Fish and Game is offering \$5 for the return of bands from each banded spruce grouse shot by hunters this autumn. The bands can be turned into any Department of Fish and Game office.

Spruce grouse have been banded on the Kenai Peninsula this past summer, and bands returned by hunters will assist the Department of Fish and Game in assessing hunting pressure on the birds.

The hunting season on spruce grouse opened Aug. 20 and continues until March 15. However, most birds are taken during September and October, when the birds characteristically show up on graveled roads where they are seeking grit. Daily bag limit is 15 birds a day, with a possession limit of 30 birds.
