

LOCAL MAN INVOLVED IN FATAL ACCIDENT

FT. RICHARDSON: A Birchwood man escaped injury in a two car accident which fatally injured a Ft. Richardson soldier last Friday evening.

Robert Lyle Bennett, of Helluva Road in Birchwood was driving a 1964 Chevrolet sedan, when he was struck head-on by a 1962 Volkswagon bus, driven by James Edward Jelliffe, of Hqs. 19th Avn. Bn. Ft. Richardson.

Jelliffe died as the result of injuries sostained in the accident. A passenger in his car, Kenneth L. Wardwell of the same organization escaped with only minor bruises and abrasions.

The accident took place at 10pm on November 10th, State Troopers said that the weather was warm and the road dry at the time.

No citations have been issued pending completion of investigation.



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It was further concluded that releasing mortality might be substanteasing mortality might be substan-tially reduced if proper techniques were used in handling and removing the hook or hooks. Never insert fingers inside the gill covers, or grasp trout by the gills to remove books. hooks. This is nearly always fatal to the fish. The proper way is to use a pair of longnose pliers to remove artificial lures, or flies. The fish does not have to be handled when pliers are used. It is preferwhen pliers are used. It is prefer-able to leave the fish in the water and never handle it at all. If fishing with bait, and the hook is ingested too deep for easy removal, cut the leader as close to the hook as possible to release.

he was attempting to pack out the meat. A neighbor, Kenneth Huling of Foothill Drive in Peters Creek of Foothill Drive in Peters Creek was with the State Trooper when Williams body was discovered at approximately 1:00pm on Friday. He appeared to be following a different trail then the one he had nsed going in. When the body was discovered, it appeared that Wil-liams had discarded his pack and had either sat downto rest on falhad either sat downto rest on fal-len tree, or had collapsed in that position. The body was returned to Anchorage for autopsy. Although the results of the autopsy have not yet been released, members of his family believe that his death was the result of a diabetic condition from which he suffered.

Memorial services were held at the Scenic Park Bible Churc', at Muldoon Road and Madely ne Drive with the Rev. Jack Backer officiating.

Williams was the State T restor for the Child Evangelism Fillowship, which conducts the Grad News Club for children.

The Williams family had come to Alaska in 1963 as missionaries. They made their home at mile 22. He is survived by his wife Doris, two sons Dale and David and a daughter Dee, Dale had been attending Praries Bible Institute in Condo he her bergend in Cher Canada, he has returned to Chug-iak, and will enroll in Chugiak High School so that he may be with his family. Mrs. Williams and her children plan to remain in the Chugiak area. David is a ninth his her

High School gym, each Saturday, from 10:00am to 12:00 noon. The first few weeks will be devoted to a clinic, after which a game schedule will be played.



SINGLE HOOK VERSUS TREBLE HOOK

ANCHORAGE: Canadian fishery biologists have recently completed controlled studies into the relative hooking mortality of rainbow trout using a fly, treble hook, and a single hook plus worm, according to R.E. Andrews, fishery biologist for the Alaska Department of lish and Game. The purpose of the studies wes to

'The purpose of the studies wes to quantitatively assess the mortality caused by hooking and releasing trout. It is common for some anglers to hook and release trout after catching their daily bag limit, or to be selective from the start, releasing fish under or over a preferred size, or in many cases to fish strictly for fun, releasing every fish caught. As pointed out ity the Canadians, "There is nothing wrong in this practice as long as mortality to fish caused by hooking is negligible. On the other hand, if mortality is high on released fish, then good management would dictate the need for fishing regulations to reduce this loss," some anglers and conservation groups become so concerned about the injury to hooked and released fish that they assert pressures for enactment of regulations restricting sport fishing gear -- usually to fly fishing only. The resoning restricting certain areas to fly fishing only is that it is assumed that fly fishing is less injurious to released fish relative to other types of fishing gear. With lit ' factual evidence available to free ulate realistic fishing regulat. plicable to hooking mortalit, controlled speriments were carried out in defitish Columbia with wild rainbow crout.

Rainbow iront were caught from Pennask Lake, B.C., using flies, treble hooks attached to spoons and single hook with bait. After landing the trout were transferred to holding pens, tagged for later identification and observed for mortality. Mortalities were recorded in twelve hour periods. The fish were held a total of 48 hours in the pens as most mortalities occurred within the first 12 hours following hooking. The results at the conclusion of

The results at the conclusion of the study showed that mortality to released trout caught with a fly was the least, followed by fish hooked with a treble hook. Greatest mortality resulted from a single
