

CHUGIAK SCHOOL TO KEEP PRINCIPAL

ANCHORAGE: The possibility that the Chugiak Elementary School would lose its Principal due to low enrollment has been cancelled out by increased membership in recent weeks, the Anchorage Borough School District reported Monday.

"Enrollment as of today, October 30th, was 190 pupils, and there is every reason to believe additional pupils will be entering Chugiak Elementary in the weeks and months to come," Mr. Gordon Guffey, Assistant Superintendent in charge of the Instructional Services division reported.

"The improved enrollment picture, which first came to light when we met with the PTA two weeks ago, means that we are now in a position to say we will not be forced to make an administrative change in Chugiak. The present outlook for additional attendance is high, especially in view of the prospective enrollment from the new Chester Cromwell Children's Home, scheduled to open after the new year," he stated.

Enrollment at Chugiak Elementary had dropped to 140 pupils before a boundary change in mid-September resulted in the transfer of about 30 pupils to Chugiak from Eagle River Elementary. But additional pupils were needed in order to allow the school to qualify for a full time principal under the State School Foundation Program.

According to Mr. Guffey, the School District would lose over \$8,000 in State school funds if enrollment failed to stabilize at 188 pupils. When enrollment averages less than that figure, a school does not qualify for a full time principal under State regulations. A teacher-principal, or head teacher normally is designated in cases where enrollment is too low.

"We at the School District are pleased to announce the increased enrollment at Chugiak, and to commend the school attendance area on its response to the problem we were all facing earlier in the month. We appreciated the understanding and cooperation which was expressed at our meeting with the parents," said Mr. Guffey.

MONSIGNOR HEADS ST. ANDREWS

EAGLE RIVER: St. Andrew's Church of Eagle River, formerly a mission of St. Anthony's Parish in Anchorage, has now been elevated to a full parish status.

The announcement was made this week by Archbishop Joseph T. Ryan.

The Right Reverend Monsignor Francis A. Cowgill, Chancellor of the Archdiocese has been appointed as the first pastor of the parish.

St. Andrew's, which was built early in 1962, first opened its doors on Easter Sunday of that year. It was built primarily by the volunteer labor of the parishioners in Eagle River and also received a \$10,000 grant from the Catholic Church Extension Society to aid in its completion.

PRIVATE OPERATOR TO RUN DUMP

EAGLE RIVER: The question of who would operate the Eagle River Sanitary Fill has been the prime local problem ever since the voters of Section One defeated Proposition I at the October 3rd election.

The proposition would have the Fill operated as a free public dump supported by a 1/4 mill tax levied on the property owners of the Greater Chugiak Area.

A solution to the problem was announced this week by Section One Assemblyman Ed Willis. Rather than agree to allow the Assembly to authorize a tax levy to the local property owners under the Health Ordinance, Willis said that he would personally take the responsibility of seeing that the dump was properly administered. Willis said that he felt a tax levy to support the dump under the guise of a health measure was over riding the wishes that the

DEAR EDITOR:

The recent Oct. 3 rejection at the polls by voters of the area for the maintenance of the Eagle River Sanitary Land Fill by a tax levy of 1/4 mill on the residents of Section One; and a resolution passed by the Borough Assembly asking the Administration for an estimate of the cost to operate the land-fill and prepare a tax assessment on the area--modified at my request to hold preliminary meetings with all concerned parties to seek a solution to our dump problem--has resulted, I believe, in some progress.

The opinion held by most Borough Officials, some Assemblymen and citizens is that the Assembly should under the areawide health power levy and assess taxes for the operation of the dump-- despite it's rejection by the voters. The Assembly does have this power!

In analysing the reasons why the voters turned down the proposition of a tax supported sanitary-fill the following reasons seem to be the most often given:

1. Many residents pay a refuse firm to have their garbage hauled and do not feel that they should again have to pay taxes to support a "free dump."

2. It has become apparent that residents of other areas of the Borough have been using the local dump. It is not fair for local residents to be taxed to cover up someone else's garbage.

3. Some feel the dump should be more centrally located. The Borough Sanitarian is of the opinion that the dump should be moved within two years to keep seepage from the dump area from contaminating the state campground and Eagle River.

Because I believe that this is rightfully a ballot-box decision under our 2nd class Borough status, and in view of the above objections, I will resist any efforts to override the vote of the people by the Assembly. It is obvious that major flaws have come to light in the proposition as it was presented.

Until the discrepancies are corrected and a proper package prepared for presentation to the voters, the other alternative is to run the dump on a more limited hourly basis and charge fees for dumping. This is a recognized and accepted practice throughout the country.

After a furious week of about a dozen conferences, meetings and phone conversations with Borough, C.B.A., and refuse company officials, I wish to report that the sanitary-fill was reopened under the direction of the Anchorage Refuse Company this past weekend.

Preliminary discussions have indicated that the dump will be open during the winter months from 10am to 5pm on Saturday, and 10am to 4pm on Sunday, with a distinct possibility of it being opened for 4 hours on Wednesday afternoon.

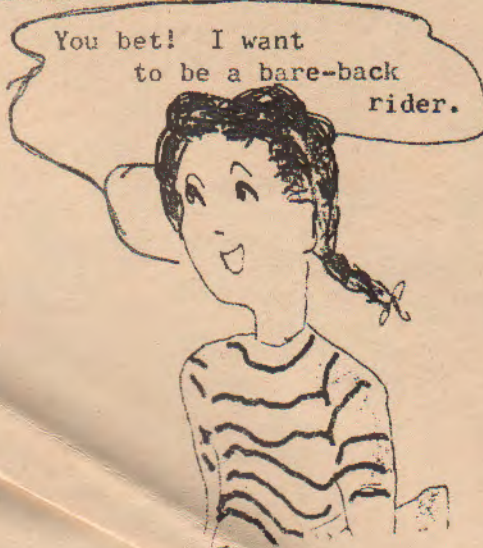
These hours will be extended for greater coverage during the spring and summer months.

There will be a minimum of a \$1.00 charge for dumping refuse up to a yard. Then an additional 25 cents for each additional yard. This is in line with charges being made by the City dump.

Admittedly many "knotty" problems remain to be worked out. Among the more difficult problems faced is placing of responsibility and scheduling the repayment of the \$1,000 advanced by the Borough Assembly to eliminate a serious health hazard caused by the improper dis-

The dinner is sponsored by the Chuglak Elementary PTA, and parents are reminded to bring their food contributions down to the school as early as possible.

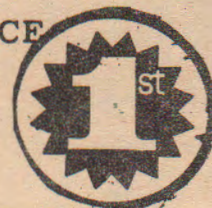

BIRCHWOOD: General Motors recently announced the continuation of its Scholarship Plan by making available 300 scholarships to outstanding secondary school graduates for the fall of 1968 at more than 200 colleges and universities. voters had expressed at the polls. He obtained the authority to take any measures he deemed necessary in managing the dump from the Chugiak Benefit Association (who control the lease on the State land where the dump is located) and in turn he has made arrangements with a private operator.

Willis said that the dump will be operated by Anchorage Refuse Company, who operate the garbage pick-up service in the Greater Chugiak Area. Anchorage Refuse will keep the dump open on three days of the week on a fee charge basis. In turn, they have agreed to keep the garbage covered up in accordance with the standards of the GAAB Health District, and to keep the road to the dump open all winter.

Willis, admitted that this solution may be only a temporary one, but that for the time being the residents of the area will have a place to which they can bring their refuse without having to pay the tax which they had rejected.

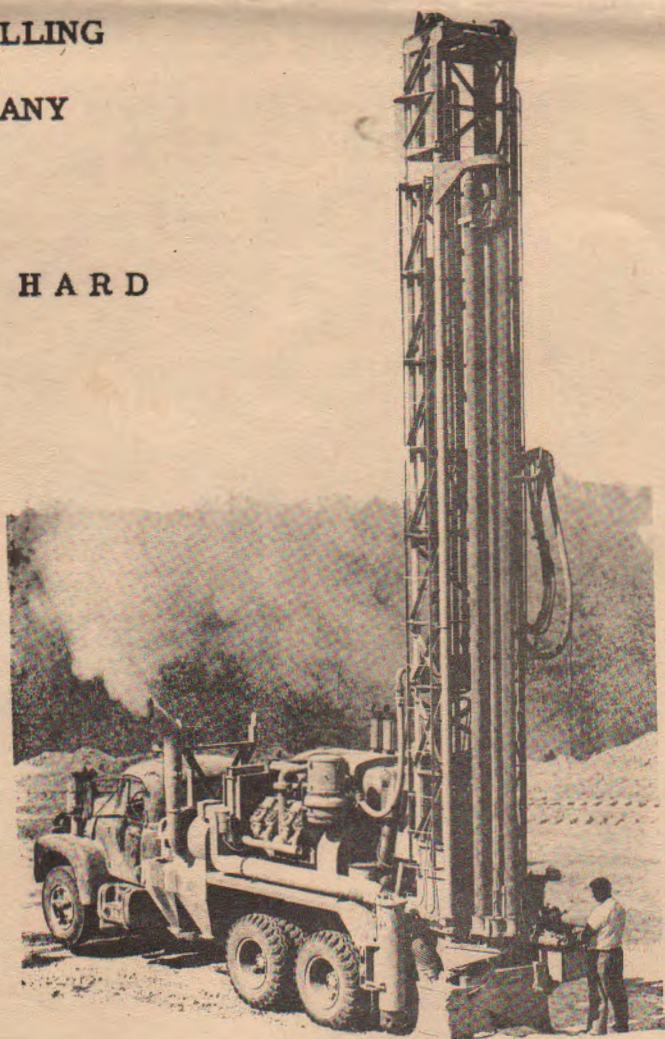

DEFENSIVE DRIVING CLASS OFFERED

OLD CHUGIAK: A class in Defensive Driving will be offered to the residents of the Greater Chuglak Area on Saturday, November 11th.

This is a standardized course, which has been put out under the direction of the National Safety Council and is presented by the Alaska State Police.

It consists of eight 1 hour classroom sessions and by means of films, charts and other visual aids shows the driver how to stay out of accidents, avoid collisions and other common driving hazards.

This course has been presented to drivers all over the state, and through the efforts of the Birchwood Loopers Homemaker Club, it is to be presented here. The course will be held at the Chuglak Methodist Church at mile 18. Classes will begin at 9:00am and last until 5:00pm. Those attending are asked to bring a sack lunch. Coffee will be provided by the Loopers. There is no charge for the course, and those attending do not need to bring any notebooks.

The class is conducted by Sgt. Bob Robertson of the Alaska State Police. Sgt. Robertson was at one time stationed as the trooper to cover the Chuglak Area and made his home in Eagle River.

The course is open to all interested persons, and is not limited to licensed drivers. Sgt. Robertson said that he particularly welcomes teen-aged drivers, or youngsters who plan to start driving in a few years.

Those attending the course will be given a card indicating that they have participated. Sgt. Robertson

said that several insurance companies offer a lower rate to those who have taken the course in Defensive Driving.

NROTC APPLICATIONS ARE BEING ACCEPTED

BIRCHWOOD: Applications for the Navy's twenty-second annual Regular NROTC qualification test are now available in the counseling office of Chuglak High School. This nationwide examination will be given on December 9, 1967.

All eligible male high school seniors and graduates may apply.

On the basis of this test, personal interviews, medical examinations, and other factors, over 1,700 young men will enter the Regular NROTC Program as midshipmen at NROTC units in 52 colleges and universities throughout the nation. Male citizens of the United States who will be at least 17, but not yet 21 on June 30, 1968, and who are now high school seniors or graduates, may be eligible to apply for the test. Those who attain qualifying scores will be interviewed and given medical examinations next January and February.

A successful candidate receives financial aid for four years of college. This includes tuition and educational fees, books, uniforms, and \$50.00 per month subsistence allowance. After successfully completing baccalaureate degree requirements and naval training, graduates are commissioned as officers in the U.S. Navy or Marine Corps.

Regular NROTC midshipmen participate in three summer at-sea training periods with various naval units. These periods assist them in learning about the variety of interesting and challenging opportunities available to them as naval or marine corps officers.

Registrations for the test will close November 17, 1967. NROTC Bulletins for 1968 containing eligibility requirements and qualifying test applications are available in the counseling office at the high school, or the U.S. Navy Recruiting Station in Anchorage.

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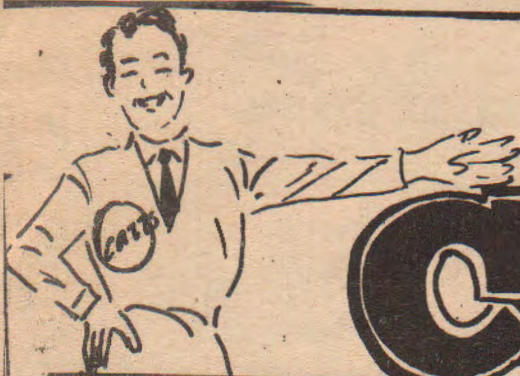
