BIRCHWOOD: Increased vandalism, burglaries and related crimes throughout the Greater Chugiak Area have prompted the Birchwood Community Club Inc. to sponsor a public law enforcement forum, to be held on Thursday, November 16th at 8:00pm in the team teaching room at Chugiak High School.

The program will be a panel discussion, with hopes of solving some of the problems facing enforcement agencies and to better inform citizens of their rights in these matters.

Members of the panel will be: Judge James A. Hanson, Presiding District Judge, David Young, Assistant Attorney General, Trooper Gilbert W. Hagen, representing Major W.W. Trafton, Regional Commissioner of Alaska State Troopers, William Cunningham, Chief Probation Officer, Youth and Adult Authority, Rev. John J. Shaffer, pastor, Chugiak Methodist Church, Emmerson Sortore, Principal, Chugiak Elementary School, Harry Wimmer, Principal, Birchwood Elementary School, State Senator, Nick Begich, State Representative, Jack R. Simpson; Darrell Daley, teacher, Chugiak High School, Garland Connell of Birchwood, and Robert E. Fleming of Old Chugiak.

Dr. Carlile Kramer, Superintendent of Anchorage Borough Schools and Mr. John Asplund, Borough Chairman, along with all the principals and PTA Presidents of Borough Schools have been invited to attend.

The public from Palmer to Rabbit Creek have been invited, and questions for the panel may be submitted in written form at the door.

SERVICES HELD FOR DUANE WILLIAMS

ANCHORAGE: Memorial Services were held yesterday, Tuesday, November 14th for J. Duane Williams of Peters Creek, who was found dead in the Knik River area where he had been hunting.

Williams had left on a moose hunt last Wednesday, November 8th for a days hunt. When he failed to return that evening, the State Police were notified, and a search organized.

The search party located his car which he had parked, and attempted to trail him. They found where he had shot a moose, and deduced that

LOCAL MAN INVOLVED IN FATAL ACCIDENT

FT. RICHARDSON: A Birchwood man escaped injury in a two car accident which fatally injured a Ft. Richardson soldier last Friday evening.

Robert Lyle Bennett, of Helluva Road in Birchwood was driving a 1964 Chevrolet sedan, when he was struck head-on by a 1962 Volkswagen bus, driven by James Edward Jelliffe, of Hqs. 19th Avn. Bn. Ft. Richardson.

Jelliffe died as the result of injuries sustained in the accident. A passenger in his car, Kenneth L. Wardwell of the same organization escaped with only minor bruises and abrasions.

The accident took place at 10pm on November 10th, State Troopers said that the weather was warm and the road dry at the time.

No citations have been issued pending completion of investigation.

This proposal will be presented to the Board of Trustees on Tuesday, November 14th for approval.

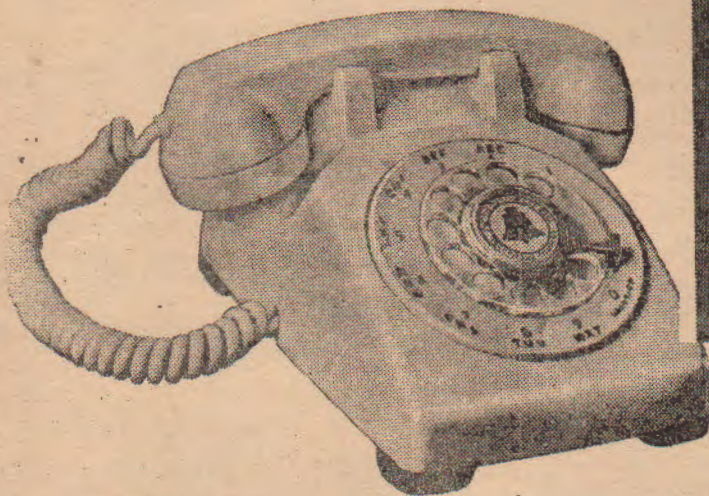

hook with worm because of deep ingestion and the fact that most anglers try to recover their hook and cause lethal injury through handling.

It was further concluded that releasing mortality might be substantially reduced if proper techniques were used in handling and removing the hook or hooks. Never insert fingers inside the gill covers, or grasp trout by the gills to remove hooks. This is nearly always fatal to the fish. The proper way is to use a pair of longnose pliers to remove artificial lures, or flies. The fish does not have to be handled when pliers are used. It is preferable to leave the fish in the water and never handle it at all. If fishing with bait, and the hook is ingested too deep for easy removal, cut the leader as close to the hook as possible to release.

The sooner this information is received the quicker the packages can be mailed.

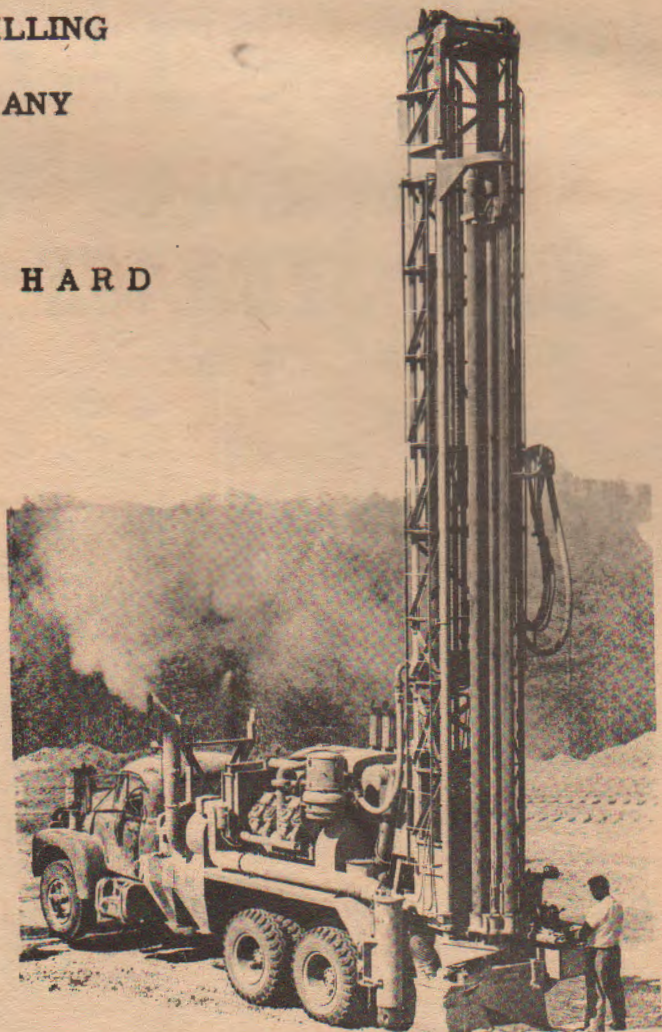

he was attempting to pack out the meat. A neighbor, Kenneth Huling of Foothill Drive in Peters Creek was with the State Trooper when Williams body was discovered at approximately 1:00pm on Friday.

He appeared to be following a different trail than the one he had used going in. When the body was discovered, it appeared that Williams had discarded his pack and had either sat down to rest on fallen tree, or had collapsed in that position. The body was returned to Anchorage for autopsy. Although the results of the autopsy have not yet been released, members of his family believe that his death was the result of a diabetic condition from which he suffered.

Memorial services were held at the Scenic Park Bible Church, at Muldoon Road and Madelyne Drive with the Rev. Jack Baer officiating.

Williams was the State Director for the Child Evangelism Fellowship, which conducts the Good News Club for children.

The Williams family had come to Alaska in 1963 as missionaries. They made their home at mile 22. He is survived by his wife Doris, two sons Dale and David and a daughter Dee. Dale had been attending Praries Bible Institute in Canada, he has returned to Chugiak, and will enroll in Chugiak High School so that he may be with his family. Mrs. Williams and her children plan to remain in the Chugiak area. David is a ninth

grader at Chuglak High, and Dee is in the sixth grade at Chuglak Elementary School. Dale will enroll as a Junior.

Other survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Williams of Canby, Ore; three brothers, Sid of Corvallis Ore, Lawrence of Oregon City, Ore, and Kenneth of Milwaukie Ore, and two sisters Mrs. Jack Thompson of Milwaukie and Mrs. Mike Ruskigno of Portland Ore.

Burial will be on a private plot in the Susitna Valley.

West Anchorage High School, an resides in Eagle River, was able to direct the search to the exact spot where Harms and James were down. They were found unharmed and the plane intact, but a four foot fall of wet snow was preventing their take-off. They were located approximately 20 miles west of Hilline Lake near Mt. Susitna.

They were able to contact the pair by radio, and learned that they were in need of snowshoes in order to pack the snow for take-off.

An attempt was made on Tuesday morning to fly in the snowshoes and another on Tuesday afternoon. On both occasions the Civil Air Patrol plane had to turn back on account of weather. The plane is remaining at Talkeetna over-

night on Tuesday and an attempt will again be made to reach them on Wednesday.

Pogany said that the men were well equipped for survival with a tent, sleeping bags and enough food for at least a week.

When the pair is able to take to the air, they will face the problem of being unable to return to their home base on Lower Fire Lake.

Warm temperatures in this area has been causing the ice on the lake to melt and had made it necessary for aircraft based there to evacuate. A note will be attached to the snow shoes advising the hunters to land at Campbell Lake where the ice is thick enough to support a plane.

Harms is the Industrial Arts Teacher at Chugiak. James teaches Science.

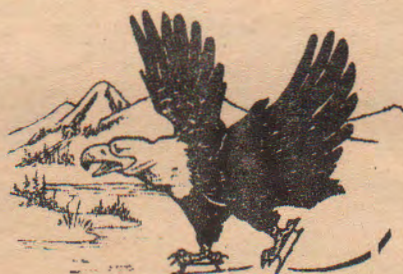

SINGLE HOOK VERSUS TREBLE HOOK

ANCHORAGE: Canadian fishery biologists have recently completed controlled studies into the relative hooking mortality of rainbow trout using a fly, treble hook, and a single hook plus worm, according to R.E. Andrews, fishery biologist for the Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

The purpose of the studies was to quantitatively assess the mortality caused by hooking and releasing trout. It is common for some anglers to hook and release trout after catching their daily bag limit, or to be selective from the start, releasing fish under or over a preferred size, or in many cases to fish strictly for fun, releasing every fish caught. As pointed out by the Canadians, "There is nothing wrong in this practice as long as mortality to fish caused by hooking is negligible. On the other hand, if mortality is high on released fish, then good management would dictate the need for fishing regulations to reduce this loss."

Some anglers and conservation groups become so concerned about the injury to hooked and released fish that they assert pressures for enactment of regulations restricting sport fishing gear -- usually to fly fishing only. The reasoning restricting certain areas to fly fishing only is that it is assumed that fly fishing is less injurious to released fish relative to other types of fishing gear.

With little factual evidence available to formulate realistic fishing regulations applicable to hooking mortality in a particular fishery, controlled experiments were carried out in British Columbia with wild rainbow trout.

Rainbow trout were caught from Pennask Lake, B.C., using flies, treble hooks attached to spoons and single hook with bait. After landing the trout were transferred to holding pens, tagged for later identification and observed for mortality. Mortalities were recorded in twelve hour periods. The fish were held a total of 48 hours in the pens as most mortalities occurred within the first 12 hours following hooking.

The results at the conclusion of the study showed that mortality to released trout caught with a fly was the least, followed by fish hooked with a treble hook. Greatest mortality resulted from a single

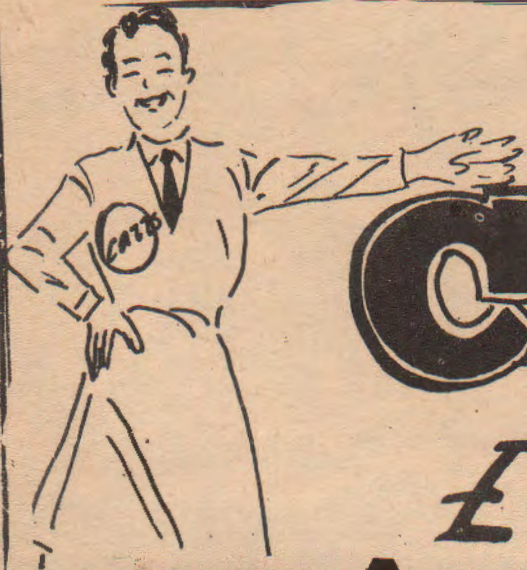
