On this day, the students will gather their books and personal belongings from the temporary classrooms which they have been occupying at the Chugiak and Eagle River Elementary Schools and move River Elementary Schools and move into their new building.

Harry Wimmer, Birchwood Elementary Principal, said that the build-ing is completed with the exception some ceiling tile in several of the rooms. He has reason to expect that this will have been installed by opening day, but if not no further delay will be experienced. The tile originally ordered for the school had been destroyed in a warehouse fire in Anchorage earlier this fall, and the contractor has re-

ordered this.

The new school will consist of 14 classrooms and multipurposeroom. The hot lunch program will he in effect as soon as the new building is occupied.

Wimmer said that on Monday, December lith, the students will go by bus at the usual time to the school which they have been temporarily attending and pick up their

A fire, EAGLE RIVER: broke out at approximately 11:30am yesterday (Tuesday) completely destroyed the residence of Roy Hutch-ison located off Artillery Road in Eagle River.

According to a spokesman for the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company, no one was at home Company, no one way

The Eagle River Company responded with three pieces of equipment, and were assisted by the Ft. Richardson Fire Department with 2 trucks and eight men. The structure was completely involved, by the time the equipment arrived, and nothing could be done to save it.

The building consisted of two quonset huts joined together with a gabled roof. The loss of both the house and the coutents was estimated at \$10,000. There was no insurance,

A neighboring house, belonging to a relative, Coleman Hutchison was ignited by the heat, but the fire men were able to extinguise this and keep it cooled down.

One possible cause of the fire was thought to be a propane torch which had been used earlier in the day.

The Hutchison's and their three children have lost all their clothes and personal belongings. of the family are asking donations from local residents of clothing as well as household items. The fam-ily has been offered temporary housing in a trailer located near the Meadowcreek Apartments, but this is unfrunished.

(Pilots cont page 1 col 1), said that ice was forming on the wings of the plane and he knew that he had to land immediately. There was no time to return to his original point of take-off, so he set the plane down in an area of rolling hills. He said that al-though the plane was not damaged in the emergency landing, there was over four feet of soft snow in the area. He told of being unable to see through the ice encrusted windshield and having to land while looking out the side

He said it was snowing quite hard at the time, and continued to snow on Sunday. He and his passenger John James, spent most

of that day digging the plane out.
On Monday, a C.A.P. plane flew
over, and Harms was able to make
radio contact with the aircraft. He
asked that their families be notified that they were okay, and asked that a pair of snowshoed be dropped, since he had left his at his original strip.

The following day, when bad weather kept the CAP plane from returning, Harms fought his way through the deep snow to some spruce trees, where he cut spruce bonght and made a crude pair of snowshoes. This took him all day.

With these homemade shoes he managed to pack out a fair strip approximately 800 feet long. The following day it snowed another two

feet, wiping out all of his work.

When the weather cleared on
Friday, and a rescue helicopter
landed, both men were willing to
leave the plane and ride home.
Harms said that although they had a tent, the weather was too windy and the snow too deep to set it up, so they spent the nights sitting in the plane in their sleeping bags. He said that they had enough rations to have lasted them two weeks.

He told that at no time were they concerned about anything other than the anxiety they knew their families were experiencing. He said that he will wait until the weather gets cold enough to freeze the soft snow to return and try to fly his airplane out. When he left it, the plane was sitting in approximately six feet of very soft snow.

(Forum cont page 1 col 2) were asked a group of 24 prepared questions by moderator Rev. John Shaffer of the Chugiak Methodist Church. Their answers could then be challenged by any member of a panel of local residents consisting of Emerson Sortore, Chugiak Elementary School Principal, Darrell Daley, Chugiak High School Teacher, Robert Fleming, President of the Chugiak Lions, Ray Emmons and Garlan Connell, both of the Birchwood Community Club. Members of the audience were not permitted to address the panel, but could write address the panel, but could write any questions on slips of paper provided and these were presented to the pauel for answers at the end

of the regular questioning.

Trooper Hagen, in his opening remarks urged citizens to report all thefts and acts of vandalism, even monor ones. He said that such information may be all the police might used to clear up other incidents under investigation.

One item that was brought out by the session was that most of the seeming lack of enforcement was the direct result of insufficient manpower in both the State Troopers (for every 100 square miles in

the Anchorage area there is 1.4 Troopers to cover) and a lack of probation officers, and finally a lack of detention facilities for juneniles in the State.

It was pointed out that in order to provide for more troopers etc, the people must be prepared to pay mores taxes to pay for these services. It was learned that because of the lack of enough manpower many of the offenses in rural areas were not followed up at all.

The audience which numbered over 200 persons was made up of many local residents plus at least ten members of the Alaska State Leg-islature who had been invited to

attend the meeting.
A spokesman for the Birchwood Community Club said that he was much heartened by what was learned, and felt that existing laws were adequate to curb the increase of juvenile crime.

Some other members of the audience interviewed at random did not share his optimism. One felt that an open invitation had been extended to problem youth to continue with their activities since ther wasn't enough Troopers to arrest them, or detention homes to keep them in.

Another claimed to have spotted several well know hardened juvenile offenders in the audience, "...taking it all in,".

A follow up meeting of the Law

Enforcement Study group was held last Tuesday night. There tapes made of the forum were reviewed, and a course of action charted. The chalrman of the study committee, Garlan Connell stated that there appear to be 4 distinct areas which local people can work toward (cont page 6 col 1)

The buildings are the residences of Til Wallace and his brother Michael. According to Til, the vandalism took place approximately on Saturday, November 18th.

Windows in the buildings were broken, clothing and furniture de-stroyed and many irreplacable stroyed and many irreplacable items which Wallace had collected in his travels around the world smashed. Wallace said that he estimated the damage done in his house alone at \$1,000.

The Wallace homestead is located in an area which is inaccessable to most conventional cars. This is the second time that vandals have damaged his home, Wallace said.
Several years ago, his original
homestead house was burned to
the ground by vandals.
Wallace is offering a \$100 reward

for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those guilty

of the act.

RURAL FIRE BILL PROPOSED

WASHINGTON D.C. - Senator Ernest Gruening (D-Alaska), in a move directed towards cooperative rural fire protection, this week co-sponsored legislation introduced by Senator Joesph M. Montoya (D-New Mexico) which would allow the Secretary of Agricutture to cooperate with state and private groups to extablish systems of fire suppression in rural areas.

The bill, S. 2263, would authorize and direct the Secretary of Agri-culture to cooperate with state foresters and other state officials for development by states, public bodies, and non-profit organizations, systems of rural fire control

and prevention.
The "Cooperative Rural Fire Protection Bill' would also provide for financial and other assistance

in establishing, training and equip-ing of such fighting forces. This would have the effect of strengthening fire fighting efforts in areas now under no organized protection or having only limited protection.

The authorized program would

be at a level of \$3,5 million for the first fiscal year, \$4,5 million for the second fiscal year, and \$6 million for the third and succeeding fiscal years.




