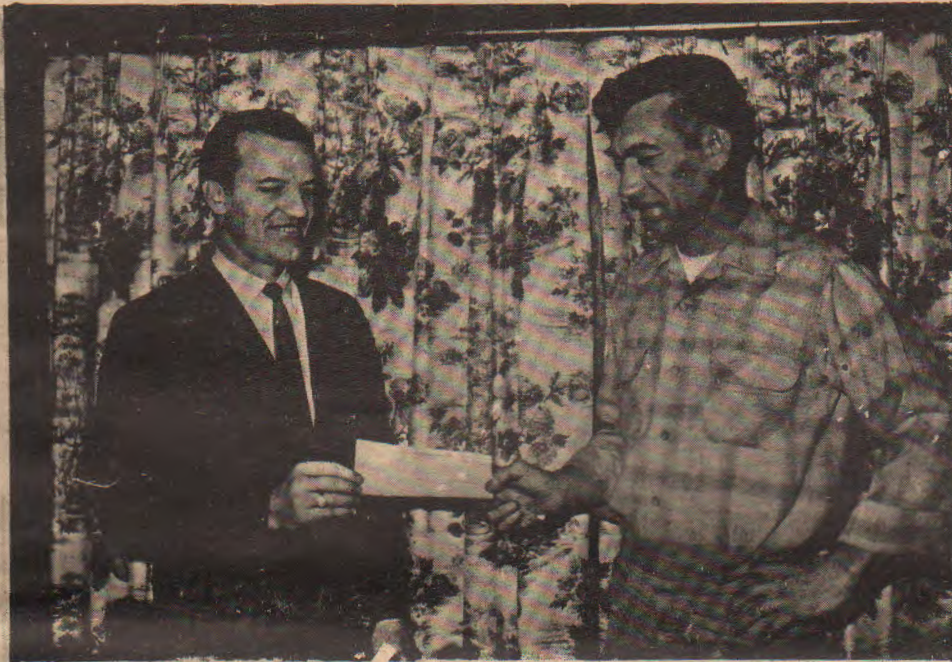




# FIRE LEAVES FAMILY HOMELESS

## BIRCHWOOD GRADE SCHOOL TO OPEN

BIRCHWOOD: Monday, December 11th, will be a big day in the lives of the students and faculty of the Birchwood Elementary school.

On this day, the students will gather their books and personal belongings from the temporary classrooms which they have been occupying at the Chugiak and Eagle River Elementary Schools and move into their new building.

Harry Wimmer, Birchwood Elementary Principal, said that the building is completed with the exception of some ceiling tile in several of the rooms. He has reason to expect that this will have been installed by opening day, but if not no further delay will be experienced. The tile originally ordered for the school had been destroyed in a warehouse fire in Anchorage earlier this fall, and the contractor has re-ordered this.

The new school will consist of 14 classrooms and multipurpose-room. The hot lunch program will be in effect as soon as the new building is occupied.

Wimmer said that on Monday, December 11th, the students will go by bus at the usual time to the school which they have been temporarily attending and pick up their

EAGLE RIVER: A fire, which broke out at approximately 11:30am yesterday (Tuesday) completely destroyed the residence of Roy Hutchison located off Artillery Road in Eagle River.

According to a spokesman for the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company, no one was at home when the fire broke out.

The Eagle River Company responded with three pieces of equipment, and were assisted by the Ft. Richardson Fire Department with 2 trucks and eight men. The structure was completely involved, by the time the equipment arrived, and nothing could be done to save it.

The building consisted of two quonset huts joined together with a gabled roof. The loss of both the house and the contents was estimated at \$10,000. There was no insurance.

A neighboring house, belonging to a relative, Coleman Hutchison was ignited by the heat, but the fire men were able to extinguish this and keep it cooled down.

One possible cause of the fire was thought to be a propane torch which had been used earlier in the day.

The Hutchison's and their three children have lost all their clothes and personal belongings. Friends of the family are asking donations from local residents of clothing as well as household items. The family has been offered temporary housing in a trailer located near the Meadowcreek Apartments, but this is unfinished.

Mr. Hutchison; Trousers, 38-33, shirt, 17 1/2 tall, 36 in. sleeve, shoes, 13D.

Mrs. Hutchison; slacks size 12, blouse 32, dress size 10.

Warren; trousers, 32-30; shirt, man's size medium, shoe 11D.

Katherine; slacks size 12 miss's tall; dress 12; shoes 9 1/2 B.

Marjorie; slacks 12 1/2 chubby, dress 12 1/2, shoes 7 1/2C; coat size 12 or 14.

A person entitled to assistance under this program who is handicapped by a physical or mental disability may receive specialized training.

Specific information on eligibility, how to apply, specialized training, schools, educational costs and related matters may be obtained from any VA office.

### VA RAISES AGE LIMIT FOR EDUCATIONAL AID

Effective Oct. 1, the maximum age limit for sons and daughters of veterans entitled to Veterans Administration educational financial assistance was raised from 23 to 26, according to H.C. Christie, manager of the Juneau VA regional office. The liberalization is provided in a new law signed by the President last Aug. 31.

Eligible for this help under the War Orphans Educational Assistance program are the sons and daughters of veterans who died or were permanently and totally disabled as the result of a service connected injury or illness.

They may receive grants from the VA up to \$130 a month for 36 months of approved, full-time training.

While an 18 to 26 age limit generally applies, in certain instances a young person may begin school before age 18 and continue after age 26.

Marriage is not a bar to this benefit.

Generally, benefits under this program are for students enrolling in colleges, universities and technical schools. Below college-level courses may be taken only in schools which offer specialized training that will fit a student for a vocational goal.

said that ice was forming on the wings of the plane and he knew that he had to land immediately. There was no time to return to his original point of take-off, so he set the plane down in an area of rolling hills. He said that although the plane was not damaged in the emergency landing, there was over four feet of soft snow in the area. He told of being unable to see through the ice encrusted windshield and having to land while looking out the side window.

He said it was snowing quite hard at the time, and continued to snow on Sunday. He and his passenger John James, spent most of that day digging the plane out.

On Monday, a C.A.P. plane flew over, and Harms was able to make radio contact with the aircraft. He asked that their families be notified that they were okay, and asked that a pair of snowshoes be dropped, since he had left his at his original strip.

The following day, when bad weather kept the CAP plane from returning, Harms fought his way through the deep snow to some spruce trees, where he cut spruce boughs and made a crude pair of snowshoes. This took him all day.

With these homemade shoes he managed to pack out a fair strip approximately 800 feet long. The following day it snowed another two feet, wiping out all of his work.

When the weather cleared on Friday, and a rescue helicopter landed, both men were willing to leave the plane and ride home. Harms said that although they had a tent, the weather was too windy and the snow too deep to set it up, so they spent the nights sitting in the plane in their sleeping bags. He said that they had enough rations to have lasted them two weeks.

He told that at no time were they concerned about anything other than the anxiety they knew their families were experiencing. He said that he will wait until the weather gets cold enough to freeze the soft snow to return and try to fly his airplane out. When he left it, the plane was sitting in approximately six feet of very soft snow.

were asked a group of 24 prepared questions by moderator Rev. John Shaffer of the Chugiak Methodist Church. Their answers could then be challenged by any member of a panel of local residents consisting of Emerson Sortore, Chugiak Elementary School Principal, Darrell Daley, Chugiak High School Teacher, Robert Fleming, President of the Chugiak Lions, Ray Emmons and Garlan Connell, both of the Birchwood Community Club. Members of the audience were not permitted to address the panel, but could write any questions on slips of paper provided and these were presented to the panel for answers at the end of the regular questioning.

Trooper Hagen, in his opening remarks urged citizens to report all thefts and acts of vandalism, even minor ones. He said that such information may be all the police might need to clear up other incidents under investigation.

One item that was brought out by the session was that most of the seeming lack of enforcement was the direct result of insufficient manpower in both the State Troopers (for every 100 square miles in

the Anchorage area there is 1.4 Troopers to cover) and a lack of probation officers, and finally a lack of detention facilities for juveniles in the State.

It was pointed out that in order to provide for more troopers etc, the people must be prepared to pay more taxes to pay for these services. It was learned that because of the lack of enough manpower many of the offenses in rural areas were not followed up at all.

The audience which numbered over 200 persons was made up of many local residents plus at least ten members of the Alaska State Legislature who had been invited to attend the meeting.

A spokesman for the Birchwood Community Club said that he was much heartened by what was learned, and felt that existing laws were adequate to curb the increase of juvenile crime.

Some other members of the audience interviewed at random did not share his optimism. One felt that an open invitation had been extended to problem youth to continue with their activities since there wasn't enough Troopers to arrest them, or detention homes to keep them in. Another claimed to have spotted several well known hardened juvenile offenders in the audience, "...taking it all in."

A follow up meeting of the Law Enforcement Study group was held last Tuesday night. There tapes made of the forum were reviewed, and a course of action charted. The chairman of the study committee, Garlan Connell stated that there appear to be 4 distinct areas in which local people can work toward

## FUNDS RELEASED FOR OUTDOOR RECREATION

WASHINGTON, D.C. - More than \$593,000 in federal assistance has been set aside for outdoor recreation areas and facilities in Alaska for the fiscal year which began July 1, 1967.

The funds, which represent Alaska's share of the Department of the Interior's Land and Water Conservation Fund, must be matched on a 50-50 basis by the State of Alaska.

The Land and Water Conservation Fund derives revenues from the sale of the \$7 Golden Eagle Passport and other Federal outdoor recreation fees, proceeds from the sale of Federal surplus real property, and the Federal motorboat fuels tax.

The buildings are the residences of Til Wallace and his brother Michael. According to Til, the vandalism took place approximately on Saturday, November 18th.

Windows in the buildings were broken, clothing and furniture destroyed and many irreplaceable items which Wallace had collected in his travels around the world smashed. Wallace said that he estimated the damage done in his house alone at \$1,000.

The Wallace homestead is located in an area which is inaccessible to most conventional cars. This is the second time that vandals have damaged his home, Wallace said. Several years ago, his original homestead house was burned to the ground by vandals.

Wallace is offering a \$100 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those guilty of the act.

### RURAL FIRE BILL PROPOSED

WASHINGTON D.C. - Senator Ernest Gruening (D-Alaska), in a move directed towards cooperative rural fire protection, this week co-sponsored legislation introduced by Senator Joseph M. Montoya (D-New Mexico) which would allow the Secretary of Agriculture to cooperate with state and private groups to establish systems of fire suppression in rural areas.

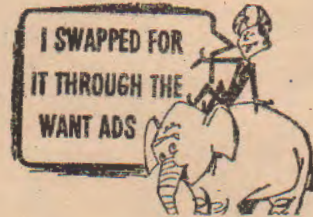
The bill, S. 2263, would authorize and direct the Secretary of Agriculture to cooperate with state foresters and other state officials for development by states, public bodies, and non-profit organizations, systems of rural fire control and prevention.

The "Cooperative Rural Fire Protection Bill" would also provide for financial and other assistance

in establishing, training and equipping of such fighting forces. This would have the effect of strengthening fire fighting efforts in areas now under no organized protection or having only limited protection.

The authorized program would be at a level of \$3.5 million for the first fiscal year, \$4.5 million for the second fiscal year, and \$6 million for the third and succeeding fiscal years.

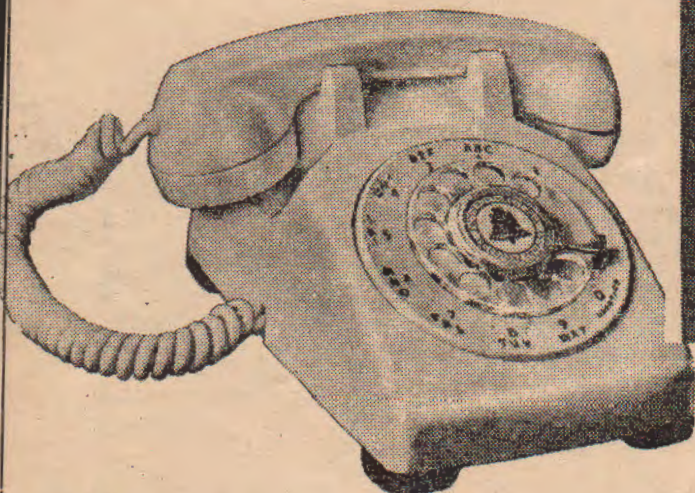

WASHINGTON D.C.: U.S. Senator Ernest Gruening was advised this week that federal agencies may begin selection for summer employment after applicants applying by December 8th, have been tested and entered on the list of eligibles. For certain jobs which require early selection, the list of eligibles may be used after the first test.

Alaskans who have reached age 18 or who are at least 16 years old and have graduated from high school may obtain an application card from college placement offices, most post offices, Inter-agency Boards of Examiners, and the U.S. Civil Service Commission.

Applications should be mailed to Summer Employment Examination, U.S. Civil Service Commission, 1900 E Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20415.

One significant change in this year's program will permit applicants to be considered for post office seasonal assistant jobs and grade GS-1 through 4 summer jobs in many federal agencies by taking only one examination, rather than two as in previous years.

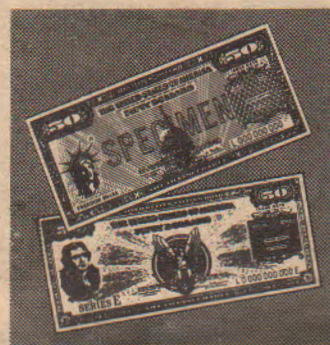
