

DUMP FEES TO BE CHARGED AGAIN



Snow and frozen ground have failed to stop this tracked monster which has been crawling along the roads and through the fields of the Chugiak area.

It is the cable laying rig, which belongs to the W. L. Grasle Electrical Contractors, who are installing the cable for the new Chugiak exchange of the Matanuska Telephone Association.

The machine digs a trench about six inches wide and eighteen inches deep, and lays the cable in it as it moves. A second tractor comes along and covers the cable. This is a continuous operation. The rig moves at about two miles per hour, and the excavation is covered up immediately, inconveniencing the public hardly at all.

EAGLE RIVER: The local sanitary fill, which was closed last week due to the lack of funds for continued operation, may re-open on Saturdays and Sundays of a fee basis.

The dump had been operated as a free, open at all times sanitary fill on the assumption of the Borough Assembly that voters of the Greater Chuglak Area would approve a proposed one-quarter mill tax for its operation. The Borough Assembly had advanced one thousand dollars toward its operation until funds from taxes could be collected. To meet the Borough and State Departments of Health standards of maintenance of a sanitary fill, an additional \$980.00 of cat work was performed by the contractor, Ernest Roetman of Highland Hills, during the period of February to October 3rd, at which time the voters of the area turned down the dump proposition.

Since the Chugiak Benefit Association is held responsible by the Borough Administration for acceptable maintenance of the facility, a meeting has been scheduled for 7:30pm on Thursday at the home of Les Todd in Eagle River, at which time Assemblyman Willis will present his proposal to the Board of Directors of CBA for consideration.

Assemblyman Willis said that beginning this weekend, the dump would be open from 10am to 6pm on Saturday, and from 12 noon to 6pm on Sunday. He said that a gate has been erected arross the road to the dump where at road joins the Glenn Highway. "his he felt would discourage peop from driving down the road out or sight of the highway, and then dumping their trash outside the gate during the hours when the dump was not open.

FOOD COSTS LESS THIS YEAR

Retail food prices, though at the highest level for 1967, aver-aged 1.5 per cent below the peak reached in September of peak reached in September of last year, according to the quar-terly report on Alaska's food prices compiled by the Alaska Agricultural Experiment Sta-tion. The average "basket" price for 11 Alaska cities this past quarter was \$22.97, or 35 cents lower than the \$23.32 reg-istered a year ago.

istered a year ago.

Pork prices accounted for a large part of the decrease, the report stated, with bacon averaging 10½ cents a pound lower and pork chops down five cents Beef prices were virpound.

Butter was down two cents a pound from a year ago, this decline being balanced by a two cent a pound rise in the price of margarine. Egg prices, influenced by the largest June egg production on record and a five per cent increase in the laying

tiock nationally, declined by 13.8 per cent from a year ago, the report continued. Some cities reported a drop in egg prices from last year of 10 to 18 cents a doz-

Fresh fruit and vegetable prices averaged higher than last year, with the exception of onions which were three cents a

pound lower.

Retail food prices for the third quarter, June to September, 1967, edged upward with the "basket" containing forty the "basket" containing forty food items costing consumers in eleven Alaskan cities \$22.97 in September compared to \$22.99 in June, or a rise of seven cents. Although five cities reported lower average prices for the quarter the rising prices in the other six more than offset these reductions. reductions.





MEASLES ARE DOWN

Measles cases reported 11 Alaska from Jan 1 to Sept. 16, 1967 show nearly a 75 per cent drop from the numbered reported for the same period last year.
These are cases of red measles
(rubeola) for which a new vaccine was developed that has been used on a statewide i m-munization campaign for the past 18 months, according Dr. John Chapman, commis-sioner of the Alaska department

of health and welfare.

He said that "the 1966 incidence reported was 508 cases as compared with 140 cases for the same period in 1967."

"Maryles can be arredicated."

"Measles can be eradicated," Doctor Chapman said, "now that we have available a vaccine which gives lifelong im-munity to this serious disease. It can be fatal, it can cause permanent hearing damage, and it can result in mental retarda-tion. All children should have the protection of measles immunzation which may be re-ceived from private physicians and at Public Health clinics."

which the school planners had estab-lished for the start of the school year back to the mile 17 boundary of previous years. This resulted in an inbalance of students, with the Eagle River school overcrowded, and the Chugiak Elementary School with unassigned teachers and unused classrooms. This also caused the enrollment of the Chugiak Elementary School to fall below the minimum number of students required to justify the need for a full time prin-Because of this the administration had planned to remove Emerson Sortore as principal of the Chugiak school, and have Birchwood School Principal, Harry Wimmer carry out the duties as prin-cipal at both schools, devoting half of his time to one school, and half to the other.

Parents felt that this would not have been necessary had not the Administration yielded to the pressure of the first petition, and began the second petition in hopes that the situation could be corrected.

An alternative to returning the school boundaries to the point where the school administration had set them prior to the first petition, was to have some parents living on the north end of the Birchwood Loop volunteer to send their children to the Chugiak grade school in hopes of bringing the enrollment back to the humber necessary to retain a principal. It was learned that the enrollment was thirteen students short of the minimum.

Mr. Sortore said that as of Monday, there were six children from Birchwood whose parents had offered to transfer them to the Chugiak School.





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
