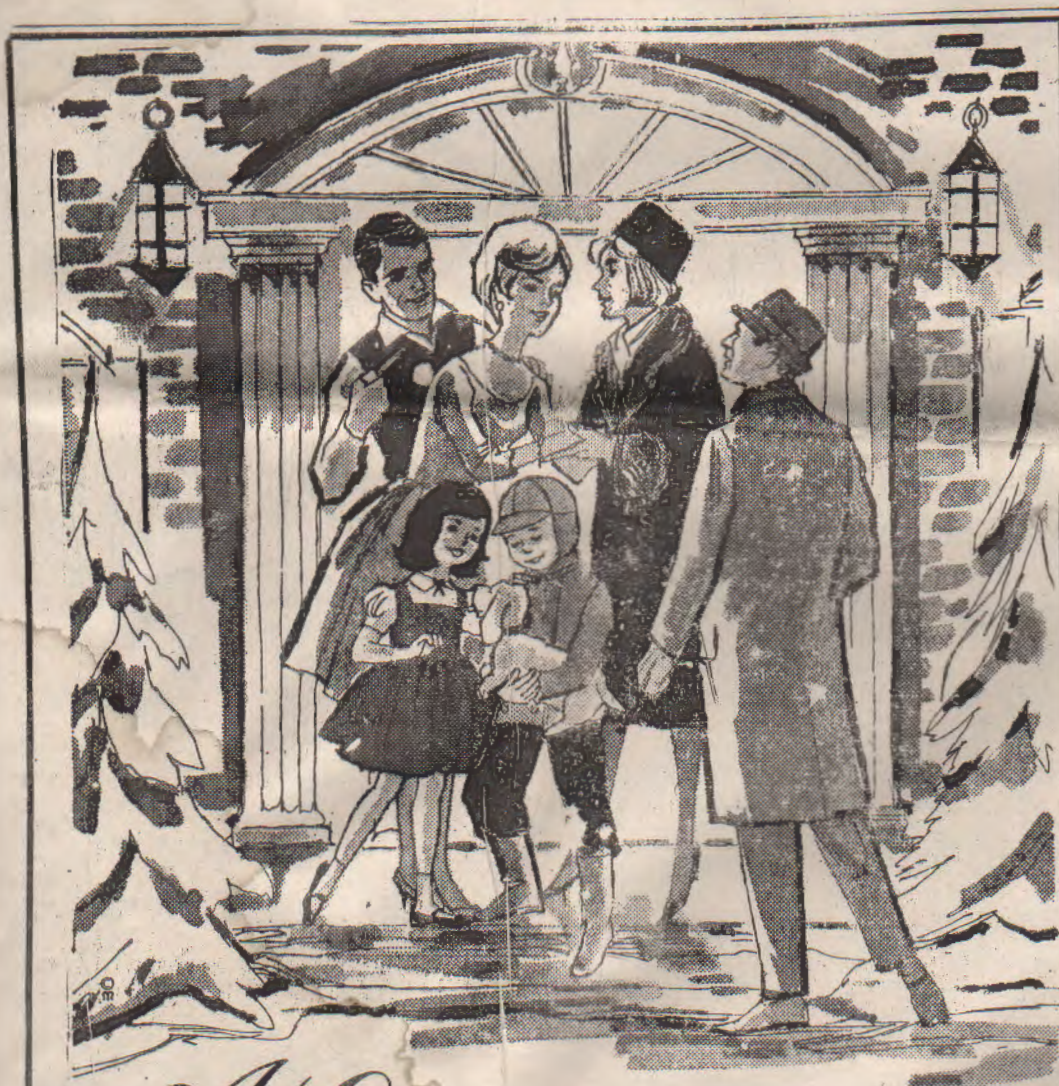

HUTCHISON BURNED OUT AGAIN



A Greeting FOR THE
New Year

We're wishing one and all a New Year bright with joy and peace, rich with many friends and full of good fortune. To all our loyal patrons: we're especially grateful for your confidence and good will. We shall strive, in the year ahead, to serve you well that our cordial relationship may continue for many more years.

EAGLE RIVER: An Eagle River family for the second time in less than a month has been left homeless by fire.

A house trailer, belonging to Roy Hutchison of Artillery Road, was gutted by a fire which broke out at about 10am on Christmas Day.

The trailer was located on the same property on which the Hutchison house which was completely destroyed by fire on November 28th had been standing.

A neighbor, Gene Benito, who had spotted and reported the first Hutchison fire, noticed the smoke pouring from the trailer and called the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company. Benito said he rushed over to the trailer to see if anyone was inside, and found no one there. He attempted to remove some of the furniture from the trailer while waiting for the Fire Company to arrive.

The fire was extinguished but not before inflicting approximately \$7,000 damage to the trailer and contents.

The Hutchison's had not yet moved into the trailer, which they were in the process of buying. They are living temporarily near mile 18 in Old Chugiak, it was believed that they had planned to move into the trailer within the next few days. Apparently they had not yet moved all of their personal belongings into the trailer.

The loss was not covered by insurance.

The cause of the fire was believed to be a defective oil heater, according to Tom Take, Eagle River Fire Chief.

LIGHT SNOW CAN BE DANGEROUS

A light or moderate snowfall may well be as dangerous as a blizzard, motorists were advised today by the Alaska State Troopers.

When blizzards develop, no one is fooled. Safety becomes a matter of real concern and drivers stay off the highway if at all possible. But light snow is deceiving and many drivers fail to realize just how treacherous snow and ice can become until they are stalled or caught skidding into a ditch.

Safe driving rules for snow conditions include: get to know the feel of the road by gently pumping brakes intermittently when first starting out. Then, drive at conservative speeds.

Follow other vehicles at safe distances, giving yourself plenty of margin for braking and other maneuvers if the car ahead suddenly stops or goes into a spin or skid.

Use tire chains in addition to snow tires when traveling on ice or hardpacked snow.

If it's necessary to stop suddenly, don't slam on the brakes. Pump them down gently intermittently. A fast stop will throw you into a spin or skid.

Always keep windshields clear of snow, frost and ice. If vision is obscured, pull off the traveled portion and clean away snow and ice. Periodic checks of defrosters and windshield wipers will help you avoid losing a clear picture of the road ahead.

Remember, too, that you must clear your windshield before you start moving. Driving while looking through only a "Peep hole" in the windshield can zero you in on a tragic mishap.

DEADLINE FOR WAGE EARNERS

Dec. 31 means not only the end of 1967 but also an important deadline for wage earners as well. The end of the year is

the deadline in filing claims for employee refunds. S.H. Bowdoin, director of Employment Security for Alaska, stated that overpayments of unemployment insurance contributions on 1966 can be claimed no later than Dec. 31, 1967.

To be eligible, an employee must have worked for more than one employer during 1966 and his total wages from all employers for that year must have been in excess of \$7,200.

Information and refund claim forms are available at all local offices of the Alaska State Employment Service, or may be secured by writing to the Alaska Department of Labor, Box 3-7000 in Juneau. The forms must be filed prior to Jan. 1, 1968.

TAX SEASON STARTS JAN. 1

Now is the time to put your financial house in order and a head start on the income filing season which begins Jan. 1.

Lewis J. Conrad, director of Internal Revenue for Alaska, emphasizes that cancelled checks, receipts, records of contributions and other financial records should be gathered now to help you prepare 1967 Federal income tax returns.

Complete records help to ensure that taxpayers do not overpay their taxes and also make the job of preparing tax return easier.

PRE-SCHOOL EYE TESTS PLANNED

CHUGIAK: Members of the Chugiak Health Council wish to remind parents of pre-school children in the Greater Chugiak Area of the Amblyopia (Eye) Clinic to be held here in January.

Beberly Glenn, local Public Health Nurse explains that Amblyopia, or "Lazy Eye" is a condition that if untreated in children under the age of six can lead to partial blindness.

Mrs. Glenn said that often parents are unaware of this condition because a very young child is himself unaware they he is not seeing properly, and the amblyopia is not discovered until the child has started school, at which time it may be to late to correct it.

The clinic will test all pre-school children for amblyopia at no charge to the parents. The date for the clinic has been set for January 13th, a Wednesday. It will be held in the Health Center, located in the basement of the Eagle River Baptist Church between the hours of 11:00am and 4:30pm.

The Health Council is asking women from the community to assist in conducting this clinic.

COUPON CONTEST WINNER TO BE ANNOUNCED

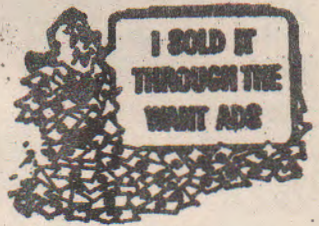

The fire, which broke out at around noon of that day was reported by a neighbor, and although the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company responded immediately, they were unable to save the building.

The Donnelly's lived on a homestead at mile 9 on Eagle River Road. None of the family was at home at the time of the fire.

Clothing is presently needed for Mrs. Donnelly and her four

sons. The two girls have been clothed, and Mr. Donnelly was working at Wildwood Station near Kenai at the time of the fire, and had sufficient clothing with him at the time.

Mrs. Donnelly wears a size 16 tall or size 18 and an 8 1/2B or size 9 shoe. She is in need of all variety of clothing.

The boys are, Tim, age 3, who wears a size 4 and size 10 1/2 shoe. Kevin age 8, wears a size 8 and a size 1 shoes, Peter age 10 wears size 10 and a size 3 shoe and Billy age 11, wears size 12 to 14, and a size 4 shoe.

The Donnelly home was insured, and they plan to rebuild at the same location as soon as their claim is settled. The cause of the fire has not been determined.

Clothing donations may be left at St. Andrews Catholic Church in Eagle River, or at the Walter Maslik home in Peters Creek.

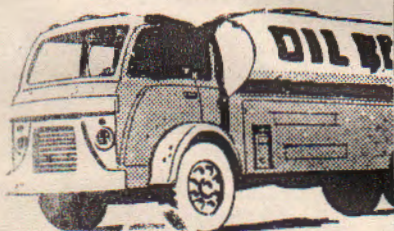
