



BONDS LOOM BIG ON BOROUGH BALLOT

CHUGIAK: Voters in the five local precincts will go to the polls on Tuesday, October 3rd to elect two members to the School Board for three year terms, and one for one year term.

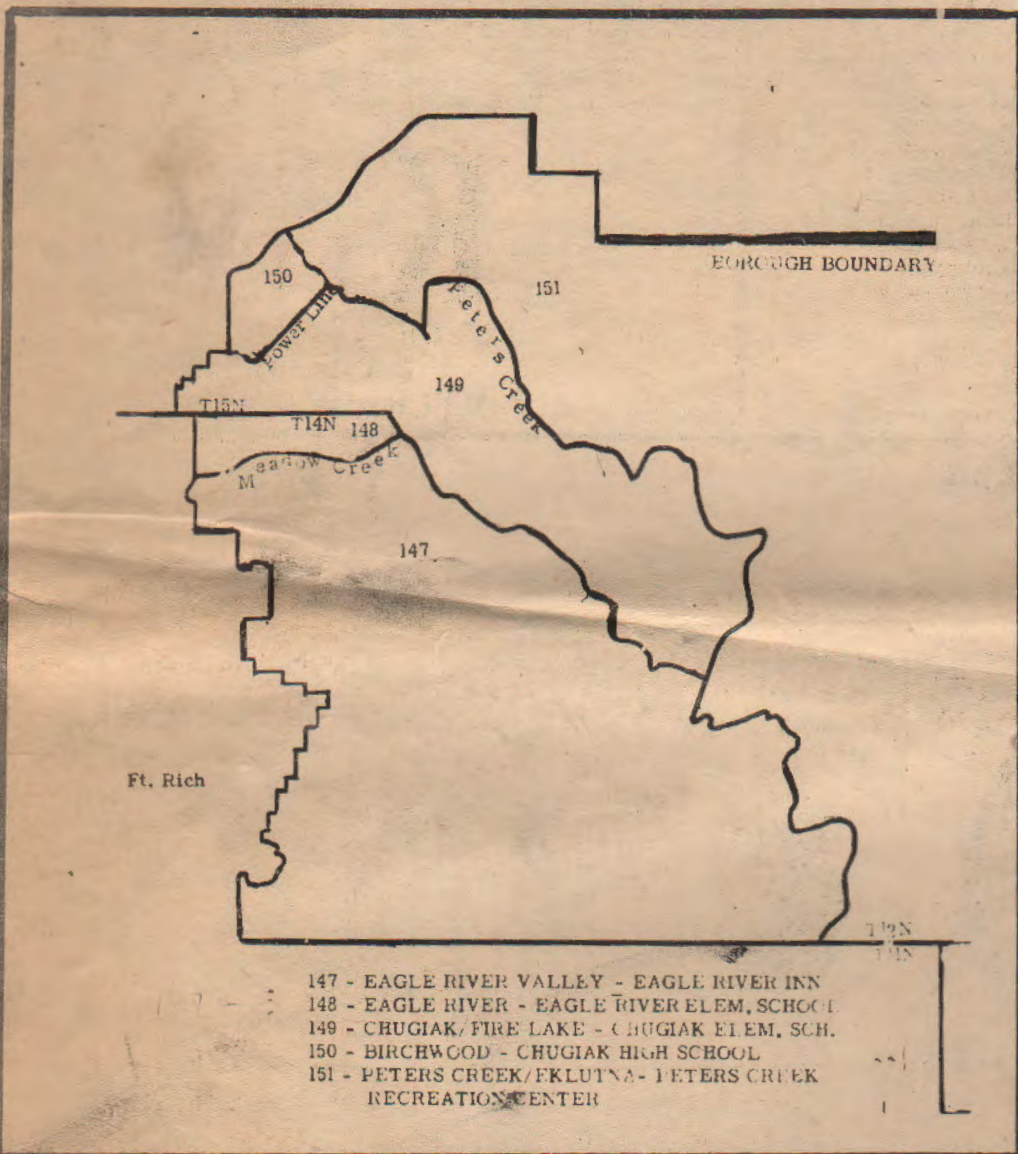
Candidates for the three year offices are, Bill Moran (incumbent) Willis Avery, (incumbent) Bert Hall, Melvin Porter, John Peterson and C.J. Occhipinti.

Candidates for the one year term are Art Ashley, John Strachan, Emil Notti (resident of Birchwood), William Watkins (resident of Fire Lake) and W. Ralph Foster.

The voters will also be asked to cast ballots on five propositions.

Proposition A: Shall the Greater Anchorage Area Borough incur indebtedness in a sum not to exceed \$20,000,000 for the purpose of raising funds for constructing, equipping acquiring property for, or otherwise acquiring sewage treatment plants, outfall lines, collector lines, lateral lines, trunk lines and sewer and sewage treatment related facilities as the Greater Anchorage Area Borough Assembly may from time to time determine to be necessary, and to pledge the full faith and credit of the GAAB to the payment of the indebtedness so incurred and to issue general obligation bonds with interest at a rate not to exceed six percent per annum, and to mature in such amounts and at such time or times, all as may be found necessary by the Greater Anchorage Area Borough Assembly, not exceeding 40 years from date of issue, and to be issued in such series and amounts and at such times all as may be found necessary by the GAAB Assembly, not exceeding \$5,000,000 in any one year, and pledge the revenue from any special assessment levied against property specifically benefited by the improvements in the amount not to exceed the total cost thereof as additional security for the payment of principal and interest on the bonds?

Proposition B: Shall the GAAB incur indebtedness in a sum not exceeding \$6,000,000 for the purpose of acquiring sites and constructing new school buildings and remodeling existing school buildings and obtaining therefor necessary facilities, including but not junior high schools, elementary schools, additions to existing facilities, and administrative facilities as the Assembly of the GAAB may from time to time determine to be necessary and to pledge the full faith and credit of the GAAB to the payment of any indebtedness so incurred and to issue general obligation bonds with interest at a rate not to exceed six percent per annum and to mature in such amounts and in 30 years from date of issue

and to be issued in such series or amounts and at such time or times, all as may be found necessary by the Assembly of the GAAB?

Proposition C: Shall the GAAB incur indebtedness in a sum not to exceed One Million Dollars for the purpose of constructing, paving, and draining roads and streets in service areas as the GAAB Assembly may from time to time determine to be necessary and to pledge the full faith, credit, and resources of the GAAB to the payment of the indebtedness so incurred and to issue general obligation bonds with interest at a rate not to exceed six percent per annum, and to mature in such amounts and at such time or times, not exceeding thirty years from date of issue, and to be issued in such series or amounts and at such times or times, all as may be found necessary by the GAAB Assembly, the principal and interest on the bonds to be paid primarily from

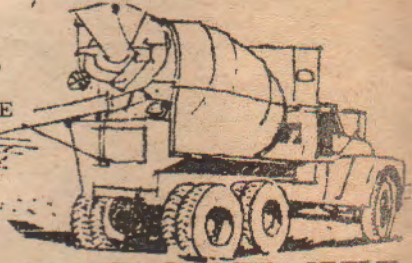
assessments against benefited property and general ad-valorem taxes within the Spenard Service Area and Service Areas No. 1 and No. 2?

Proposition D: Do you favor a kindergarten program in the GAAB Schools?

Proposition I: Are you in favor of the GAAB providing a sanitary landfill dump within Service Area No. 11 (Greater Chugiak Area) for the use of the residents of Service Area No. 11 at a cost no not to exceed one-quarter mill?

CHUGIAK: The Flame Dames, Women's Auxiliary of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company is holding a contest among the elementary school children at all three local grade schools.

LOOPERS GET SIGNAL LIGHT FOR SCHOOL

OLD CHUGIAK: The signal light and speed zone sign which has been erected on both the north and south sides of the Glenn Highway at the Chugiak Elementary School are the result of the efforts of the Birchwood Loopers Homemakers Club, under the direction of Irene Hildeman, Safety Chairman for the club.

Mrs. Hildeman, who is also a teacher at the Chugiak Elementary School said, that she had often looked out her classroom window and observed cars speeding by the school with no apparent attempt to slow down.


In the name of the Birchwood Club, she had written numerous letters to the State Department of Highways pointing out this hazard.

The result is the two signal lights, with signs indicating that a 20 m.p.h. speed zone is in force during the time the signals are lighted.

The signals will be turned on one hour before school starts, and one hour after it is let out. The lights will also be turned on during the time that the Chugiak School library is open to the public.

The area across from the school contains the Chugiak Public Library, the Chugiak Post Office, and a large number of residences. The children from the homes at Swanee Slopes cross the highway frequently even when school is out to use the playground equipment, and the signals should help to remind motorists of this fact.

The Loopers Club sponsors a safety project each year, and are looking for one to tackle for the coming season.

Dear Editor:

An open letter to all voters of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough:

Much misinformation regarding the bond issues coming up on October 3rd is being disseminated by the Borough politicians and others with special interests. More especially on the sewer proposition. They are telling the voters of the Eagle River-Chugiak-Peters Creek area that the \$20,000,000 bond issue will not in any way affect their taxation. This is simply not the truth. Any bond that you vote for whether it be for highways, schools, sewers or garbage disposal will have to be paid for by the taxes on your property. If this were not so, you would not be asked to vote on it. If you happen to be in the sewer service area, then you would have to pay again for the service. But if the bond is voted in, your property will help to pay off the bond. Let me repeat here, when you vote a bond issue your taxes will pay off the bond, regardless of the rumors being passed by the politicians or others with special interests.

As to the School Bonds, the State is gradually reducing its assistance to our schools in an effort to force us to carry the entire tax load, while at the same time the State has never relinquished any channel of tax money to the Borough, in spite of its increased income from oil leases, oil production, and other sources.

The Anchorage-Palmer area represents more than fifty percent of the tax-basis of the State. But I am told that we receive only thirty-three percent of State assistance to schools. Therefore, I am a realist

any further taxation against our homes and properties until we get our fair share of state assistance. Every bond issue that you vote in WILL be paid for from taxes against your homes and properties.

Rather than more bonds at an EXTREMELY HIGH interest rate, let's fight to regain our fair share of the taxes now being paid by the people of this area.

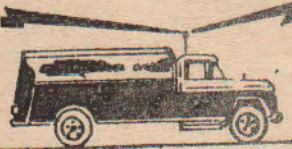

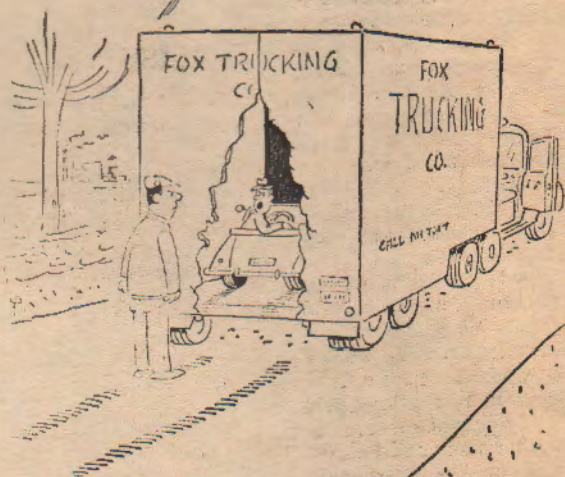

OLD CHUGIAK: A Centennial Silver Tea, is being planned by representatives from all the organized women's groups in the Greater Chugiak Area.

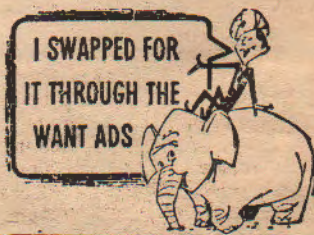

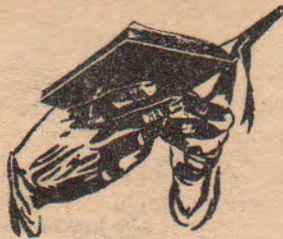

OPEN LETTER:

Dear Editor:

At the October 3rd Borough Election, residents will be faced with making decisions at the polls on the following Bonding Propositions.

PROPOSITION "A", Sewer Bonds, \$20 million.

While there is no question of the need for sewers in certain areas of the Borough, there are still too many unanswered questions regarding this proposition. All questions should be answered before we commit ourselves irrevocably for the next 40 or 50 years.

As it specifically affects our area, why should we who will never tie in or receive any direct benefit from the proposed Greater Anchorage - Pt. Woronzof sewer system be required to vote on and held fiscally responsible?

We should have been left out. The areas needing the service should form their own sewer area, and vote to determine their own destiny. Recommend a NO vote on the Sewer Proposition.

PROPOSITION "B", School Construction \$6 million.

First phase of a two-year \$11

million bonding program for school construction. Based upon actual count of pre-school children, allowance for future students, and study of community development trends-- By 1971--5,400 more children will be in the Borough school system. Space --more schools and classrooms-- must be provided now to give them room. A new high school has been recommended for our area during this period. Recommend a YES vote for schools.

PROPOSITION "C" Paving \$1 million.

This money has not been "ear-marked" for any specific project or area. Appears to give the Assembly a "blank-check" without road powers. This would have never appeared on the ballot except that a "deal" was made between City Assemblyman and the Borough Administration. The City Assemblyman backed

this in exchange for future fiscal support from the Borough for City of Anchorage port bonds! A major policy decision was made on the spur of the moment. Recommend a NO vote on Paving Bonds.

PROPOSITION "M", Sanitary Fill

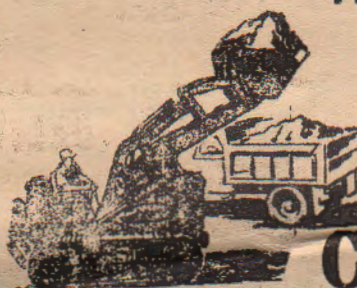
A solution to this problem has been long and difficult. While there is perhaps no ideal solution, the present temporary Borough operation should be continued on a permanent basis. It appears that this vitally needed community service can be provided at the relatively inexpensive cost of 1/2 mill. Recommend a YES vote on the Sanitary Fill.

Regardless of how you plan to vote, be sure to get out and vote on October 3. Remember, the vote YOU cast might make the difference!
