LOCAL MAN ON U.S. OLYMPIC TEAM

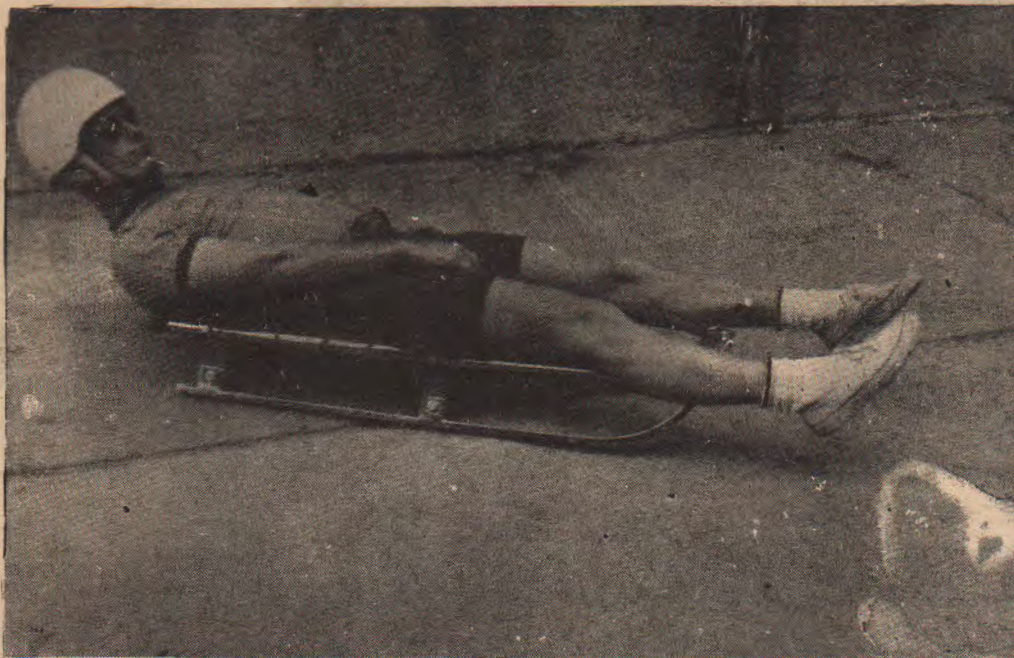
EAGLE RIVER: Bruce Pettit, of Eagle River, now serving with the U.S. Airforce, will be competing in the 1968 Winter Olympics in Grenoble, France this coming February as a member of the United States Luge Team.

What is a luge? It is a winter sled speed sport. Luge racing is a European sport, pronounced like ruge, with an l instead of an r.

The sled weighs 44 pounds. The frame is made of wood, fiberglass, or metal and races a pair of wide tilted steel runners. The rider lies on his back on a slung-seating platform and rides feet forward down the 300 foot icy run. Only by shifting his weight from one runner to the other is the rider able to steer the luge. The slightest movement will cause the luge to change course. "Perhaps even turning your head a bit", Pettit said, Pettit was clocked at 75 miles per hour last spring in training and competition.

Pettit, who has lived in Alaska since he was one year old, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Pettit of End Street in the Pipple Sub-division in Eagle River. He is a graduate of the Chugiak Elementary School and of East Anchorage High School. He entered the Air Force two years ago, and is now stationed at Fairchild AFB in Washington State where he is a Sergeant in aircraft maintenance. He and his wife Stefanie live in Spokane.

ANCHORAGE: A number of "ifs", "buts" and contradictions appear to be blocking the path to a Head Start Program in the Greater Chugiak Area in the near future.

John Bucholdt, of the Anchorage Community Action Agency told the Knik Arm Courier, that while he has discussed the subject with a number of representatives from G.O.A.L., no formal application for this program has been made.

Bucholdt explained that there are \$20,000 remaining in the Head Start Funds left over from the summer Head Start programs of 1966 and 1967. He said that these funds could be made available to the Chugiak Area with the approval of the San Francisco Office of the O.E.O.

He went on to say that at present G.O.A.L. is a Neighborhood Council made up of representatives from the several communities of the Greater Chugiak Area. He said that he was recommending to G.O.A.L. that they request the status of a delegate Agency of the C.A.A., under which they could administer their own funds, hire teachers and manage a local Head Start Program themselves. The event that G.O.A.L. does not seek the status of a delegate agency, then the program might be administered under the G.A.A.B. School District. Bucholdt said that if application was made to his office for funds soon, it could be possible to get approval in time to begin a Head Start Program by the beginning of the spring school semester.

The word from the local G.O.A.L. group indicates that they might not be completely in accord with Mr. Bucholdt's suggestion.

An emergency meeting of that group was called Saturday night by the Board members of G.O.A.L. with Mr. Ted Darby of the Anchorage Borough School District to discuss the Head Start program in the Greater Chugiak Area.

A request was made by the Board to the Anchorage Area Community Action Agency, to amend the proposal, established on Thursday, November 30th, 1967 to include the following. That Anchorage Borough School District as a delegate agency during the summer of 1968, operate a component of approximately 30 children at the Chugiak Elementary School.

This was the second meeting of the day. The first one was held with Mrs. Ada Burgridge, Deputy Director of Community Action, and Mrs. Elaine MacLaid, Parent coordinator of the Head Start Program in Anchorage, for further information.

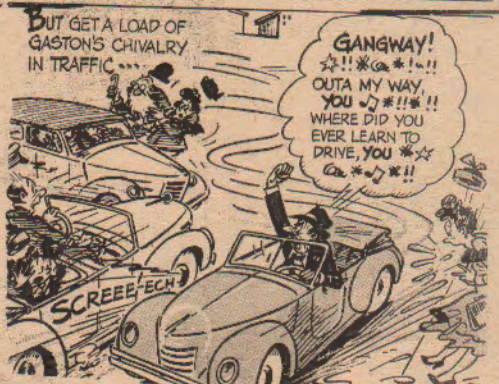

Bruce started luge only a year ago as a member of the Air Force. He trained and competed last spring in Missoula, Montana where the North American luge championships were held. He placed ninth in the singles event and second in the doubles.

During the 1967 Olympic development program Pettit competed at Imst, Austria and placed sixth in the singles and first in the doubles. On the basis of this and his past experience in alpine skiing and junior dog racing he was chosen a member of the Olympic squad of 11 men and 5 women. The sport is run in singles and doubles, but no mixed doubles.

Pettit has arranged an agreement with the Parks and Recreation Commission in Washington State to build a luge run on Mt. Spokane. A fire break was utilized for this. The forest ranger allowed his assistant ranger, who had previously been stationed in Austria, to use a bulldozer to do the preliminary work on the run. Four thousand feet of plastic pipe were used and valves installed every 300 feet. A 150 foot hose will be used for spraying. So far all work and materials with the exception of the plastic pipe and some sleds have been donated. The National Guard donated 1200 sand bags. Potato and seed bags were given by others. These were doubled and then the bags were filled with dirt and gravel from the mountain and placed to bank the corners.

The AAU in Spokane is spearheading the effort and providing what financial assistance is needed.

This luge run is being used to train future racers and as a place of recreation for any who enjoy the sport.

The team has left for Vall, Colorado to practise, and then will go to Europe for intensive training.

It is certain that all Bruce's friends in the Chugiak area wish him the best of luck in this new venture, and are looking for him to bring home some medals for the U.S.A!

FIRE COMPANY TO IMPROVE FIRE HALL

EAGLE RIVER: Chief Tom Take of the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company announced that the company is making plans to correct the situation that occurred at the fire on Artillery Road last week.

When the first truck arrived at the scene, the crew found that the pump had frozen and rendered the truck unusable.

Chief Take stated that this was caused by the present situation at the fire station, with the heating plant at the rear. While the station is kept warm enough during normal temperatures, the front of the building is much to open for periods of low temperatures. Chief Take said, "The department will try to take some measures to tighten up the front end of the station."

The second part of the plan will go into effect this month. The Far North Service Station will make one of their stalls in the garage available to the company to keep the Tanker Truck in out of the weather. Tom Slanker owner of the station, and Vice President of the Fire Company, stated that the truck would have almost continuous use of the stall.

The Fire Company needs the community's help to make the improvements to the station. "There are work crews available to do the work, but we must continue to receive membership donations in order to have the funds to do the job," Chief Take concluded.

Following the ceremony a reception was held in the fellowship hall of the church.

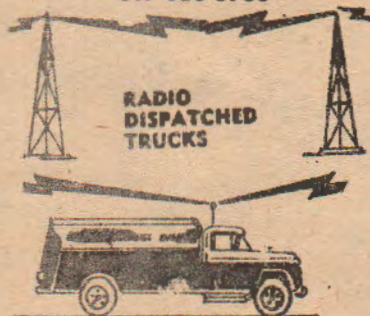

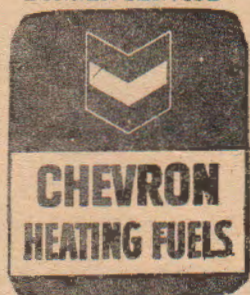

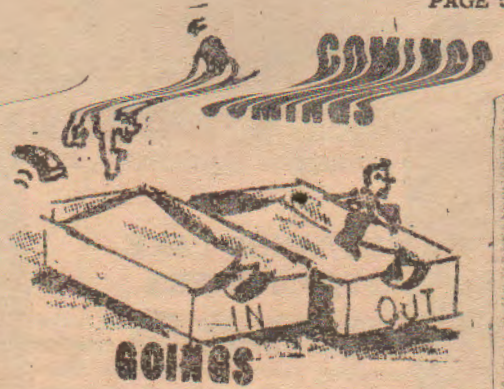
PTA SPONSORS SKATE AND SKI BOOT SWAP

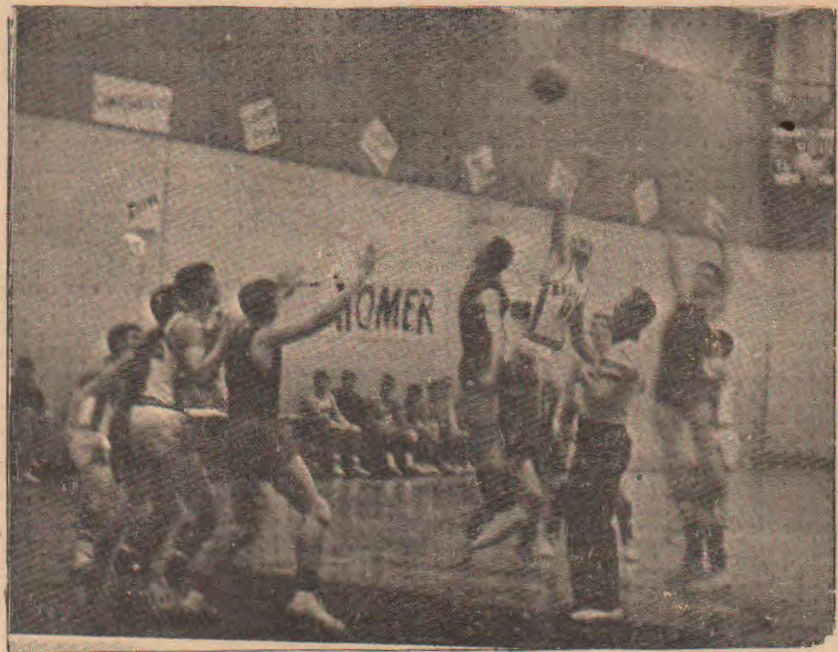

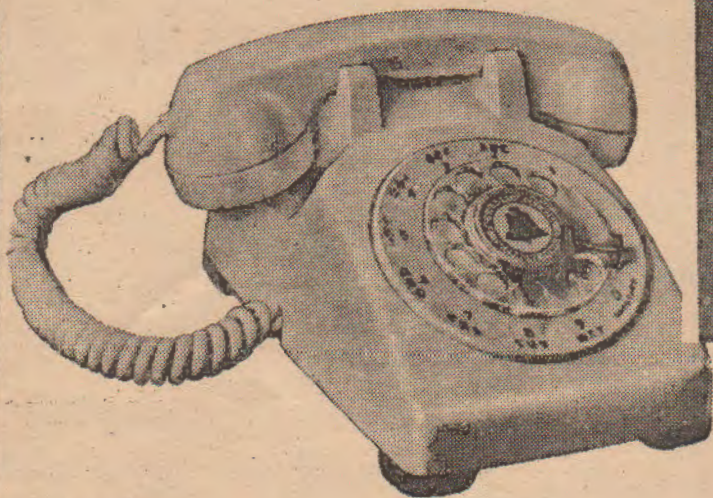

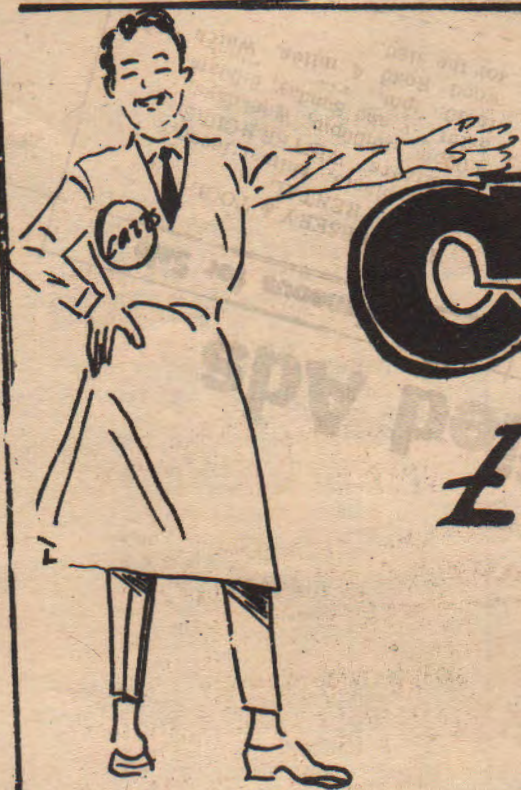
