STATE ELECTION ASKS ROAD BONDS

CHUGIAK: Voters throughout the State of Alaska will return to the polls next Tuesday, October 10th to vote in a State Election asking their approval for the State to sponsor a Bond Issue for Highway Construction throughout the State.

The General Obligation Bonds will be in the amount of \$5,000,000.

Polling places will be the same as they are for the Borough Election, and the polls will be open from 8:00am to 8:00pm.

To be eligible to vote in this election, one must be a citizen of the United States, and a resident in the State for one year and in the District for 30 days. Voting age is 19, and the voter must be able to speak or read the English Language. No pre-registration is required.

CHUGIAK: With the approach of the deadline for accepting listings in the yellow pages of the Community Directory, the Chugiak Ladies Club, who sponsor this publication have asked that local merchants be reminded of this.

CHUGIAK: Local voter apparently turned down Proposition I, which called for the providing of a sanitary landfill dump for the use of residents in Section one.

With a total vote of 247 for as opposed to the 266 against, the dump appeared to be defeated.

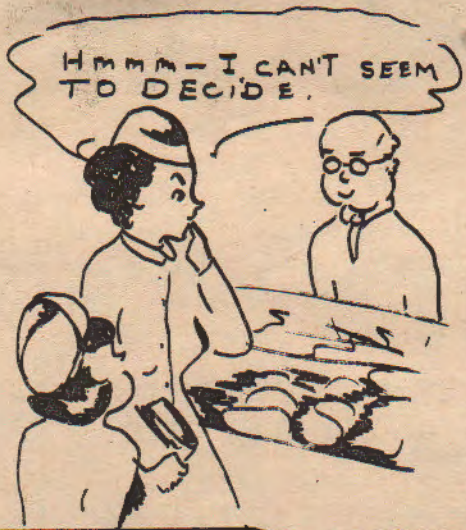
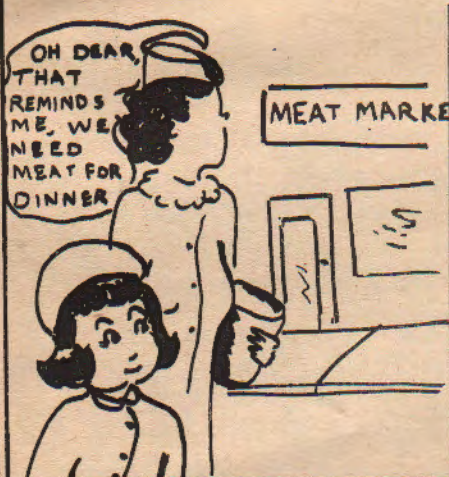

The gym is being made available through the School District's plan to encourage greater use of school facilities for community purposes in other than school hours.

Jordan cautions parents and students that the program is designed to provide wholesome recreational activity, and not as a "hang-out."

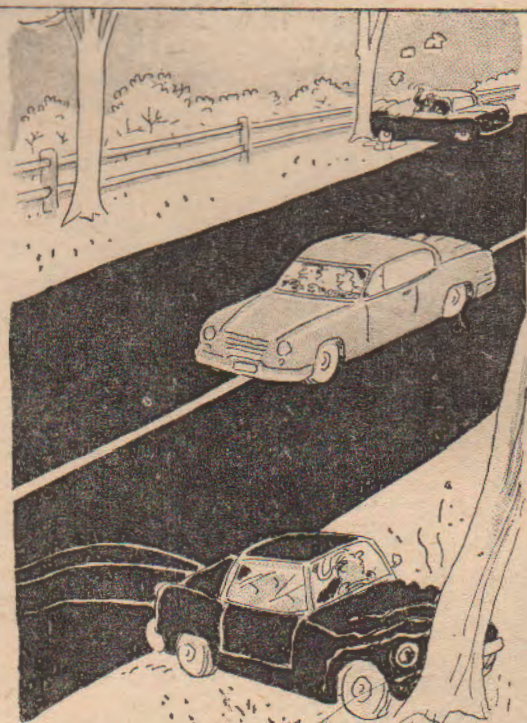

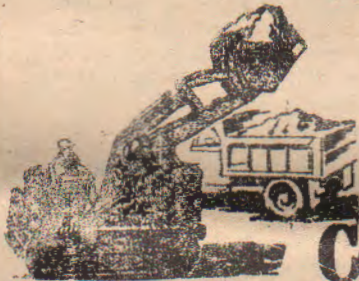
when you consider total number of adults live in the area. Each and every one of these adults are invited to join our PTA.

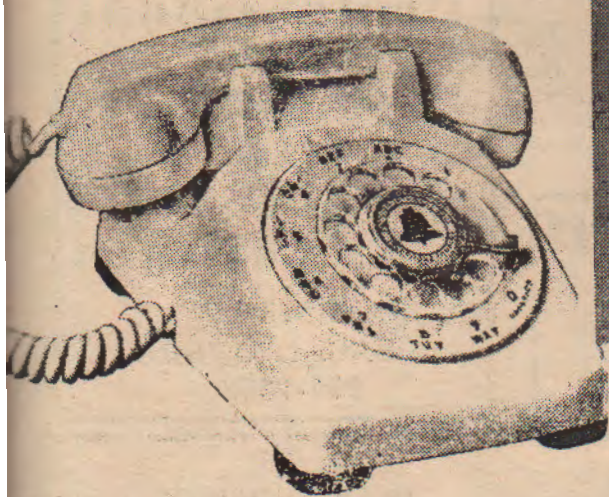

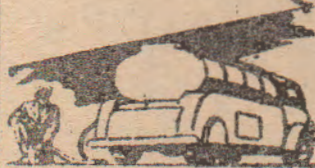

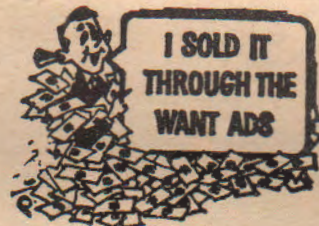
