THE FIREMAN IS A LADY

EAGLE RIVER: Chief Tom Take, of the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company, announced today that a unanimous ballot was cast at the last meeting, voting Mrs. William J. Armstrong the title of "Fireman of the Year."

Mrs. Armstrong serves as nurse on the Rescue Ambulance operated by the Volunteers. Despite the fact that she is a lady, the title of "Fireman of the Year", is technically accurate, as Mrs. Armstrong had been inducted into the organization as a Fireman in order to qualify under the existing insurance policy.

Mrs. Armstrong lives on Borealis Street in Eagle River with her husband, a twenty one month old daughter and younger brother. She is a registered nurse, having received her degree in nursing from the Toronto General Hospital School of Nursing in Toronto, Canada. BOROUGH ADMINISTRATION ASKED TO LEVY TAX TO SUPPORT LOCAL DUMP

ANCHORAGE: A resolution that the GAAB Assembly instruct the Administration to work out a budget and supplemental tax levy for the operation of a Sanitary fill in the Greater Chugiak Area, was introduced last Monday night by Jim Garrigues, Assemblyman from Section 5.

Ed Willis, local Borough Assemblyman, pointed out that the voter of Section One had recently defeated a proposition at the October 3rd Borough Election calling for a tax levy to support the sanitary fill, and requested that a meeting be set up, at which all concerned parties along with the general public be invited to work out a solution to the refuse disposal problem. A date for this meeting has not yet been published.

Willis has requested that anyone having any opinion on the subject, or any suggestion for a solution either call him at 694-2213, or write to him at Box 402, Eagle River.

OLD CHUGIAK: A petition to the GAAB School Administration asking that local school boundaries be re-established is being circulated by the parents of children attending the Chugiak Elementary School.

The petition came about as a result of a report that Chugiak Elementary Principal, Emerson Sortore was to be transferred to another district school, and Mr. Harry Wimmer, Birchwood principal divide his time between the two schools.

Mr. Gordon Guffey, of the GAAB School Administration explained to a meeting of the PTA that the reason for this change was that the attendance at Chugiak Elementary had fallen below the number required to justify the salary of a full time principal. Mr. Guffey said that the State provides funds based on a permanent enrollment of 200 students. The enrollment at Chugiak is 13 under the minimum required.

When asked whether this situation was due to the administration having changed the school boundary from that which they had announced at the beginning of the school year, Mr. Guffey admitted that this was so. The boundary had been originally announced as being at approximately Mile 15. When a group of parents in that area circulated a petition asking that they be permitted to continue to send their children to the Eagle River School, the boundary was returned to the mile 17 end of Birchwood Loop. This resulted in serious over crowded classrooms at Eagle River, with some students having to attend classes in the nearby Baptist Church. The Chugiak Elementary School, on the other hand, had four unoccupied classrooms. In attempt to equalize this, the administration once again moved the boundary this time to the precinct line at mile 15 1/4. They, however, gave parents living within this area the option of choosing which school their children would attend.

One parent asked how many children living within the area between mile 17 and mile 15 1/4 were attending the Eagle River School. They were told the number was 16. When asked if these were required to attend the Chugiak Elementary School would this not bring the enrollment above the minimum necessary to allow a full-time principal, they were told it would.

Mr. Guffey said that there were some parents living on the North end of the Birchwood Loop who had indicated that they would prefer to send their children to the Chugiak School. He said that if other parents would volunteer to also send their children to Chugiak, the enrollment might also be brought above the minimum. Another factor

Palo Alto and in the Anchorage area at the Providence Hospital and Ft. Richardson Dispensary.

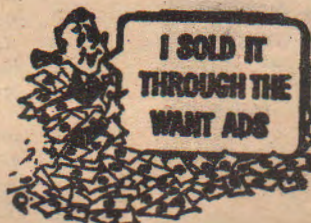
The members of the Fire Company did not vote Mrs. Armstrong the "Fireman of the Year" for any one particular act of heroism or outstanding service. They chose to honor her as a person that exemplifies the ideals that are necessary to sustain a fire company such as the one in Eagle River.

Mrs. Armstrong noticed that the Rescue Ambulance often responded to calls with only a driver. Upon investigating she found that most of the drivers had tried to attend first aid courses, but in some cases even this was not possible. Mrs. Armstrong then called chief Take and informed him that she would like to help on the rescue runs if she could be notified when they were being made. Mrs. Armstrong's phone was connected to the fire phone circuit and a very happy chapter was opened in the Fire Company Log-book.

Mrs. Armstrong is the first to admit that while volunteer help is important to the operation of the Fire Company, the real backbone

is the community support in the form of the twelve dollar annual membership donations. With the arrival of October and Fire Prevention Week, the time also arrives for the local drive to solicit community support for the Fire Company in the form of membership donations. The need this year is critical, as the Company has only the funds to renew the insurance for six months. Enough money must be raised to cover the balance of the year. 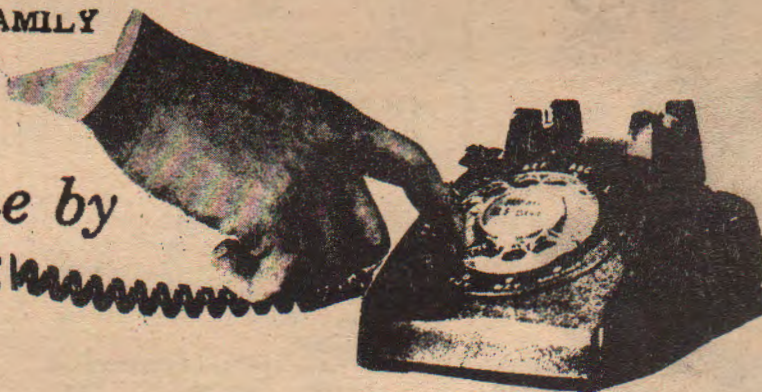

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

OPEN LETTER: Following a hearing before the Borough Assembly Monday night, requested by representatives of the Chugiak Benefit Association and the contractor maintaining the Eagle River Sanitary fill, the Assembly instructed the Borough Administration to hold a meeting of representatives of the Borough Health and Public Works Departments, the Chugiak Benefit Association and Grassee at the earliest opportunity to consider alternate solutions to the garbage and refuse disposal problem in the Greater Chugiak Area, created by the defeat October 3rd of the proposal to operate it a a locally tax supported facility.

Last April, the Borough Assembly approved the advance of one thousand dollars from contingency funds for the cleanup and maintenance of the Eagle River disposal area with the understanding that a proposal to provide a locally tax-supported operation would be placed on the ballot at the October Borough election and under the belief and assumption that the voters would assume that responsibility by passing the proposition.

The disposal operation was abandoned by contractor Grassee in December 1966 and by March 1967 access to the area was blocked by uncontrolled dumping of rubbish and car bodies. From funds made available by the Borough, the Chugiak Benefit Association entered into an agreement with Mr. Roteman, a resident and heavy equipment owner of the Highland Hills, to (1) clean up and bury the winter's accumulation of car bodies and rubbish along the road into and at the disposal site and (2) establish and maintain a sanitary fill in accordance with requirements of the State and Borough Health Departments, the work to be accomplished at a contracted cost of \$22.50 per hour for equipment and operator.

On or about June 15, the site was in operation as a sanitary fill, approved by the Borough Health Department. The car bodies and accumulated rubbish along the road rightaway into the site was cleaned and buried as ground conditions permitted, the job being completed about September 15th.

From the date of the first snow plowing of the road in February until October 3rd, eighty-six hours were spent in clean up, burying and in maintenance and operation of the facility at a total cost of \$1,980.00. Of this amount 41 hours costing \$900.00 was required to clear up the mess allowed to be created by former contractor, Grassee.

Early in August Mr. Roteman and Chugiak Benefit Association realized that the funds advanced by the Borough would not cover the cost of cleanup, and of operation of the sanitary fill through the summer. Both took the gamble that the tax proposal October 3rd would be approved by the voters. Operation and maintenance of the sanitary fill was abandoned immediately following the election and Chugiak Benefit

Association, a non-profit and penniless community organization whose backing was required by the State Health Department to sponsor the sanitary fill, finds itself in debt to the operator, Mr. Roteman, in the amount of approximately \$900.00.

Following an inspection of the site Monday, Assistant Borough Health Department Director, Cliff Judkins, ordered the closure of the facility for non-compliance with Borough and State Health Department codes.

The purpose of the meeting called for by the Assembly is to find a solution to the problem of meeting the financial obligation of \$1,980.00 to the Borough and Mr. Roteman, and to determine how and under what conditions the sanitary fill can be reopened.

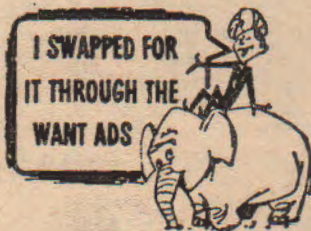
SWISS VISITORS STAYING HERE

RASH OF LOCAL BURGLARIES TOLD

CHUGIAK: A series of burglaries and vandalism in the Greater Chugiak Area have been reported and are under investigation by the State Police.

On October 6th, a report of a break in at the H & H Nursery Supply store in Birchwood was turned in by the proprietor, Allen R. Hildeman. A cash box containing money was stolen.

Other incidents in the Birchwood Area involved vandalism reported by Beverly June Emmons. The windows in her home were broken and the house ransacked. Leonard J. Sarri of Birchwood Spur reported the theft of a shotgun, tools and hunting knives.

Also in the Birchwood area, was the theft of a Chevrolet truck generator and two tires mounted on Dodge wheels from the home of John L. Jones of Scenic Drive.

On October 12th, Walter Pipple of Mile 14 1/2, in Eagle River reported that a warehouse on their property had been ransacked and numerous items missing.

All these cases are under investigation by Alaska State Troopers.

TURNING CAR DAMAGED IN CRASH

OLD CHUGIAK: A rear-end collision at mile 18 last Wednesday evening resulted in minor injuries to an Anchorage woman.

Donald E. Laws, of Division Street had stopped his car and with turn indicator in action waited for a break in traffic to turn into Division Street from the Glenn Highway.

Dorothy D. Adams, of Anchorage, driving a 1965 Chevrolet Station wagon, crossed over the double line to pass another car, saw Laws with the blinkers in operation, attempted to stop but was unable to avoid crashing into the rear of his car.

Damage to Laws 1965 Ford sedan was estimated at \$500. Mrs. Adams sustained \$300 damage to her Chevrolet, and suffered a cut lip. She was cited for improper passing.

FRIDAY 13 UNLUCKY FOR MOTORIST

EKLUTNA: Friday the 13th lived up to it's tradition last week for Gerald J. Dufour of Anchorage.

Dufour, driving a 1966 Ford sedan, rounded the curve at the Eklutna River Bridge when he came upon the scene of an accident which had taken place only five minute earlier.

The sight so unnerved him, that he lost control of his car, which ran off the road and over the bank. Injured in the wreck was Belinda B. Dufour who sustained a fractured shoulder and Diane B. Dufour who suffered a heat injure. They were taken to Providence Hospital by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company rescue ambulance. The Ford was damaged an estimated \$500.

The accident which caused Dufour's distress took place at the same location at 9:25am. A 1962 Dodge 4 by 4, driven by PFC Rodney B. Haskins of Ft. Richardson had skidded on the icy curve and went out of control rolling over three times. Haskins and a passenger Leon C. Taylor both suffered lacerations of the head and cuts and bruises. Both were twken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital by a military ambulance. Damage to the Dodge was estimated at \$3,000.

He had been attached to the K-9 Corps. He is survived by his wife Linda who was staying with her parents in Oregon.

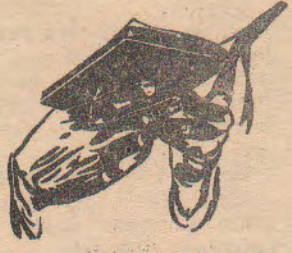

which was being considered was that a children's home was in the process of being licensed in the Peters Creek area. When this is operating at peak, there will be twenty more children living in the area who will attend the Chugiak school.

One parent stated that since the problem was a result of the administration yielding to a petition, then another petition appeared to be the answer to solving the problem. He said that he felt that many more individuals were affected by the change in the boundary than the original signers of the first petition. He pointed out the children who were suffering by attending overcrowded classes, while classrooms were being unused at another school. He also pointed out that because

of this, the Chugiak School stood to be deprived of the services of a full time principal, and so would the Birchwood School when that was completed. He asked that since it was against the policy of

PTA to attempt to dictate administration policy, that the group recess while a petition was drawn up. A committee formed, which drew up a petition that asked that "... the Borough School District re-establish the zoning lines in such a manner as to fully utilize the present classroom and teacher facilities of each school within the
