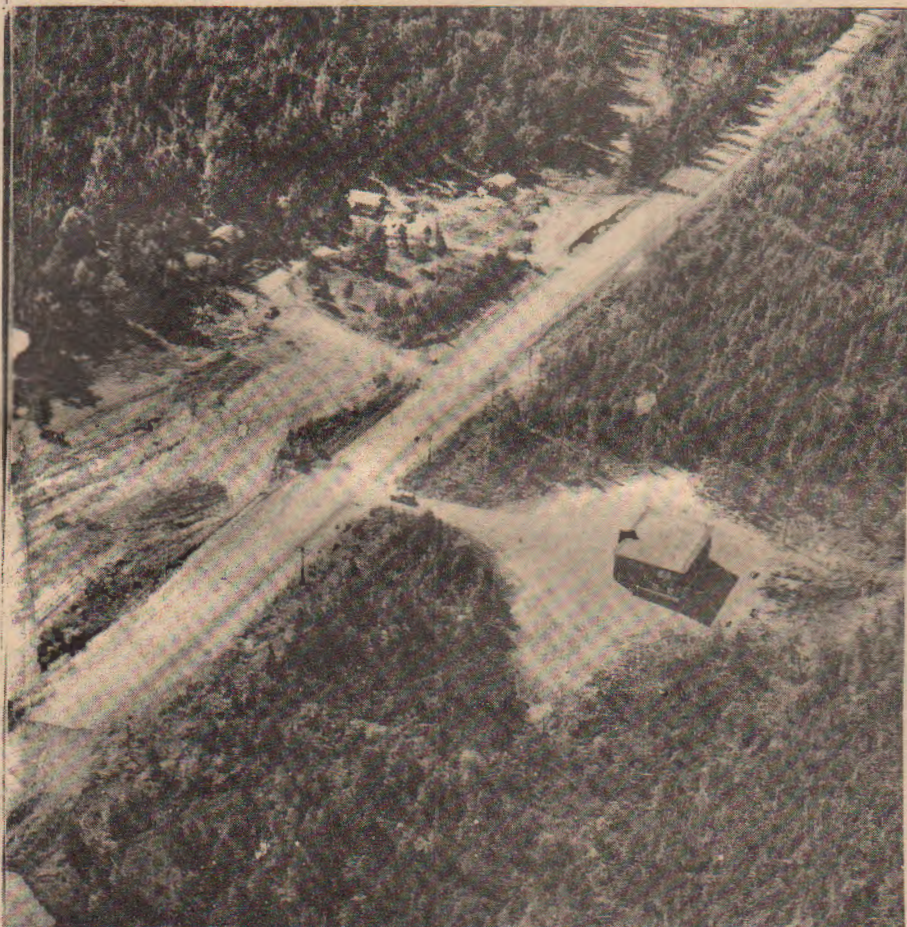


OEO VOTES FOR LOCAL COMMUNITY CENTER

ANCHORAGE: At a meeting of the Greater Anchorage Area Office of Opportunity Board of Trustees last Friday night, it was voted to finance a center for the Greater Chugiak Area.

The center will be located for the present in the basement of the Chugiak Methodist Church.

Located in the center will be office space for Social Security, employment, State Trooper, and a facility for purchasing auto license plates.

The decision to authorize the center for this area followed a survey taken this fall which showed a great need for services of this nature in Chugiak, instead of having to drive into Anchorage for them.

It is the hope of the OEO that the community will take advantage of the center and its facilities, so that other needed services may be added, according to Mrs. Kathleen Walker, Community Aide.

At this same meeting, a motion was brought before the board to sponsor a low cost child care center for working mothers of low income families for this area. Negotiations for this facility are now going on, with Mrs. Loretta French of the T.L.C. Child Care Center in Birchwood. As soon as plans are complete an opening date will be announced in the Courier, Mrs. Walker said.

WHY WAS THE DUMP PROPOSITION DUMPED?

CHUGIAK: The defeat at last October 3rd borough election of Proposition I, which called for a Free Public Dump supported by a 1/4 mill property tax, has led to speculation on the part of many local citizens as to why it failed to pass.

Former Assemblyman Glenn Briggs, believes that it is because of lack of education on the part of the public as to just how much or in this case how little individual cost was involved, and offers the following figures for consideration.

In comparison of the benefits and costs of operation of the Eagle River dump under two proposals being considered. (1) The present operation under Grasee management. Open 10am to 5pm Saturdays and Sundays. Minimum dumping fees are \$1.00 per trip. (2) Operation and maintenance supported by one quarter mill property tax; Dump open at all times. Costs calculated in the following manner:

DEFENSIVE DRIVING CLASS OFFERED

OLD CHUGIAK: A class in Defensive Driving will be offered to the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area on Saturday, November 11th.

This is a standardized course, which has been put out under the direction of the National Safety Council and is presented by the Alaska State Police.

It consists of eight 1 hour classroom sessions and by means of films, charts and other visual aids shows the driver how to stay out of accidents, avoid collisions and other common driving hazards.

Thompsons and their infant son occupied the apartment which had been provided for them in the school building.

The history of the Chugiak school is one of overcrowded classrooms and temporary buildings. The main building was added to twice through the years, and the primary building built and also enlarged. For nine years the overflow was housed in quonset huts, rented church buildings and others. Even when the Eagle River School was built, the need for quonsets was not alleviated.

It was not until this year, when the student body of the Birchwood School was removed from Chugiak that the school experienced the novelty of a surplus of classroom space.

Three elementary schools now serve the Greater Chugiak Area, in addition to the High School. Swanson, looks back to the problems that were experienced during

When the school opened its doors for the first time in October of 1951, it was already overcrowded. It had been built to accommodate 40 students, with two classrooms and a multi-purpose room in the basement. Two teachers, a Mr. George Thompson as head teacher, and his wife had been hired. It was necessary to convert the multi-purpose room into a third classroom, and hire another teacher. Mrs. Olson, a military wife was hired, and she and her husband lived in make-shift quarters in the school furnace room.

EDUCATION IN CHUGIAK

This is National Education Week, an event which makes some of our old timers hark back to the early days in Chugiak when we had no schools at all in the area, and the few homesteaders children were either taught by their parents by means of correspondence course, or rode a bus to Anchorage.

Paul Swanson, Chugiak Postmaster tells us that it was in 1948 that the Chugiak Community Club attempted to get a school for this area. They were told by the then Territorial Government that if they could provide a building, a teacher would be found. When they were unable to come up with a suitable building, they tried to get the Territory to furnish that also. A school committee consisting of Swanson and Vern Haik eventually did get the Territory to agree to build the school. The site selected is the one on which the Chugiak Elementary school now stands.

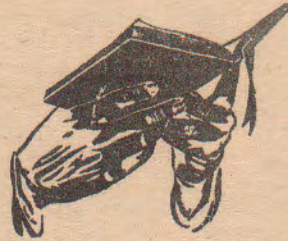

The population explosion always manages to keep one step ahead of school builders, and it may well be that when the Birchwood School is completed that it too, like the little Chugiak School in 1951, may already be overcrowded.

1/4 mill on \$5,000 property valuation...\$1.25 per year. 1/4 mill on \$10,000 property valuation, \$2.50 per year. 1/4 mill on \$25,000 valuation...\$6.25 per year. Briggs points out that it is obvious from these figures that anyone using the dump regularly would not only pay much more with it under private management, but would not enjoy the convenience of being to dump at any time of the day, any day of the week.

Briggs said that he has been assured by Borough Officials that if the voter should ever approve a tax supported free public dump at a future election, private refuse collectors would have to pay to dump their trucks there, the revenue from this would be included in the fund for the support of the dump.

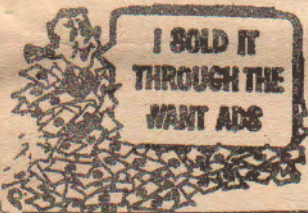

HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC TEAMS RE-DESIGNATED

CORDOVA: High School Athletic teams will be re-designated starting this year following a decision made at the WAHSA (Western Alaska High School Activities Association) meeting held on October 28th in Cordova.

Previously the top eight teams were in class A, and these came from the eight schools with the largest enrollment. Because of the wide gap in the enrollment figures, with schools such as East and West having over 1,000 students and the smaller ones, such as Chugiak, having less than 500, it was felt that a more equitable system should be devised. Under the new classification, all schools having an enrollment of over 800 would be in the new Class AA. At this time there are only four that qualify, East Anchorage, West Anchorage, Dimond and Lathrop of Fairbanks.

In the new Class A, five schools qualify. These are Kenai, Palmer, Chugiak, Ellson and Kodiak.

Class B will consist of Wasilla, Seward, Copper Valley, Cordova, Homer and Monroe of Fairbanks.

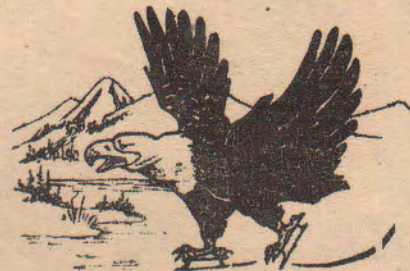
Class C, which is divided into Eastern and Western division remains unchanged.

The 1968 meeting of the Alaska Sportsman's Council will be held in the Anchorage Palmer Area.



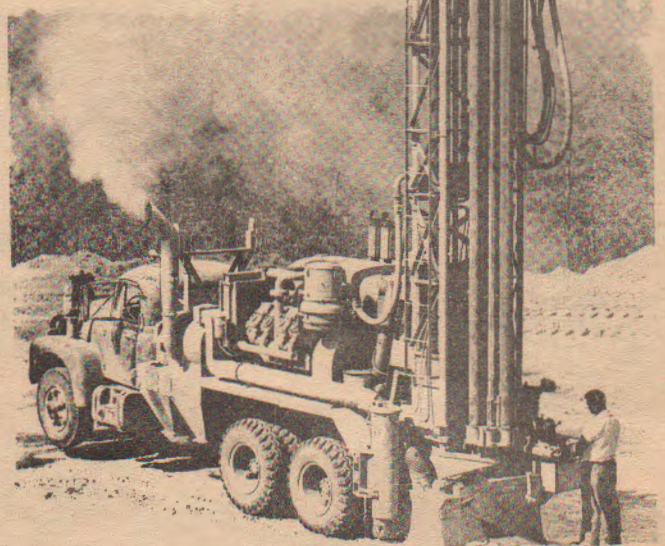

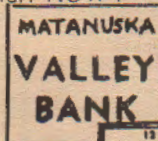
